2. Rationale

2.1. Rationale

As of May 2019, a total of 211,544¹ mostly Somali refugees resided in Dadaab camps and are vulnerable to pressure to return to their country of origin despite the continued uncertain situation in Somalia. The number of "undocumented persons" who are unable to access refugee registration has increased because the Government of Kenya suspended registration of refugees since 2015. In February 2019, REACH found that 3% of households had no member of the household registered². REACH in close coordination with UNHCR, NRC and other relevant humanitarian actors in Dadaab, will lead in conducting joint multi-sectoral needs assessments (JMSNA) in order to understand the living conditions of the refugees in the camps. As well as identify whether there are any differences between registered and unregistered refugees in regard to access to services. This assessment is aimed at providing an up-to-date overview of refugee access to services in the sectors of education, shelter, health, livelihoods, Water, Hygiene and Sanitation (WASH) and food and nutrition.

3. Methodology

3.1. Methodology overview

In this assessment, REACH will conduct Household (HH) interviews in Dadaab refugee complex and the questionnaire will cover key profile, needs and gaps in assistance as per Sphere standards and IASC indicators, as agreed with UNHCR sector leads and other partners. Special focus will be given to Education and Health sectors due to the wider plans under the umbrella of the CRRF rollout to change the approach of service delivery in the camps and support the inclusion of refugees into national systems. An additional focus area will be livelihoods covering indicators on income generation activities and barriers in the context of movement, business and trade.

3.2. Population of interest

The assessment will cover three refugee camps in Dadaab refugee complex: Dagahaley, Hagadera and Ifo camps. The population of interest are refugees from Somalia and other countries living within the three refugee camps.

3.3. Secondary data review (outline key bibliography/sources you will use and for what).

- i. UNHCR Monthly operational updates- This provides an overview of activities and service delivery carried out in the camps including WASH activities, education interventions, Health services as well as protection and security. The resource will help triangulate primary data collected on needs and access to services in Dadaab as perceived by households.
- ii. Sector specific assessments in Dadaab This include food security assessments, education assessments as well as health surveys carried out by actors operating in Dadaab. These resources will aid in designing the methodology including tool development.
- iii. REACH 2018 and February 2019 multi-sectoral needs assessment factsheet, these includes sectors of health, education, livelihoods etc. and will help in designing methodology and developing tools.

3.4. Primary Data Collection

3.4.1. Household-level interviews

Household level interviews will be conducted in each of the three camps of Dadaab refugee complex, The sample will be selected through probability random sampling at camp level to fulfil 95% Confidence level and 5% Margin of Error. Random GPS points will be generated using ARC map in the residential areas, which are clearly divided into blocks, enumerators will access the random GPS points from their android phones using maps.me, and they will interview households that fall on particular points. In case there is no one to interview in the selected household, or the respondent is unwilling to participate, enumerators will target the next nearest household in a radius of 5 meters. If there is still no household to interview, then they will interview the household that falls on the next point. The household-level questionnaire will cover levels of needs, access and vulnerabilities across the sectors of protection, water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH), education, food security, health and nutrition, shelter and livelihoods. The sample size will be calculated based on household population of each camp, which is already known (see table 1). Household survey data will be collected using ODK collect by use of mobile phones.

2.5. Data Processing & Analysis

Data from household interviews will be uploaded daily on the KOBO server. Daily data checks will be done in the evening once enumerators have uploaded data in the server. The outcomes of the data quality checks will form a basis for debriefing the enumerators before further data collection. Once all data has been uploaded, data cleaning will begin and feedback gathered where needed from enumerators. One factsheet will be produced for every camp covering the sectors of protection, water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH), education, food security, health and nutrition, shelter and livelihoods. Once initial data analysis has been done, the findings will be discussed and contextualized with relevant partners and one situation overview prepared.
