

OVERALL FINDINGS:

29 MAY - 30 JUNE 2017

Between 29 May and 30 June, 448 ISMI-covered communities experienced inward or outward movement of IDPs¹. While all covered governorates received fewer arrivals in June (58,406) compared to the month of May (101,175), the overall number of departures across all governorates increased by 39% (21,185).

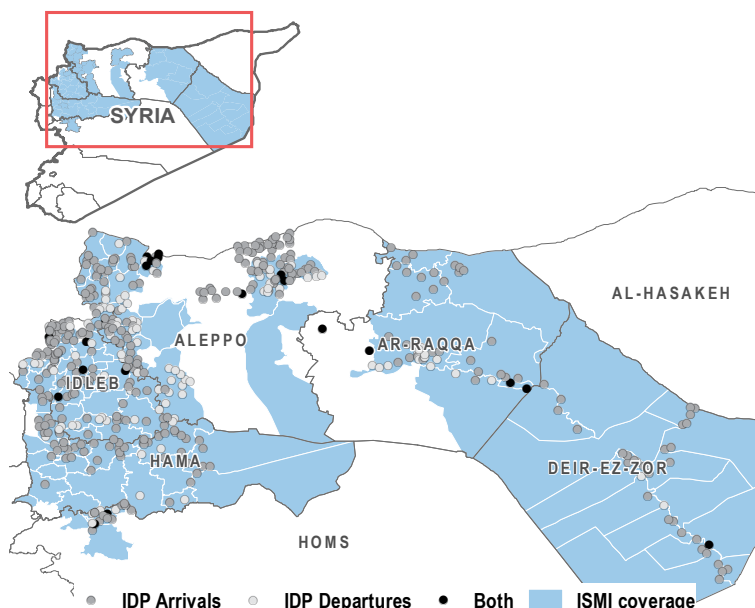

Figure 1: Reported IDP arrivals by governorate (%)

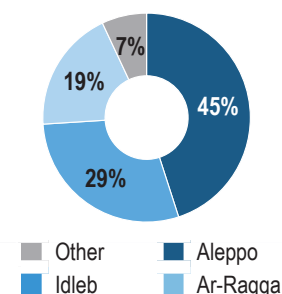


Figure 2: Most common sub-districts of origin of reported IDP arrivals (%)

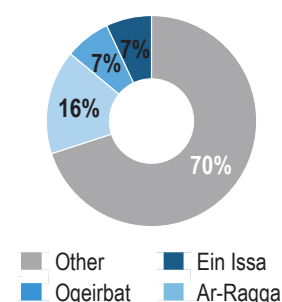
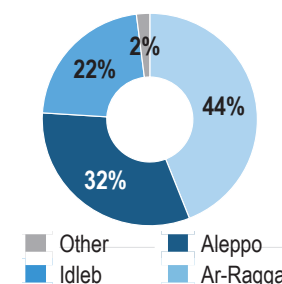

AR-RAQQA GOVERNORATE

NUMBERS AT A GLANCE

76% of recorded IDP arrivals in Ar-Raqqa were displaced from within the governorate.

51% of all recorded IDP arrivals originated from communities in Ar-Raqqa sub-district.

Map 1: Major displacements within and to Ar-Raqqa governorate

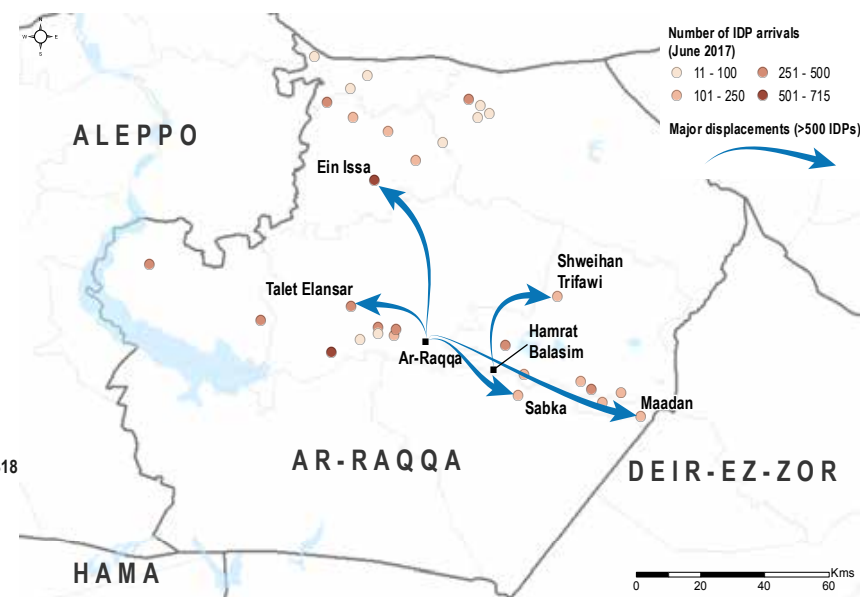
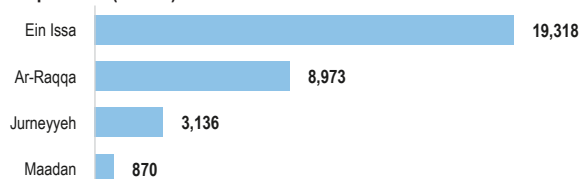


