2. Rationale

2.1. Rationale

For the better part of the last decade, and particularly since 2014, the 7 states that comprise the Northwest region of Nigeria have experienced increasingly deadly inter-communal conflict and organized crime resulting in the displacement of more than 200,000 people, and the death and disappearance of thousands more.³ This same region has the highest poverty rate in Nigeria - some states recording poverty levels as much as 40% higher than the national average.⁴ The Northwest has the highest rate of out of school children in the country, and millions are believed to lack access to health care, clean water, and childhood immunizations.⁵ Underlying the region's accelerating insecurity and extreme poverty is the desertification of land brought on by climate change, which has left millions of pastoralists and farmers without their principal source of livelihood. Compounding the displacement crisis is recent flooding which since August has destroyed tens of thousands of homes, and hundreds of thousands hectares of crops.⁶ The overwhelming focus on the humanitarian crisis in the North East, coupled by the widespread inaccessibility and volatility of the Northwest, and the likely underestimation of the scale of insecurity, has resulted in a shortage of critical information needed to respond to the quickly growing crisis. As partners⁷ prepare to respond to the region's increasing needs, they will provide a clearer picture of displaced and host community household's needs, intentions, and demographics.

3. Methodology

2.1. Methodology overview

This assessment will be facilitated by the REACH team in Nigeria, with input from relevant implementing partners, coordinating bodies, and government agencies. It will be a mixed-methodology assessment comprised of household surveys of IDP and Host Communities from Katsina, Sokoto, and Zamfara and Focus Group Discussions taking place in Katsina. Household assessments and Focus Group Discussions will take place throughout the month of November and will run simultaneously with product dissemination occurring in December.

Due to COVID-19 related health and safety concerns, IMPACT enumerators will conduct all household interviews remotely by telephone. Remote household surveys will assess the demographic profiles, sector related needs, movement patterns, and push/pull concerns for the respective population groups. In total, 870 households will be surveyed split evenly across the three states (Katsina, Sokoto, and Zamfara) and by population group (IDP and Host community) for remote phone surveys.

Focus group discussions will be used as a qualitative tool and will be comprised of six groups disaggregated by state of origin and gender. All focus groups will take place outdoors with two meters of distance between all participants and facilitators. See the COVID-19 section on page eight for detailed information on IMPACT protocols.

Partners include INGOs, NGOs, CSOs, and Nigerian government agencies, both local, state, and national.

The relevant terms and definitions used for the purpose of this assessments are:

<u>Internally displaced person (IDP)</u> – any Nigerian individual who has been forced to leave their home at least once since 2010, for a period of at least a week, and remains displaced at the present time within the borders of the Nigerian state.

<u>Host Community</u>- A host community in this context refers to the country of asylum and the local, regional and national governmental, social and economic structures within which refugees live. Urban refugees live within host communities with or without legal status and recognition by the host community. In the context of refugee camps, the host community may encompass the camp, or may simply neighbour the camp but have interaction with, or otherwise be impacted by, the refugees residing in the camp.

<u>Camp</u> – a setting where displaced people have gathered to reside, either endorsed (formal) or unendorsed (informal) by government structures.

<u>Settlement</u> – the smallest geographic unit (Local Government Area (LGA) > ward > settlement). A community of households residing together who typically share public infrastructure and resources such as health facilities, WASH infrastructure, schools, etc.

<u>Site</u> – for the purposes of this assessment, a site refers to any location, with a given name and theoretically quantifiable population, where target respondents/households are residing. This can be a settlement (host community), informal site or settlement, or camp (formal or informal).

2.2. Population of interest

This assessment spans the three NW states of Sokoto, Zamfara, and Katsina. The populations of interest are displaced households residing in camps, informal sites, and host communities in areas with high displacement. The unit of analysis for this RNA is the household.

2.3. Secondary data review

2020 Nigeria Multi-Sectorial Needs Assessment (MSNA) – tool and indicator design is informed by the 2020 Nigeria MSNA, whose indicators have already been approved by the sectors, and which has been piloted rigorously in the NE. Adjustments have been made where relevant.

<u>South Sudan/Syria Rapid Needs Assessments (RNA)</u> – the questionnaire is also heavily informed by rapid needs assessments out of South Sudan and Syria. South Sudan is specifically used to inform indicators related to flooding.

<u>Secondary data from Nigerian Government agencies</u> – Nigerian state and national emergency response agencies have been contacted for data gathered on displacement in Sokoto, Zamfara, and Katsina. This information is used to determine target areas.

<u>UN IOM Displacement Tracking Matrix flash reports on displacement in the NW</u>: IOM DTM releases weekly flash reports that provide figures on displacement in the NW, which were are also used to inform geographic coverage.

<u>Conflict analysis reports and needs assessments</u> – conflict analysis reports and needs assessments are also used to provide background and context to the crisis, especially a 2020 International Crisis Group report on violence in the Northwest, and a 2019 Needs Assessment conducted in Zamfara by Terre des Hommes, Search for Common Ground, and Pastoral Resolve.

Network coverage maps - maps are used to determine which areas are accessible via telephone and which are not, which also affects mobile coverage. Our coverage will be limited to areas with accessible mobile service only.

