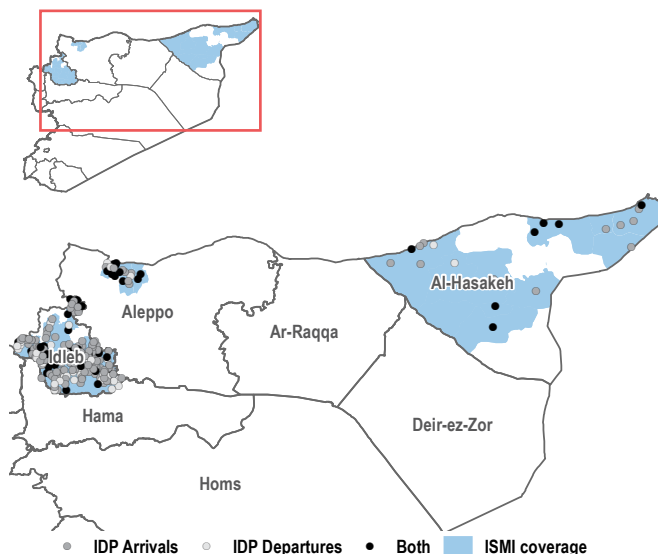


OVERALL FINDINGS: 1-30 November

- 253 out of 602 ISMI-covered communities in Aleppo (A'zaz sub-district)², Al-Hasakeh and Idleb governorates experienced inward or outward movement of IDPs.
- Idleb governorate witnessed an **increase of IDP arrivals**, in comparison to the numbers reported for October, as a result of heightened clashes and insecurity in Hama and Aleppo³, with 75% of all IDP arrivals in Idleb arriving from these governorates. While Idleb governorate also saw an **increase of IDP departures**, the majority of IDP departures intended to move to other communities within the governorate.
- Meanwhile, **Al-Hasakeh** governorate witnessed a **decrease in IDP arrivals** and an **increase in IDP departures**, compared to October, most likely as a result of a decreased number of clashes in Deir-ez-Zor governorate.

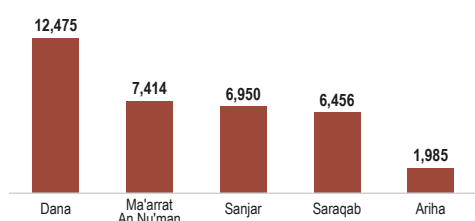

IDLEB GOVERNORATE

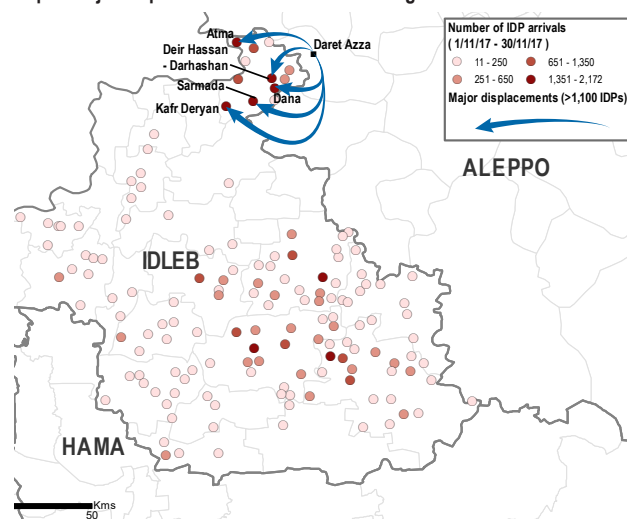


Figure 2: Five most common last sub-districts of departure of IDP arrivals (# IDPs)

Between 1 and 30 November, ISMI-covered communities in Idleb governorate witnessed the arrival of 43,085 IDPs, most commonly to Dana (12,475), Ma'arrat An Nu'man (7,414), Sanjar (6,950) and Saraqab (6,456) sub-districts (Figure 1). This marks an increase of IDP arrivals, compared to October, as a result of heightened clashes and insecurity, particularly in north-eastern Hama and north-western Aleppo governorates. Accordingly, the large majority of IDPs arrived from Hama and Aleppo governorates, most commonly from Daret Azza (11,954), As-Saan (9,300) and Oqeirbat (4,911) sub-districts (Figure 2). Meanwhile, 17,744 IDPs left ISMI-covered communities in Idleb, most commonly from Sanjar (6,140) and Dana (3,421), with the largest recorded movements being within Sanjar sub-district (1,455), from Dana to Haritan sub-district in Aleppo governorate (1,429) and within Badama sub-district (856).

Map 2: Major displacement to and across Idleb governorate⁵

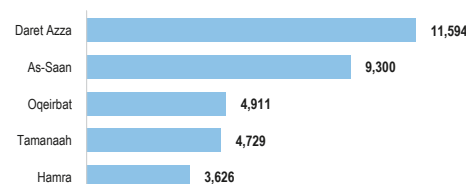
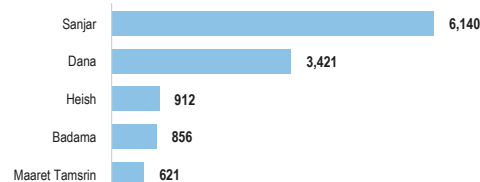


Figure 3: Sub-districts with the highest IDP departures (# IDPs)



ALEPPO GOVERNORATE (A'zaz sub-district)

Between 1 and 30 November, 2,994 IDPs arrived to ISMI-covered communities in Aleppo governorate in A'zaz sub-district, the majority of whom to Shamarin (2,360) and Shmarekh (285) community. Meanwhile, 644 IDPs were recorded departing ISMI-covered communities in A'zaz sub-district, all of whom from Shamarin (359), Shmarekh (262) and Kaljibrin (17) communities.

