<b>General Objective</b>	The general objective of the assessment is to provide information on the influx of Syrian refugees crossing the Syria-Iraq border into the Kurdistan Region of Iraq (KR-I). The assessment aims to inform and provide an evidence-base for humanitarian planning by UNHCR and relevant actors in the Syrian refugee response through up-to-date information on demographics, needs and displacement history of the people crossing from Syria into Iraq, including particularly Syrian refugees recently displaced or re-entering the KR-I.

## 2. Rationale

### 2.1. Rationale

When the Turkish military operation in Northeast Syria (NES) escalated in October 2019, the associated conflict and humanitarian crisis in Syria resulted in mass displacement, both internally and, to a lesser extent, towards the Kurdistan Region in Iraq (KR-I). Reportedly, several challenges were met during the first weeks of the influx, due to the relative large number of new arrivals, 720 individuals daily average in October 2019. By January 2020, the average daily arrival rate fell to about 42 individuals.<sup>1</sup>

As the numbers of arrivals peaked in the weeks after the Turkish operation was launched, REACH conducted daily monitoring at the border, with weekly updates produced to inform planning and response. As the numbers of arrivals decreased, daily monitoring continued, with outputs being decreased first to a weekly schedule and finally biweekly. These activities were conducted between October 2019 and March 2020. Equally, in October-November 2019, REACH also supported UNHCR and partners with assessments of the Bardarash (re-opened to host the new arrivals) and Gawilan (extended with a new transit site) refugee camps, to which new arrivals were initially taken.

On 2 March 2020, the Iraqi government announced the closure of all land borders as a preventative measure to control the spread of COVID-19, and by doing so curtailed the movement of Syrians across the border into the KR-I.<sup>2</sup> By mid-September 2020, the Syrian border reportedly began opening on a weekly basis for specified and limited movement, specifically: family reunification (brides); medical cases (cancer); 'emergency cases' permitted on humanitarian grounds; and, European passport holders transiting through Iraq to a European location within 72 hours.<sup>3</sup> By November 2020, the border was opened for Syrian refugees in these categories to cross on Sundays, Tuesdays and Thursdays.

Building on the previous border monitoring and camp assessments conducted by REACH in 2019 and early 2020, daily border monitoring in partnership with UNHCR will resume at the end of November 2020 with data collection twice a week on Sundays and Thursdays. To inform and provide an evidence-base for humanitarian planning it is important to capture the demographics, needs and displacement history of the people crossing from Syria into Iraq. This assessment will monitor the demographics, intentions, and needs of Syrian refugees recently displaced or re-entering the Kurdistan Region of Iraq (KR-I).

### 2.1. Methodology overview

The assessment will employ a quantitative approach for primary data collection, using a structured tool to conduct individual interviews, which will build on secondary data. The individual interview questionnaire will be comprised of open-ended and closed questions.

Structured interviews will be comprised of closed and open-ended questions to identify movement history, intentions (location of displacement in KRI, Iraq or another country), needs and vulnerabilities. Individual interviews will be conducted in-person by REACH enumerators, who will have been trained in COVID-19 prevention measures (personal protective equipment worn at all times (gloves, mask), social distance, interviews conducted in open air spaces as far as possible).<sup>4</sup> Interviews will be conducted in Kurdish, with the tool translated into Arabic (bilingual form). Data will be directly inputted by the enumerator into the KoBo form.

Respondents will be selected using a purposive sampling method, selecting Syrian refugees crossing the border from Syria into KR-I. Each enumerator (6 total)<sup>5</sup> will aim for six to seven interviews per day. While authorities have specified specific groups with permission to cross the border into KRI (such as brides/grooms (family reunification); cancer patients (medical reasons); 'emergency cases' permitted on humanitarian grounds; and, European passport holders transiting through Iraq to a European location within 72 hours),<sup>6</sup> respondents will be asked to self-identify to cross-reference motivations against official groupings.

Once the data collection process is completed, analysis will be carried out to identify trends, and by identifying themes, commonalities and comparisons with secondary data and former interview rounds. This will feed directly in to the production of a weekly Fact Sheet with a situational overview for each assessment round.

## 2.2. Population of interest

Data will be collected close to the Syrian-Iraq border in order to capture the demographics, needs and displacement history of those people crossing from Syria into Iraq. The specific geographical locations where data collection will be employed are Fishkabour border crossing points and Al Walid, Sahila, and Kalhi villages located close to the Syrian border.

The population of interest will cover people crossing the border from Syria into the KR-I framed in two groups:

- Newly arriving refugees from Syria
- Syrian refugees re-entering the KR-I after having crossed back into Syria

The amount of interviews conducted will depend on the influx of people at the border post, aiming for 25-50 interviews per round. The target will be Syrian refugees crossing the Syria-Iraq border into KR-I, either newly arriving or re-entering into Iraq.

