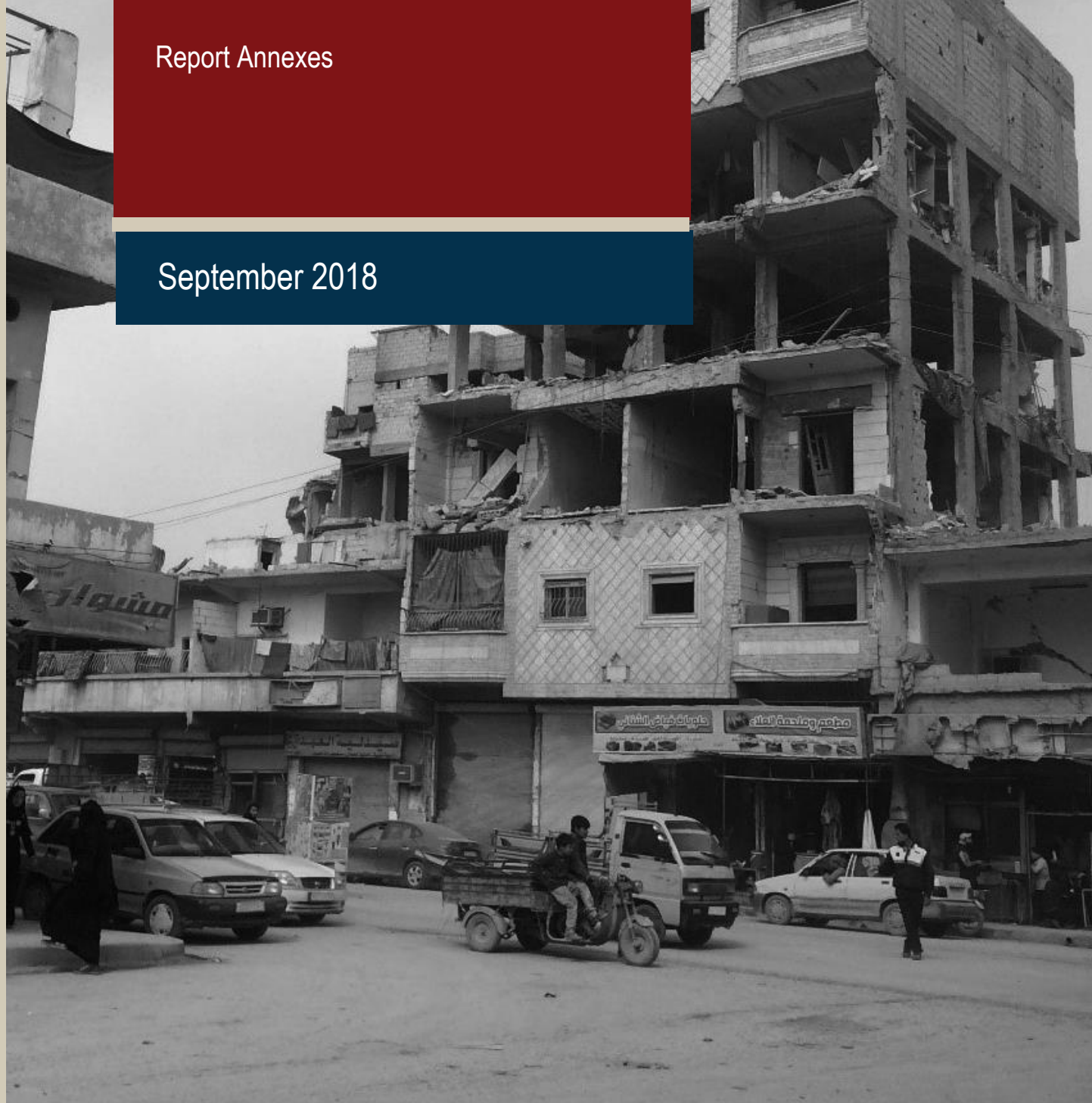

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INTRODUCTION

Seven years into the Syrian crisis, continued unrest and conflict has caused 5.5 million Syrians to flee the country.¹ Within Syria, 6.1 million people have been internally displaced, and an estimated 13.1 million are in need of humanitarian assistance.² Between August 2017 and August 2018, over 1 million displacements were recorded by the Camp Coordination and Camp Management (CCCM) Cluster, from areas in northern and southern Syria (as of 31 July 2018).³ The ongoing unstable security and access conditions for civilians impact shelter conditions, as well as Non-Food Item (NFI) availability, accessibility and affordability across the Whole of Syria (WoS). While an estimated 4.2 million people reportedly require shelter assistance, 4.7 million are in need of NFI assistance (Humanitarian Needs Overview (HNO) 2018).⁴ In 2018, increased clashes in the south forced over 10,000 individuals to evacuate from southwest Syria to Idlib governorate in particular, as well as to other parts of north-west Syria. However, security in this region remains highly volatile.⁵ Indeed, the UN estimated in August 2018 that if fighting were to escalate in north-west Syria, around 200,000 to 700,000 people could be displaced.⁶ However, the ability to plan and implement an adequate response is hindered by the limited information on humanitarian needs and vulnerabilities.

Critical information gaps remain on Shelter/NFI adequacy, affordability, needs and support, and coping strategies. Although intermediate assessments have been conducted by the Shelter/NFI Cluster members, only two annual and comprehensive Shelter/NFI assessments have been conducted across opposition-held areas of Syria.⁷

To strengthen sectoral evidence-based response planning by humanitarian actors in Syria for the upcoming year, REACH consequently led a comprehensive Shelter/NFI assessment from June – August 2018, in partnership with the Shelter and NFI Cluster Turkey Hub based in Gaziantep and with support from the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR).

This assessment builds on Shelter/NFI assessments carried out in December 2016 and July 2017 and covers accessible opposition-held areas in the governorates of Aleppo, Ar-Raqqa, Deir-ez-Zor, Hama and Idlib. The objective is to provide accurate and up-to-date information on NFI availability, accessibility and affordability, as well as shelter conditions across the whole of Syria. Data will be made available to inform the Humanitarian Needs Overview (HNO) 2019.

