This profile provides an overview of conditions in Al Hardania camp. Primary data was collected through household surveys on 15-01-2017. This was the first round of data collection for this camp. Households were randomly sampled to a 95% confidence and 10% margin of error, based on population figures provided by CCCM. In some cases, additional information from camp managers has been used to support findings.