Figure 4: Ar-Raqqa sub-districts with the highest IDP departures (# IDPs)



Escalating conflict across Ar-Raqqa governorate resulted in 32,973 IDP departures from ISMI-covered communities during June 2017³, 5,800 fewer than the previous month. The majority (86%) of the departures were from Ein Issa (19,318) and Ar-Raqqa (8,973) sub-districts (Maps 1 and 2). IDPs from Ein Issa reportedly intended to travel to Kalta (2,850) and Abbara (1,425) communities in Ar-Raqqa sub-district, or to Menbij (1,425) community in the governorate of Aleppo. A total of 11,013 IDPs were recorded arriving to ISMI-covered communities in Ar-Raqqa governorate. Karama (4,018), Ar-Raqqa (2,285) and Ein Issa (1,557) sub-districts received more than 70% of the total number of arrivals in Ar-Raqqa. Displacement in the governorate remains localised, with the majority of arrivals originating from within the governorate itself, and almost all of them travelling from Ar-Raqqa sub-district northwards to Ein Issa or within Ar-Raqqa sub-district.

Figure 5: Most common sub-districts of origin of IDP arrivals (# IDPs)

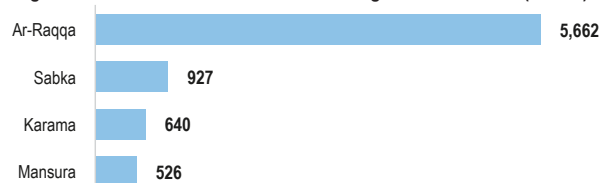
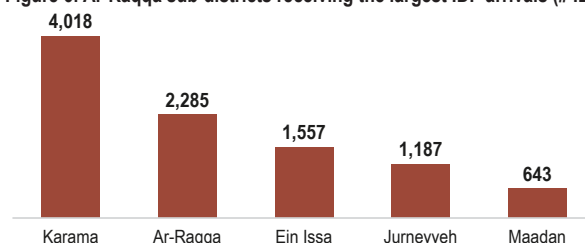


Figure 6: Ar-Raqqa sub-districts receiving the largest IDP arrivals (# IDPs)



HOMS GOVERNORATE

As in previous months, displacement in ISMI-covered areas of Homs remained limited in comparison to other governorates. The number of IDP arrivals (231) dropped by more than 50% compared to May (515). IDP arrivals were reported in Talbiseh (107), Ar-Rastan (89) and Homs (35) sub-districts (Figure 7), and largely originated from within Homs governorate itself (Figure 9). The total number of departures from ISMI-covered communities in Homs (226) continues to decrease for the third month in a row.⁴

Figure 7: Homs sub-districts receiving IDP arrivals (# IDPs)

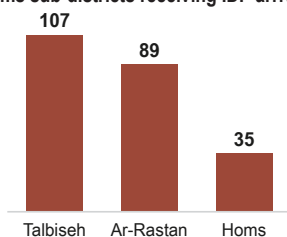
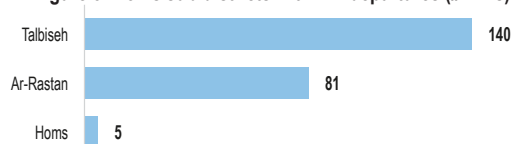


Figure 8: Homs sub-districts with IDP departures (# IDPs)

