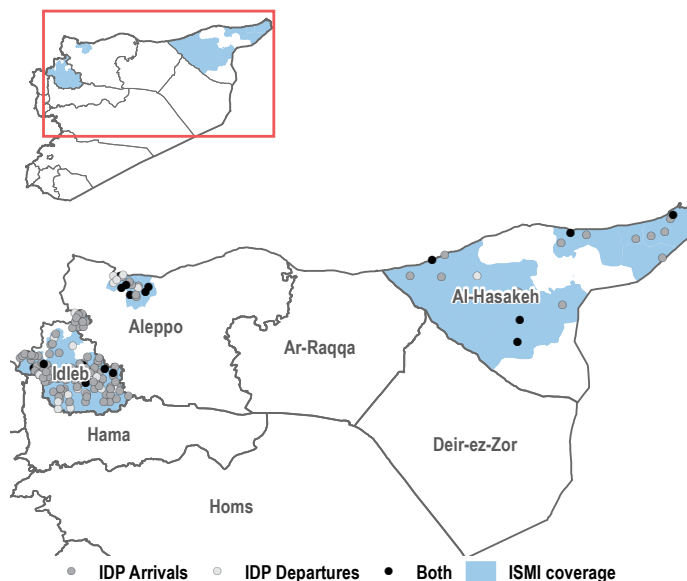


### OVERALL FINDINGS: 16-30 November

- 179 out of 602 ISMI-covered communities in Aleppo (A'zaz sub-district)<sup>2</sup>, Al-Hasakeh and Idleb governorates experienced inward or outward movement of IDPs.
- Idleb governorate saw an arrival of 24,975 IDPs, with the majority to Dana (9,441), Ma'arrat An Nu'man (4,962), Saraqab (3,261) and Sanjar (1,939) sub-districts.
- In parallel, Al-Hasakeh witnessed an arrival of 8,472 IDPs, primarily to Areesheh (3,307), Tal Tamer (1,739) and Ras Al Ain (1,220) sub-districts.
- A'zaz sub-district in Aleppo saw an arrival of 1,705 IDPs, most commonly to Sharmin (1,425) and Shmarekh (114) communities.

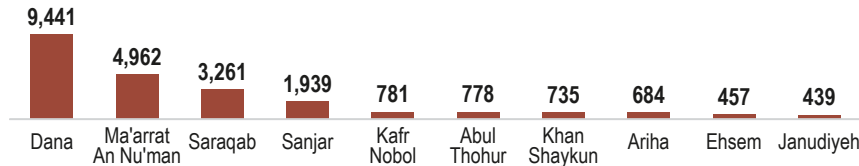

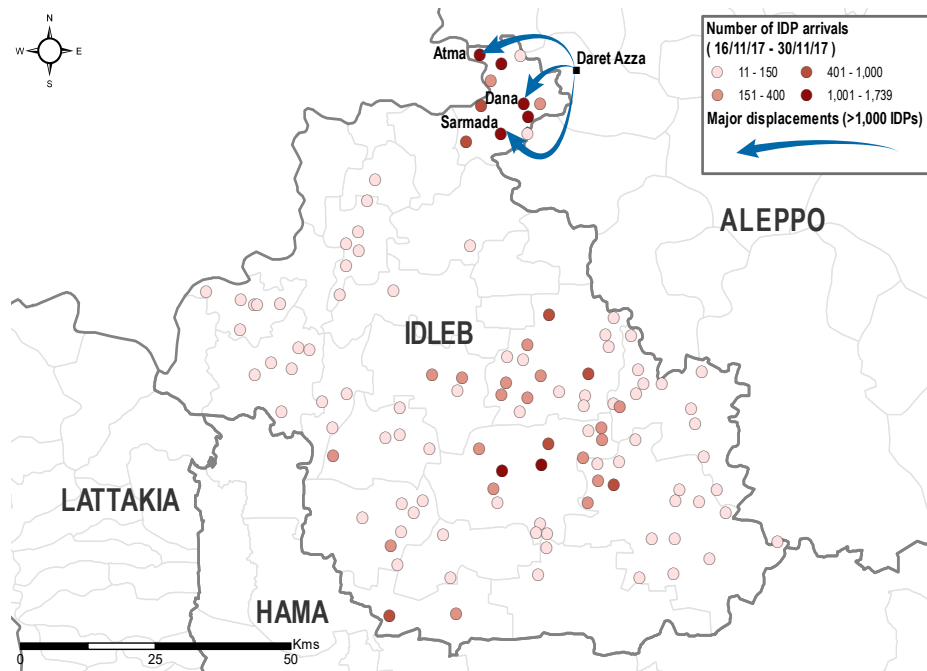
## IDLEB GOVERNORATE

Between 16 to 30 November, ISMI-covered communities in Idlib governorate witnessed the arrival of 24,975 IDPs, most commonly to Dana (9,441), Ma'arrat An Nu'man (4,962), Saraqab (3,261) and Sanjar (1,939) sub-districts (Figure 1). Meanwhile, 2,130 IDPs left ISMI-covered communities in Idlib, with the vast majority intending to move to other communities in Idlib governorate, most commonly to Badama (371), Ma'arrat An Nu'man (291) and Maaret Tamsrin (279) sub-districts.