The assessment findings answer the following research questions in the corresponding section:

Demographics and displacement - Are there disparities in the shelter/NFI situation and needs of populations living in different areas across Syria, between governorates, sub-districts and urban/rural areas?;

Shelter - What is the current shelter adequacy and status of populations living in Syria? And What are the shelter needs of populations living in Syria?;

NFIs - What is the current availability and access to NFIs of populations living in Syria?; and, What are the NFI needs of populations living in Syria?;

Comparisons with July 2017 findings - relevant and comparable Shelter/NFI survey questions; and

Comparison of findings to Humanitarian Response Plan (HRP) – relevant and comparable response priorities, strategies, activities and indicators

METHODOLOGY

Methodology Overview

The assessment used a mixed methodology to gather data on as wide an area as possible, conducting surveys in both directly accessible and remotely accessible areas of Syria. Access and security allowed for direct data collection through randomly selected household interviews in 35 sub-districts. In the 19 sub-districts where direct data collection was not feasible, data was collected through remote interviews of key informants (KI), with purposively sampled members of the community. Research questions and indicators were designed in collaboration with the Shelter and NFI Cluster Turkey Hub based in Gaziantep and UNHCR.

Population of Interest

This assessment focused on all populations in opposition-controlled areas of Syria, including IDPs in camps, informal sites and host communities, as well as spontaneous returnees (SRs) and resident populations. Only heads of households (or consenting adults above the age of 18) and KIs aged 18 and over were interviewed.

To align with UNHCR definitions, the populations of interest in this assessment are defined as follows:

Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs): Persons or groups of persons who have been forced or obliged to flee or to leave their homes or places of habitual residence, in particular as a result of or in order to avoid the effects of armed conflict, situations of generalized violence, violations of human rights or natural or human-made disasters, and who have not crossed an internationally recognized State border.⁸

Spontaneous Returns (SR): Persons or groups of persons who decide to repatriate voluntarily.⁹

Resident Population (RP): Formerly known as “Host Community”, this is the resident population of a community who have not been displaced for longer than 24 hours during the crisis (since 2011).