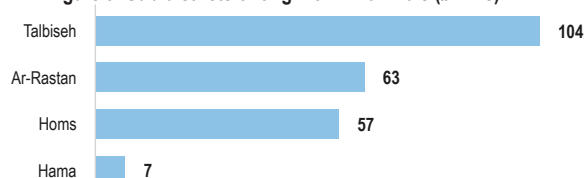

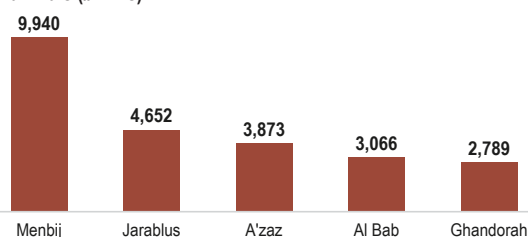

A total of 26,404 IDPs arrived to ISMI-covered Aleppo communities in June, 25% less compared to the previous month. Meanwhile, the number of departures increased by 44%, reaching 24,188 IDPs. Reportedly, 43% of IDPs intended to travel to communities inside Aleppo, including Menbij (3,691), Al-Khafsa (1,215), and Al Bab (1,678) sub-districts. The largest numbers of arrivals came from the neighbouring governorate of Ar-Raqqa (8,270), specifically from Ein Issa (4,278) and Ar-Raqqa (2,256) communities. Large numbers of arrivals also originated in Oqeirbat (3,164) sub-district in Hama governorate as well as in communities within Aleppo governorate (6,661).

Figure 11: Aleppo sub-districts with the highest IDP departures (# IDPs)

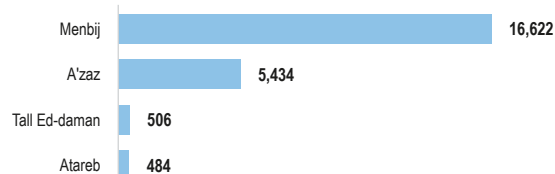


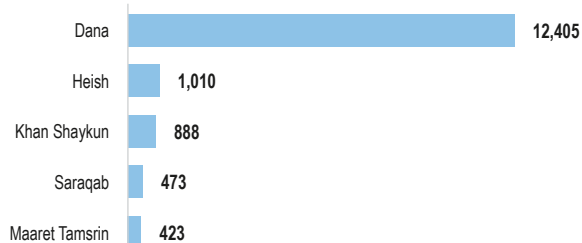
Figure 12: Most common sub-districts of origin of IDP arrivals (# IDPs)



IDLEB GOVERNORATE

During June 2017, 16,933 IDPs were recorded arriving to ISMI-covered communities in Idlib governorate, while almost the same number (16,675) departed from the area. Most IDPs arrived to the communities of Khan Shaykun (4,398), Dana (3,073) and Tamanaah (1,560), and reportedly a large majority originated from outside Idlib governorate. Most IDP departures were from Dana sub-district (12,405), in particular Qah (5,019), Atma Camp (3,250) and Dana (1,383) communities, and intended to travel to Kafr Nobol (1,525), Madiq Castle (1,405) and Khan Shaykun (610) sub-districts.

Figure 14: Most common sub-districts of origin of IDP arrivals (# IDPs)

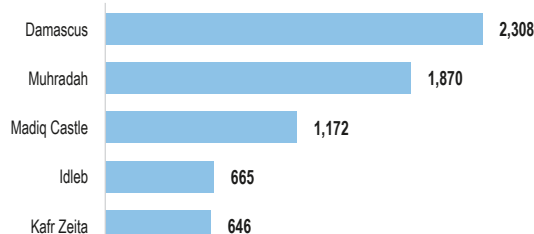
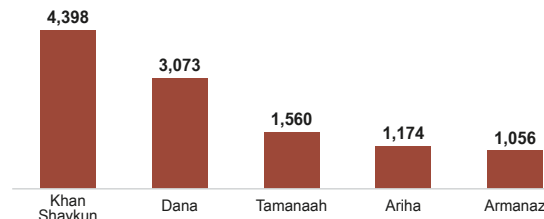


Figure 15: Most common Idlib sub-districts receiving IDP arrivals (# IDPs)



DEIR-EZ-ZOR GOVERNORATE

A total of 1,704 IDPs arrived to ISMI-covered communities in Deir-ez-Zor in June, including Sur (444), Al Mayadin (307) and Abu Kamal (302) communities. The majority were displaced from outside the governorate, in particular from **Ar-Raqqa (640)** sub-district. While the number of arrivals decreased, the number of IDP departures from ISMI-covered communities increased to 1,164, compared to 476 in May. More than half of the departures were from the communities of **Jazaret Elbuhmeid (144)**, **Hajin (130)**, **Shmeitieh (126)**, **Shate (125)** and **Dweir (105)**.

