The Rapid Response Mechanism (RRM) is designed to monitor humanitarian action, conduct multisector assessments (MSAs) of needs and to implement several types of emergency responses, including distributions of essential non-food items (NFI) and high emergency biscuits (HEBs), emergency water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH) interventions, as well as cash transfer programming (CTP). Currently, the RRM is made possible through the support of the European Commission Civil Protection and Humanitarian Aid Operations department (ECHO), the United States Agency for International Development (USAID), the Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (SIDA) and the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC). 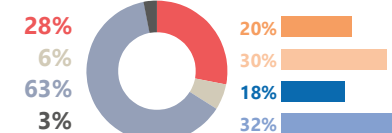

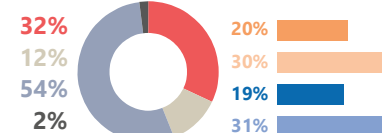

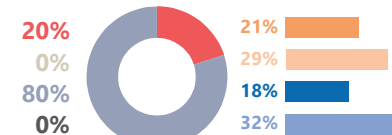

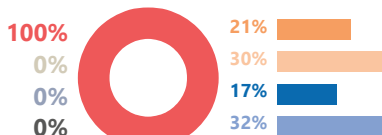

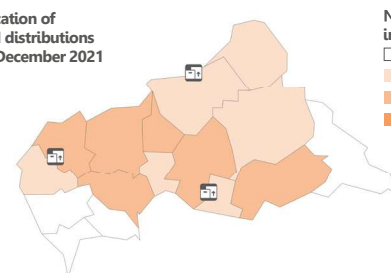

Location of NFI distributions in December 2021

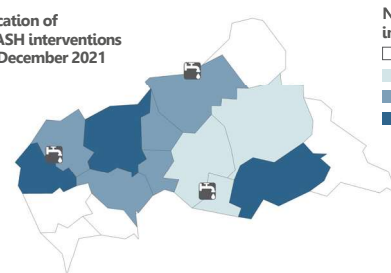

MSA-R aim at gathering information on areas not recently affected and/or not recently accessed by humanitarian actors. ⁷ The term 'host community' refers to individuals that have not been displaced as the result of a humanitarian-related event. ⁸ The term 'returnees' refers to people who have come back to their pre-crisis location following a period of internal displacement. ⁹ The term 'rapatriés' refers to former refugees who have returned from neighbouring countries.