Where GIS sampling is not possible, to ensure that surveys are spread across the community, neighbourhood boundaries can be used to split the community and enumerators instructed to conduct an equal number of surveys in each neighbourhood. Pre-defined neighbourhood boundaries can be used, or participatory mapping used to determine them. Where neighbourhood boundaries are unknown and it is not possible to define them through participatory mapping, Google Earth / satellite maps can be used to split the community into equally sized sectors (e.g. 4 sectors) and enumerators instructed to conduct an equal number of surveys in each sector.

Within each sector or neighbourhood, enumerators should use randomisation methods to access households across the neighbourhood.

Find a random point: through randomly generated directions from the Field Coordinator in the form of a series of left-right turns (e.g. take the first left, first right, second right). These can also be generated in the field by enumerators using a series of coin flips (or in the absence of coins, writing L and R on two pieces of paper, folding them, closing eyes and selecting one).

Spread surveys randomly across the neighbourhood/sector: do not stick to a few streets close to the first location chosen. If the neighbourhood is large, travel across it and find a new point through randomly generated L/R directions.

Do not survey a house which is fewer than 5 houses away from a previously surveyed house.

Always, after reaching a random point, select a household by spinning a pen and access the closest household in the direction of the pen-point.

Option B: accessing random locations with little prior knowledge of the community

Where it is not possible to access maps of targeted locations, or it is not possible to ensure that enumerators can access or use such maps, enumerators will be instructed to spread the sample across the community when in the field, assisted by the field coordinator. This involves:

Finding a random point in the community: once the community boundary has been entered, drive to a random point through randomly generated directions from the Field Coordinator. This can be in the form of a series of left-right turns (e.g. take the first left, first right, second right etc) which can also be generated in the field by enumerators using a series of coin flips (or in the absence of coins, writing L and R on two pieces of paper, folding them, closing eyes and selecting one). Alternatively, enumerators could walk/drive for a random number of minutes in any direction.

After the first household has been surveyed, find another random point. Surveys should be spread across the community: do not stick to a few streets close to the first household surveyed. If the community is large, travel across it and find a new point through randomly generated L/R directions.

Determining the approximate size of the community beforehand is particularly useful: even if maps cannot be brought into or used in the field, online maps can be used to determine the size of the community to give enumerators an idea of how far they should be spreading points (e.g. if the community is 1km wide, and 2 surveys are required, drive around 500m before finding another random point).

Do not survey a house which is fewer than 5 houses away from a previously surveyed house.

Always, after reaching a random point, select a household by spinning a pen and access the closest household in the direction of the pen-point.

This option is appropriate where due to resource, security or capacity constraints, it is not possible to communicate any form of map to enumerators, and enumerators are unable to obtain or use maps whilst in the field. It is also appropriate where communities are small and/or only a small number of surveys are required in the community.

Specific instructions will depend on the size of the community and the number of surveys targeted in that particular community. For example, if only two surveys are required, enumerators should access a random point on one side of the community before travelling to the other side of the community and accessing another random point. If twenty surveys are required, they should be instructed to aim to do ten in what they perceive as half of the community, and ten in the other half of the community.

Annex 4: Key Informant Confidence Level

Continuous variables

With continuous variables, this is reflected in an aggregated value that is closer to the value provided by the KI with the highest CL:

$$\frac{(KI1 \times CL1) + (KI2 \times CL2) + (KI3 \times CL3)}{(CL1 + CL2 + CL3)}$$

Example: Estimated minimum number of IDPs arriving in the village/neighbourhood during the previous month?

$$\text{Example: } \frac{(10,000 \times 1) + (25,000 \times 1) + (100,000 \times 3)}{(1 + 1 + 3)} = 72,500$$

Categorical variables

With **categorical variables**, the most common response will be selected. When the “most common” response cannot be identified, one of the three following scenarios depending on how many categories can be selected for a question:

Select one

Example: On average, over the past three months, has average rent in the community increased, decreased or stayed the same?

Answers from the different questionnaires are aggregated by identifying the answer provided 1) most often and 2) with the highest confidence level.