## 2.3. Secondary data review

A secondary data review (SDR) will be conducted at the inception of the project, and again during every assessment cycle in order to support the implementation of primary data collection, analysis and to operationalization of findings. Sources will include, but not be limited to:

## 2.4. Primary Data Collection

A structured survey in English, translated into Arabic (bilingual form) to facilitate the data collection by Arabic speaking enumerators, will be used to interview Syrian refugees crossing the Iraq-Syrian border into the KR-I. Interviews will be conducted in Kurdish or Arabic, depending on the comfort level of the respondent. Data will be directly inputted into the form in Arabic by the enumerators. This tool, uploaded on KoBo, covers: the route travelled by people displacing to or re-entering Iraq from Syria; displacement history, routes and issues encountered; demographics; registration and civil documentation; push and pull factors; impact of COVID-19 on travel, intention and related needs; assistance needs; and, short and longer-term intentions.

A purposive sampling method will be deployed, targeting Syrian refugees as they cross into Iraq. The sample size will depend on the amount of people arriving at the border and the amount of days a week the border will be open for people to cross.<sup>7</sup>

Before the start of data collection enumerators will be trained by the assessment officer and field coordinator on the purpose of the interview and the questionnaire. Feedback on the tool will be incorporated before the start of data collection and after the pilot round of data collection to optimize the questionnaire.

Enumerators will conduct data collection close to the Syrian border at major border crossing points, collecting data by using KoBo tool uploaded on to a phone from REACH. Interviews will be uploaded directly on the UNHCR KOBO server and downloaded by the Assessment Officer (AO) for cleaning and analysis at the end of each day of data collection. Debriefs over phone with the field manager and enumerators will take place over phone the day following each day of data collection to check inconsistency in data, and interesting, sensitive or unclear findings.

## 2.5. Data Processing & Analysis

The AO will proceed with the data cleaning for the quantitative data generated through individual interviews following each round of data collection (day). On a weekly basis, the data will be synthesized and organized in line with the quantitative data analysis framework, comprising combined data from two rounds of data collection. Data will be analyzed through R programming, which will feed directly in to the production of a Factsheet. Data will be triangulated with secondary sources and relevant information provided by UNHCR if available.

## 7. Information REACH

The REACH Initiative (REACH) was formed in 2010 as a joint initiative of IMPACT Initiatives (IMPACT), its sister organization the French INGO ACTED, and the United Nations Operational Satellite Applications Programme (UNOSAT), in order to promote and facilitate the development of information products that enhance the humanitarian community's decision making and planning capacity. REACH is response for supporting humanitarian coordination mechanisms through non-proprietary information that can be shared across organizations.

IMPACT, the lead organization in the IMPACT programme, is a leading Geneva-based not-for-profit association created in 2010 in order to promote more effective aid action and practices. IMPACT's programs currently operate in over 20 countries (including Syria, Turkey, Jordan, Lebanon and Iraq) with the support of more than 45 Geneva based staff, 175+ international staff deployed on the ground, as well as more than 350 national assessment and GIS staff. Staff expertise covers a broad range of areas including general managers, technical specialists (e.g. assessments, GIS, IT, database, communications), support staff (HR, finance, logistics, security), etc. IMPACT hosts the REACH Global team in its Geneva HQ, is in charge of the HR management of all international REACH staff, strategic and programmatic oversight, as well as the validation and dissemination of reports and external relations at the global level.

As sister organisations, linked through their global governance structures, IMPACT and ACTED coordinate on field implementation. In the framework of their global partnership (formalised through a global MoU and various project-specific grant agreements), ACTED provides operational support to REACH programs (office space, cars, accommodation, national HR recruitment, security, in-country registration etc.). This partnership allows REACH teams in-country to reduce operational support requirements by sharing, for example, financial and logistical management staff with ACTED.

### REACH in Iraq

Since 2012, REACH has contributed to inform the humanitarian response in Iraq for both the refugee and IDP crises, conducting household and community-level assessments in over 1900 communities across 12 governorates. Through the course of these activities, REACH has supported humanitarian planning and information management at both strategic and operational levels, providing information products in order to inform overall humanitarian strategy and national level coordination, as well as enhance capacities of humanitarian actors to respond to specific needs in specific contexts. The information products developed by REACH, in addition to field-level dissemination, are published through different online portals accessed by the humanitarian community such as the dedicated Iraq operations page of humanitarianresponse.info,<sup>8</sup> as well as on its own website.<sup>9</sup>