Figure 5: Most common last sub-districts of departure of IDP arrivals (# IDPs)⁶

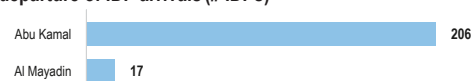


Figure 6: Sub-district with the highest IDP departures (# IDPs)

AL-HASAKEH GOVERNORATE

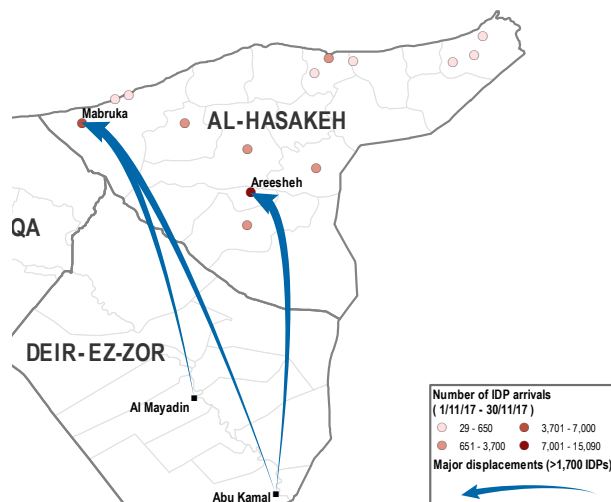


Figure 7: Al-Hasakeh sub-districts receiving the largest IDP arrivals (# IDPs)

Between 1 to 30 November, **ISMI-covered communities in Al-Hasakeh governorate witnessed the arrival of 32,741 IDPs**, most commonly to **Areesheh (17,027)**, **Ras Al Ain (7,142)** and **Shadadah (3,427)** sub-districts (Figure 7). IDPs, most commonly, arrived from **Deir-ez-Zor governorate (16,217)**, notably from Abu Kamal (9,237) and Al Mayadin (3,815) sub-districts. The number of IDP arrivals decreased, compared to October, as a result of the decreased clashes in Deir-ez-Zor governorate. Meanwhile, **71,187 IDPs left** ISMI-covered communities in Al-Hasakeh, two thirds of whom intended to move to other governorates, most commonly to **Aleppo (21,103)**, **Deir-ez-Zor (16,925)** and **Damascus (9,473)** governorates. Areesheh Camp (33,755), Mabruka Camp (8,322) and Al-Areesheh Council (5,016) saw the largest numbers of IDP departures.

Map 3: Major displacement to and across Al-Hasakeh governorate⁷

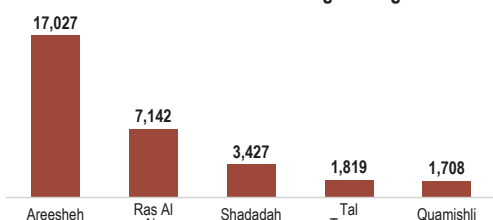


Figure 8: Five most common last sub-districts of departure of IDP arrivals (# IDPs)

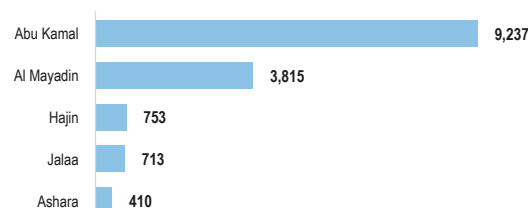
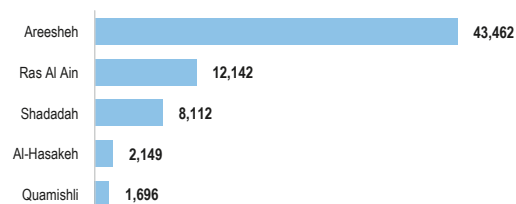


Figure 9: Sub-districts with the highest IDP departures (# IDPs)

About ISMI & This Factsheet

The **IDP Situation Monitoring Initiative (ISMI)** is an initiative of the Camp Coordination and Camp Management (CCCM) Cluster, implemented by REACH and supported by other cluster members.

Following a baseline assessment conducted between 23 October and 21 November 2016, weekly/bi-weekly data collection cycles have been initiated to provide regular updates on IDP movements. Based on 602 communities in the governorates of Aleppo (A'zaz sub-district), Al-Hasakeh and Idleb, this factsheet presents a summary of reported inward and outward movements of IDPs in the month of November 2017. **From 1 to 30 November 2017, such displacements were reported in 253 communities out of all ISMI-covered communities.**

Displacement was identified through an extensive key informant (KI) network, either through alerts initiated by KIs or follow-up by enumerators. A range of 2-3 KIs were interviewed in each community, while collected information was further triangulated through other sources, including CCCM member data and humanitarian updates. This approach allows for regular updates on IDP movements at a community level across ISMI coverage areas. However, movement updates are limited to areas covered by ISMI and there are, therefore, displacements that are not reported here.