The following steps are used to aggregate records from multiple participants into one community- or neighbourhood-level record:

Create binary variables for each of the categories (for instance, 1 = True or Yes, 0 = False or No).
Replace the ‘1’ in each binary variable with the value of the confidence level that was assigned to each response (for instance, if a KI answers “True” to a question for which they have been assigned a confidence level of 3, their “True” response for that question would be assigned the number 3).
Sum the confidence level scores for each category of responses to identify the category with the highest score.
Assign the category with the highest score to the community-level record.
If multiple answers are found to have the same top score, the answer with the highest individual CL is retained.¹³

Select top 3

Example: What are the top 3 NFI needs of the following groups in your community?

Answers from the different questionnaires will be aggregated by identifying the top 3 categories that were provided most often and with the highest confidence level.

The following steps will be followed to aggregate individual records into one village level record:

Create binary variables for each of the categories (for instance, 1 = True or Yes, 0 = False or No). Replace the '1' in each binary variable with the value of the confidence level that was assigned to each response (for instance, if a KI answers "True" to a question for which they have been assigned a confidence level of 3, their "True" response for that question would be assigned the number 3). Sum the confidence level scores for each category of responses to identify the categories with the highest scores.

Assign the categories with the 3 highest scores to the community-level record.

If more than 3 categories are found to have identical scores, the answers with the highest individual CLs are retained.¹⁴

Select all that apply

Example: What are the most common adequacy issues faced?

Answers from each submitted questionnaire should all be retained in the final aggregated village level record.

Sub-district-level or higher aggregation

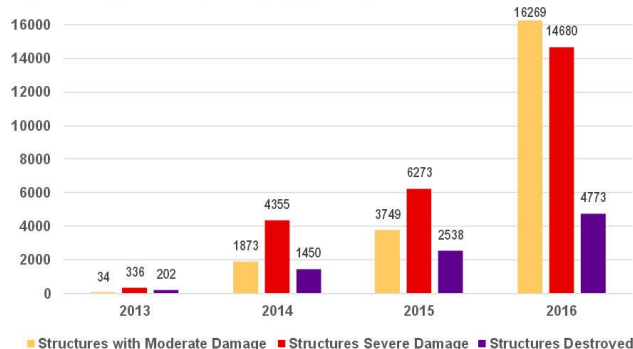
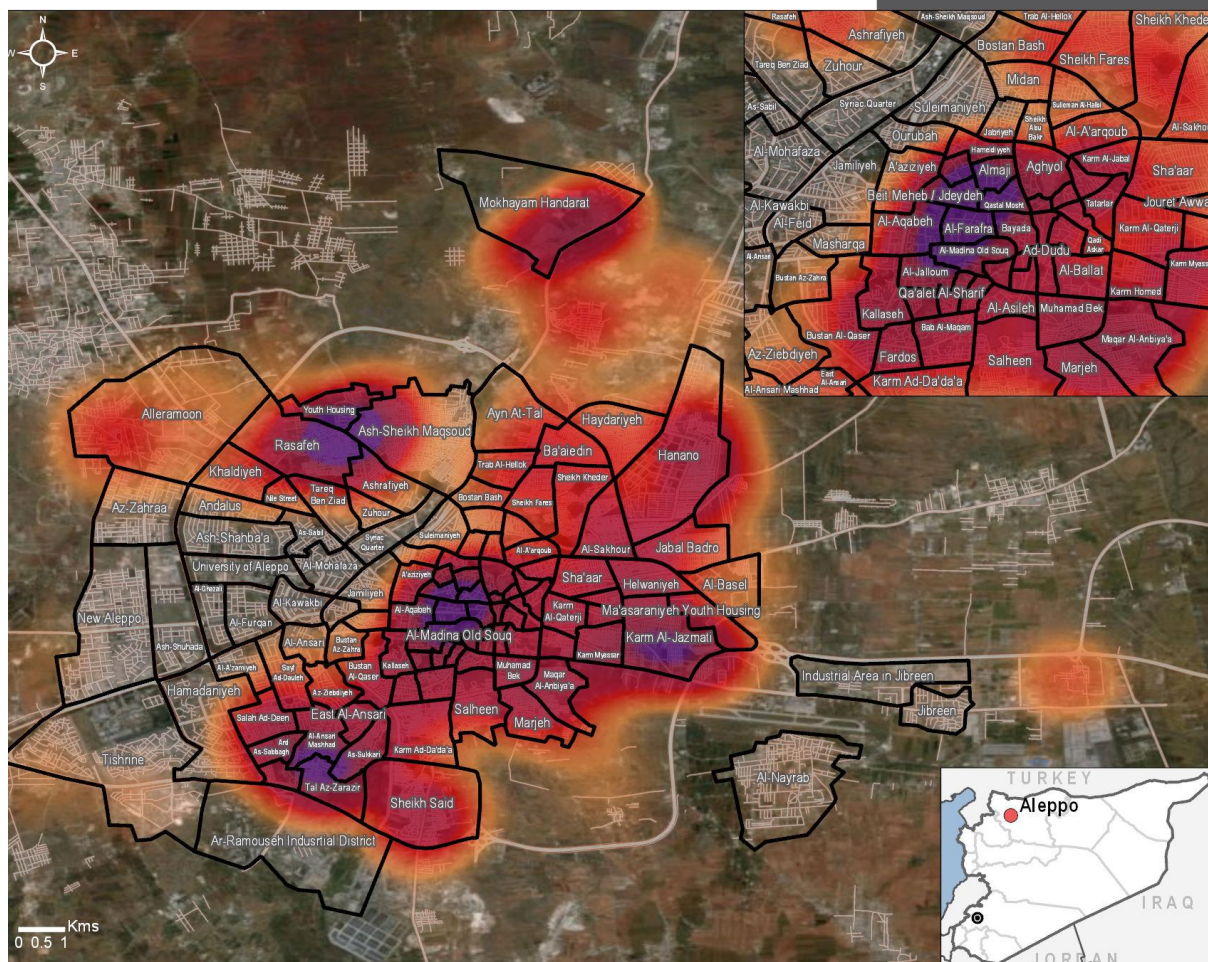
When presenting results at sub-district levels or above, the average confidence level of KIs reporting on each individual variable within that area is declared. Weighting is not conducted unless a representative sample of villages would be obtained for a sub-district or above, since it might otherwise risk misrepresenting the results.