Figure 2: Five most common last sub-districts of departure of IDP arrivals (# IDPs)

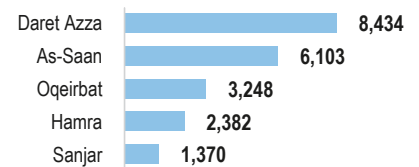


Figure 3: Five ISMI-covered communities receiving largest IDP arrivals (# IDPs)



## ALEPPO GOVERNORATE (A'zaz sub-district)

Between 16 to 30 November, 1,705 IDPs arrived to ISMI-covered communities in Aleppo governorate in A'zaz sub-district, the majority of whom to Shamarin (1,425) community (Figure 6). Meanwhile, 176 IDPs were recorded departing ISMI-covered communities in A'zaz sub-district, all of whom from Shamarin (125), Shmarekh (34) and Kaljibrin (17) communities.

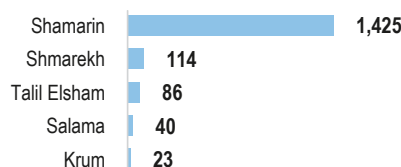
Figure 4: Al-Hasakeh sub-district receiving IDP arrivals (# IDPs)

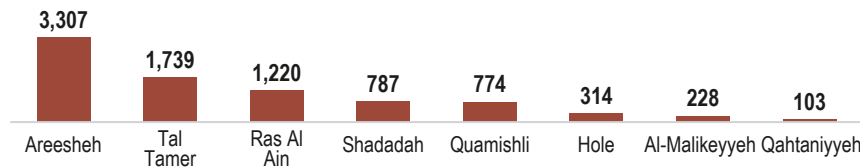

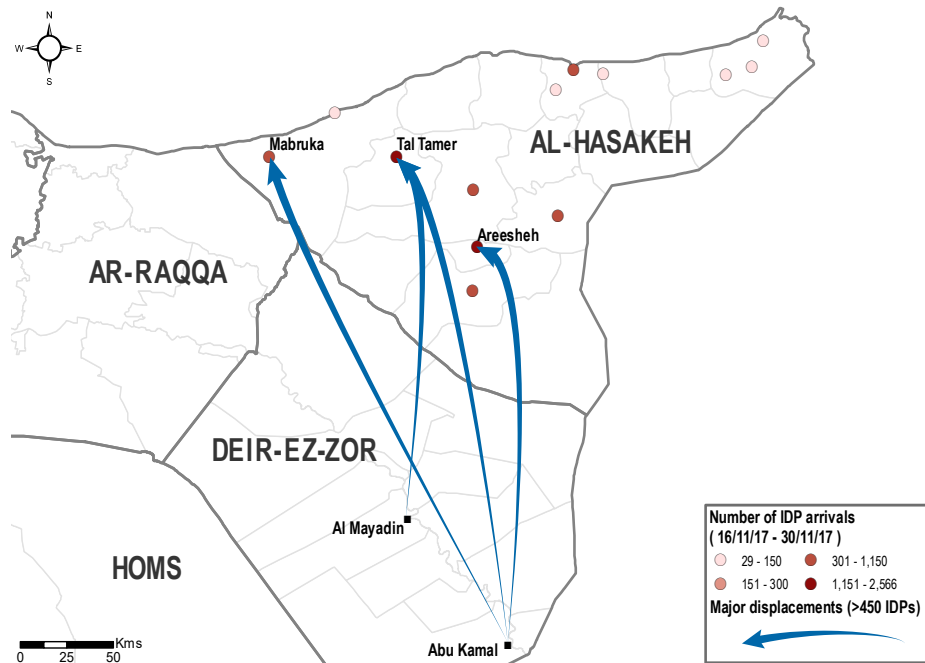
### AL-HASAKEH GOVERNORATE

Between 16 to 30 November, ISMI-covered communities in Al-Hasakeh governorate witnessed the arrival of 8,472 IDPs, most commonly to Areeshah (3,307), Tal Tamer (1,739) and Ras Al Ain (1,220) sub-districts (Figure 7). Meanwhile, 43,829 IDPs left ISMI-covered communities in Al-Hasakeh, with the vast majority leaving to other governorates, most commonly to Aleppo (12,415), Deir Ez-Zor (11,250) and Damascus (9,416) governorates.

Figure 8: Five most common last sub-districts of departure of IDP arrivals (# IDPs)

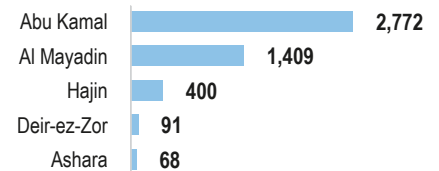
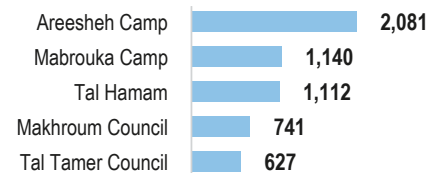


Figure 9: Five ISMI-covered communities receiving largest IDP arrivals (# IDPs)



### About ISMI & This Factsheet

The IDP Situation Monitoring Initiative (ISMI) is an initiative of the Camp Coordination and Camp Management (CCCM) Cluster, implemented by REACH and supported by other cluster members.

Following a baseline assessment conducted between 23 October and 21 November 2016, weekly/bi-weekly data collection cycles have been initiated to provide regular updates on IDP movements. Based on 602 communities in the governorates of Aleppo (A'zaz sub-district), Al-Hasakeh and Idleb, this factsheet presents a summary of reported inward and outward movements of IDPs in the month of November 2017. **From 16 to 30 November 2017, such displacements were reported in 179 communities out of all ISMI-covered communities.**

Displacement was identified through an extensive key informant (KI) network, either through alerts initiated by KIs or follow-up by enumerators. A range of 2-3 KIs were interviewed in each community, while collected information was further triangulated through other sources, including CCCM member data and humanitarian updates. This approach allows for regular updates on IDP movements at a community level across ISMI coverage areas. However, movement updates are limited to areas covered by ISMI and there are, therefore, displacements that are not reported here.