Figure 16: Five Deir-ez-Zor sub-districts with the highest IDP departures (# IDPs)

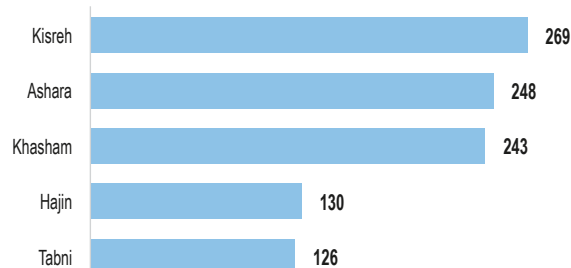


Figure 18: Most common sub-districts of origin of IDP arrivals (# IDPs)

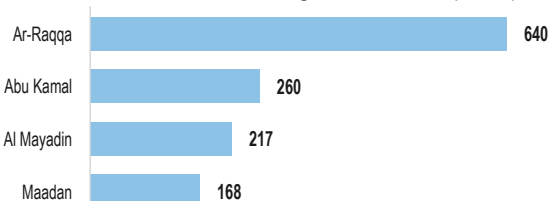
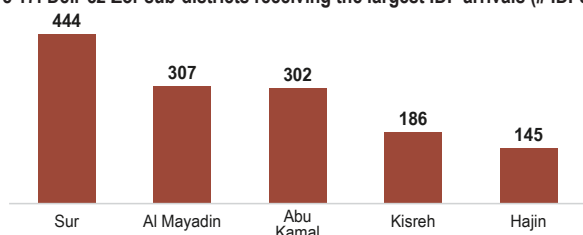


Figure 17: Deir-ez-Zor sub-districts receiving the largest IDP arrivals (# IDPs)



HAMA GOVERNORATE

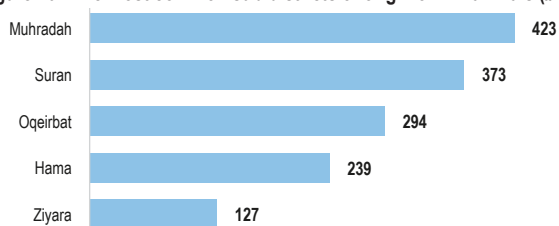
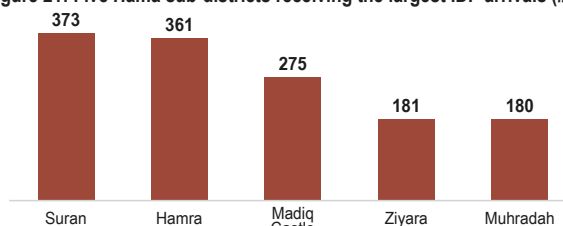


Figure 21: Five Hama sub-districts receiving the largest IDP arrivals (# IDPs)

A total of 2,121 IDPs were recorded arriving to ISMI-covered communities in Hama governorate during the reporting period, almost the same number as in May (2,147). IDPs most commonly arrived in **Suran (373)**, **Hamra (361)** and **Madiq Castle (275)** sub-districts (Figure 21). Meanwhile, **567 IDPs were recorded leaving ISMI-covered communities**, a 39% decline compared to the previous month. The majority of them intended to travel within Hama governorate (389), particularly to **Oqeirbat (135)**, **Madiq Castle (110)** and **Hama (72)** sub-districts.

Figure 20: Five most common sub-districts of origin of IDP arrivals (# IDPs) Hama

About ISMI & This Factsheet

The **IDP Situation Monitoring Initiative (ISMI)** is an initiative of the Camp Coordination and Camp Management (CCCM) Cluster, which incorporates data collected by cluster members, **REACH** and **Syria Relief Network (SRN)**.

Following a baseline assessment conducted between 23 October and 21 November 2016, weekly/bi-weekly data collection cycles have been initiated to provide regular updates on IDP movements. Based on 1,183 communities in the governorates of Aleppo, Ar-Raqqa, Deir-ez-Zor, Hama, Homs and Idleb during the baseline, this factsheet presents a summary of reported inward and outward movements of IDPs in the month of June 2017. **From 29 May to 30 June 2017, such displacements were reported in 448 communities out of all ISMI-covered communities.**

Displacement was identified through an extensive key informant (KI) network, either through alerts initiated by KIs or follow-up by enumerators. A range of two to three KIs were interviewed in each community, **while information collected is triangulated with CCCM member data and humanitarian updates.** This approach allows for regular updates on IDP movements at a community level across areas assessed. As coverage is not across all potentially affected areas, there are displacements that are not reported on here.