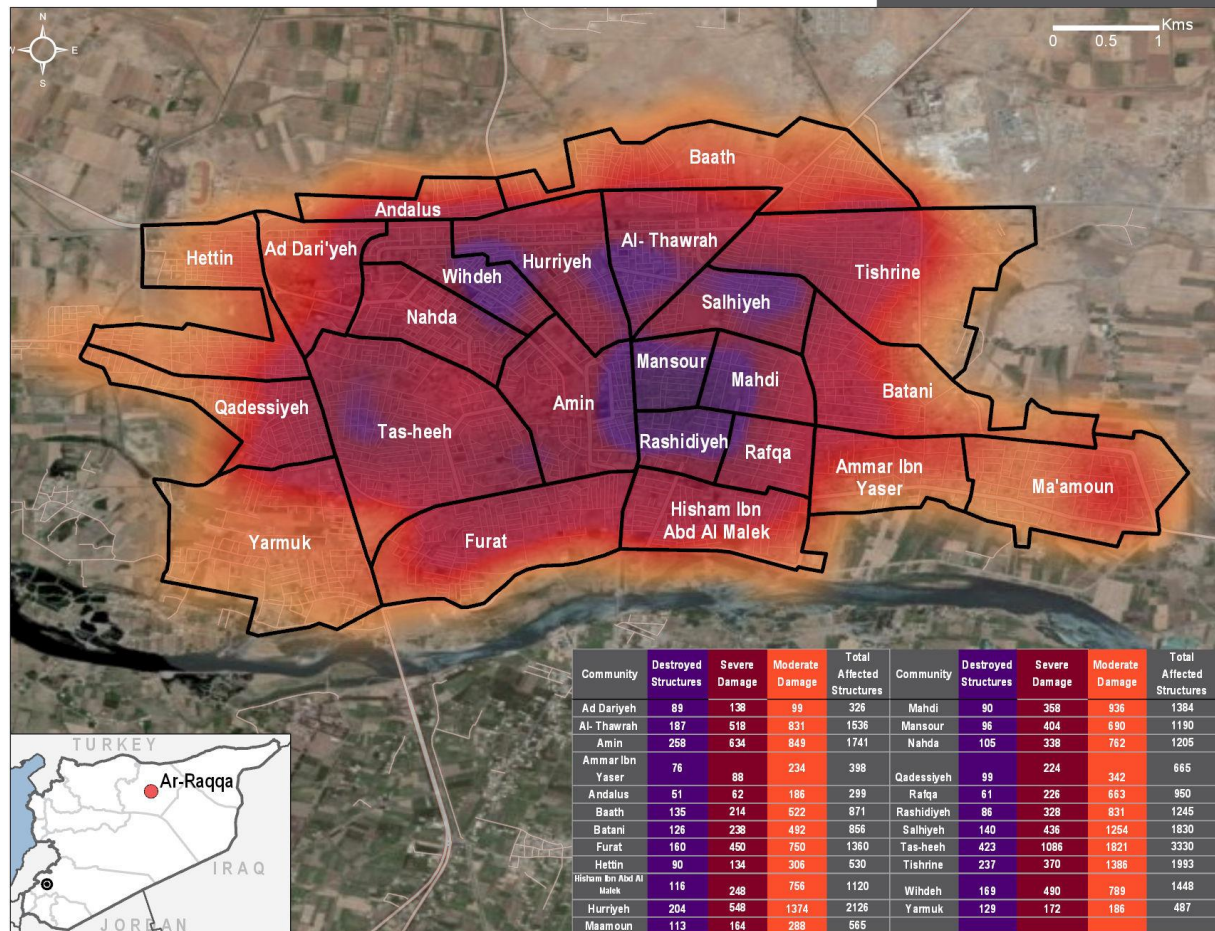

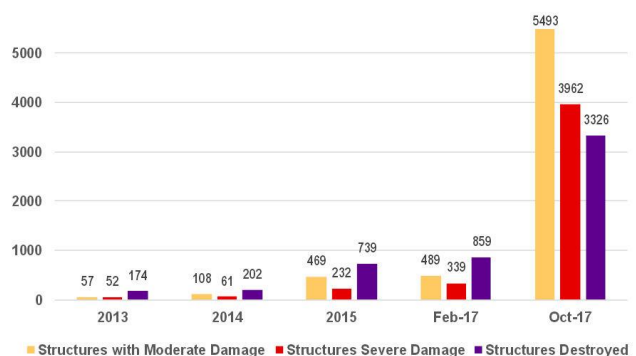

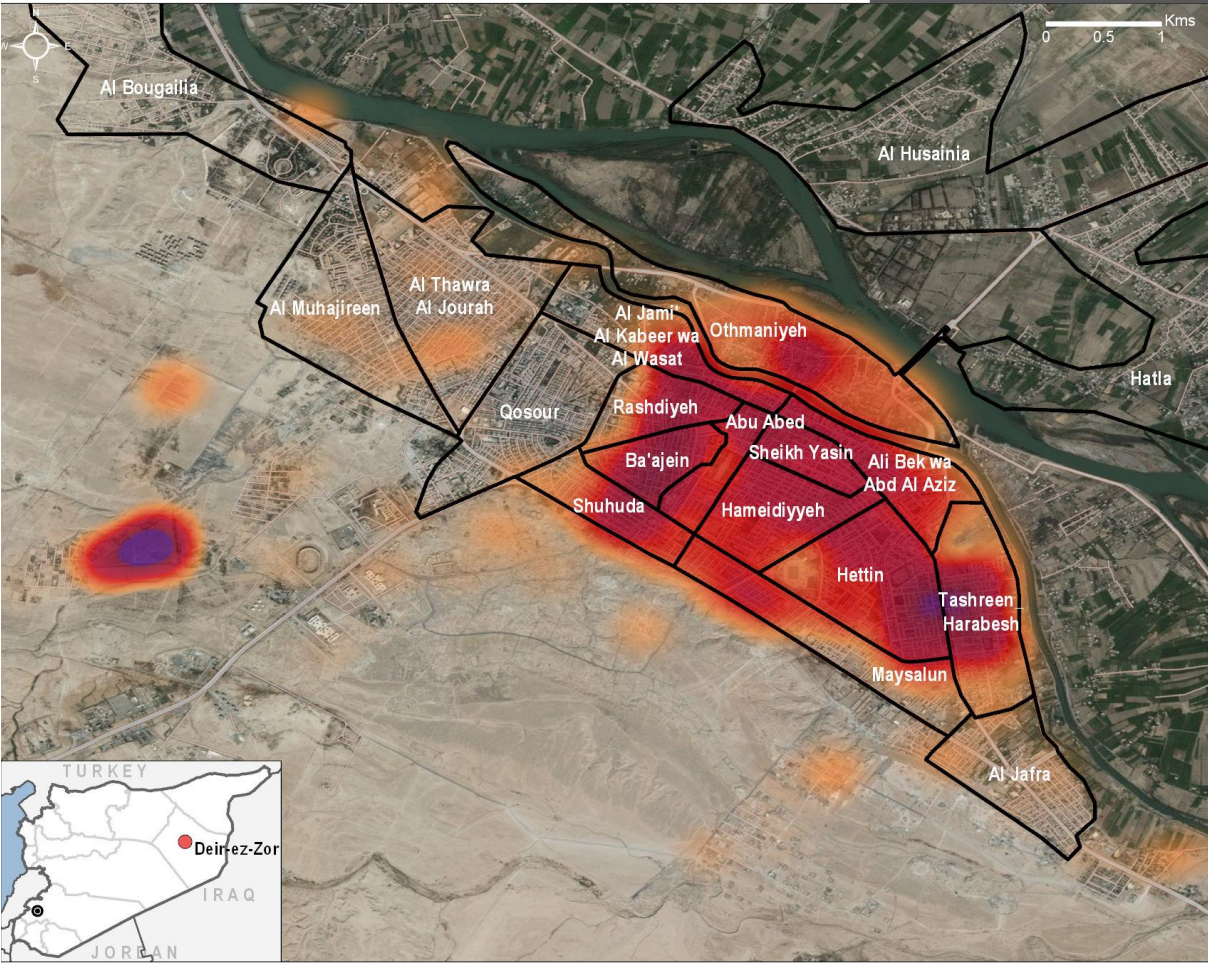

Satellite-Detected Severity of Structure Damage - 9 November 2017

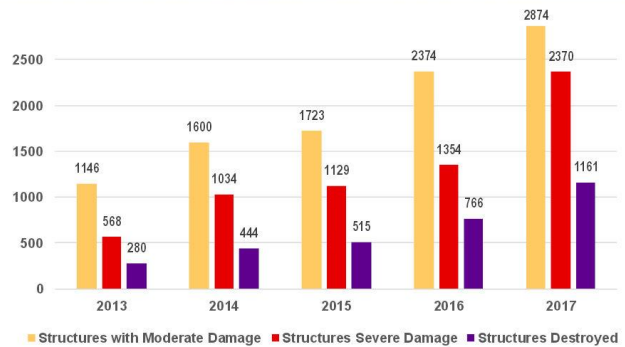

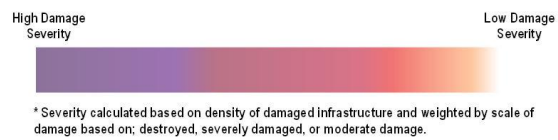
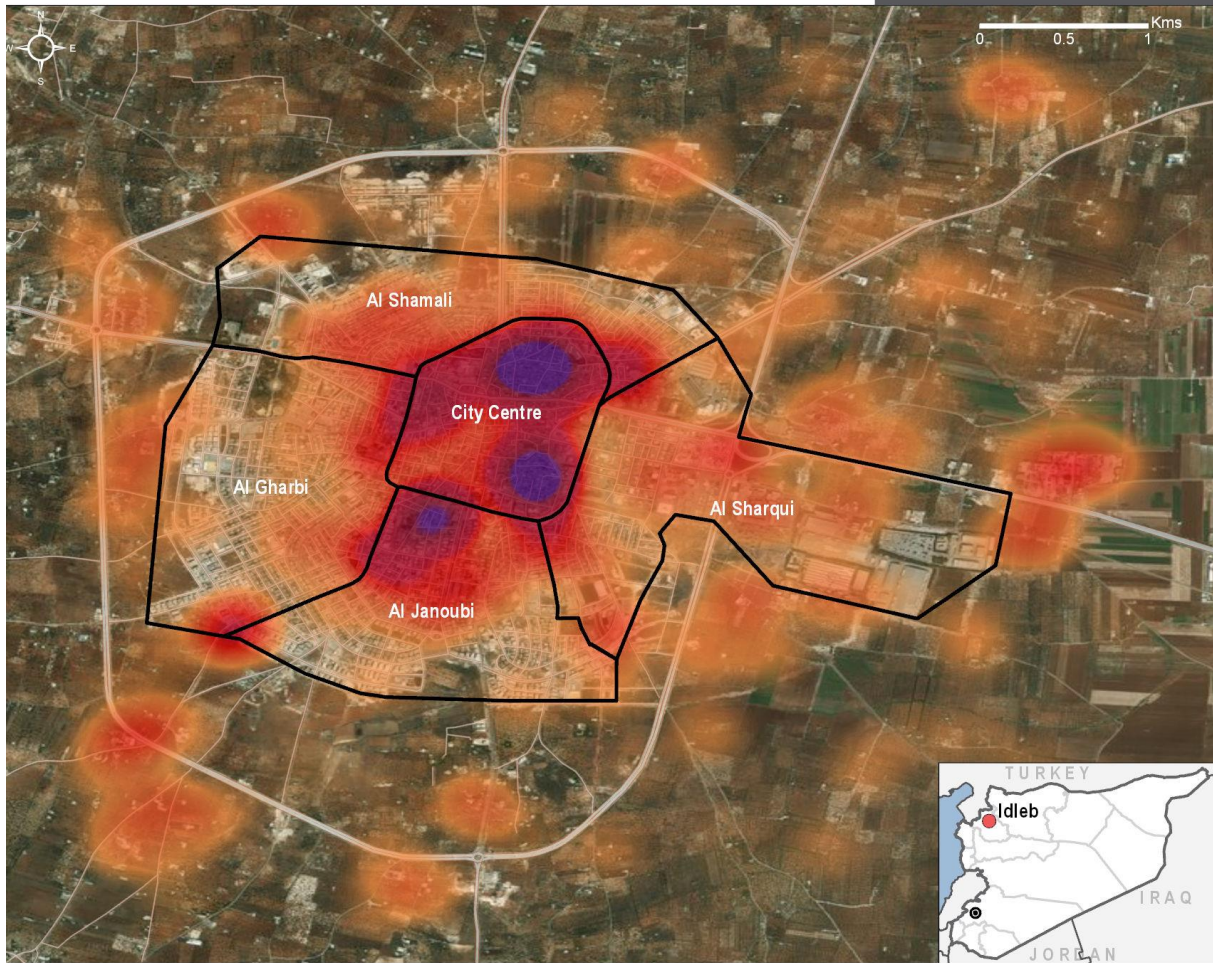

Satellite-Detected Severity of Structure Damage - 28 June 2018

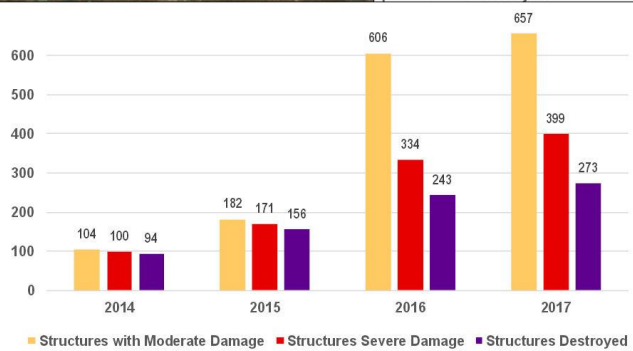