2.4. Primary Data Collection

Method

Household contacts will be snowballed through a network of key informants, partners on the ground, and community gatekeepers. All respondent households will be determined to be currently or formerly displaced, or host communities within the previous six months (since before Ramadan). Community guides and local partners will be used to contact households with no phone access. Data will be collected remotely out of a call centre in Katsina LGA, by a team of enumerators, supervised by REACH field officers and field assistants. The REACH field manager will be trained on the tool by the REACH assessment officer. The field manager will then train field officers and assistants in a 2-day in person training on questionnaire content, sampling technique, and use of mobile data collection. The field manager will then train enumerators in a similar 2-day training. 5 enumerators will be used to contact households in each state (15 total) with 2 field officers overseeing enumerators, and one field manager overseeing all of data collection.

Focus group discussions (FGDs) will be held in Katsina state with participants purposively selected based on input from community leaders and local partners. Groups will be led by REACH field officers who are trained on discussion group facilitation techniques and sensitivity. Due to issues with accessibility in Sokoto and Zamfara, all FGDs will be held in Katsina town, or several immediately surrounding areas, but will include participants originally from all 3 states. If participants from all three states are not able to join, participants will be pulled primarily from Katsina, and fewer groups will be held. This would then be listed as a limitation in the final output.

Due to the rapid spread of COVID-19, the specific risk to already vulnerable communities, the importance of the Humanitarian principle of "Do No Harm" as well as general considerations for "Duty of Care" (i.e. ensuring both field staff and local communities are not spreading and/ or exposed to the risk of contracting COVID-19 due to data collection activities), IMPACT, with inputs and review support from WHO and Global Health Cluster colleagues, has developed Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs)⁸ to guide research teams on how to undertake data collection during the COVID-19 outbreak. The SOPs for data collection during COVID-19 will be followed to ensure of safety of participants and REACH staff. See the COVID-19 section on page eight for detailed information.

Sampling

HH-Level Questionnaire

For this assessment, a household level snowballing sampling technique is utilized. LGAs are selected based on IOM displacement data from 2019, in addition to guidance and input from Nigerian national and state level emergency management agencies, who are at the present time best positioned to provide up to date information on flood and conflict related needs and displacement. IDP and host community households will then be identified using local guides, traditional leaders, and community gatekeepers. The total sample quota is calculated using, as a reference, a 95% confidence interval and a +/-5% margin of error at the state level. ⁹ This calculation is used to inform the total sample size quota for each of the three states, but does not make the data representative of any population group or geographic area since a convenience sample is utilized. See below table for breakdown at the state level, disaggregated by population type.

FGDs will be held in groups of 5-8 individuals, disaggregated by gender and state of origin, for a total of 6 focus discussion groups. Groups will include a mix of participants across different age groups, and causes of displacement (flooding versus insecurity). See below table for breakdown.

Tools

Quantitative Household Questionnaire

This assessment will utilize one structured quantitative household level questionnaire that will probe the sector-specific needs, coping mechanisms, displacement history, movement intentions, and demographics of respondent households. Indicators will touch on protection, health, WASH, education, food security, nutrition, livelihoods, and shelter. Indicators are informed by the 2020 Nigeria MSNA, since these have already been reviewed and approved by the sectors, in addition to REACH rapid needs assessments from South Sudan and Syria, as well as other secondary resources and feedback from sectors. Adjustments have been made to indicators and choices to account for the shift in context. All households will be interviewed using the same questionnaire, with appropriate skip logic applied throughout.

Focus Group Discussion Guide

The FGD tool will procure an in-depth understanding of the specific sectorial needs of conflict and/or flood affected households, in addition to preferred response and support mechanisms, and movement patterns and intentions. The target respondents for FGDs will be purposively selected individuals who are currently displaced (that is, IDPs). The target will be a mix of head of household and non-head of household individuals. Participants will include a mixture of individuals originally 10 from all 3 target states, residing both in and out of camp. Groups will be divided according to gender and state of origin.

Quality Assurance

Quality of survey data is guaranteed by proper diligence at all stages of the survey. Details in the protocol related to efforts to ensure quality assurance during recruitment, sampling (e.g., efforts to ensure an updated sampling frame), training (e.g., field test), and field work (e.g. supervisor monitoring of performance) are noted in each respective section above. In addition, a daily check of entered data will be conducted by the assessment officer to adhere to Impact Initiatives data cleaning checklist. Final dataset is consistent with intended sampling strategy

- Interview duration (i.e. time taken for the interview/ survey) is reasonable
- None of the enumerators consistently follow the shortest questionnaire path or exact same path i.e. providing same responses across multiple records
- There are no inexplicable or impossible outliers i.e. an observation/ a specific data points that lies an abnormal distance from other values in the dataset
- There is logical coherence between the different responses within a record
- A clear, comprehensive cleaning log is maintained as per the IMPACT Cleaning Logbook template.
- Dataset is in a clean, tidy and usable format for purpose of analysis
- All information that can be used to identify individuals or households is removed from the dataset. Example of such information: Names; Phone numbers; Respondent occupation/ organisation; Information about enumerators / key informants; Respondent gender, age and location; etc.

All necessary protocols will be followed to ensure that REACH field staff and FGDs participants are protected from the threat of contracting COVID-19. These include:

- All FGDs will take place outside, with participants sitting at least 2 meters from one another throughout the duration
 of the discussion.
- Elderly (65+) individuals and individuals with chronic illnesses will be omitted from FGDs when possible. 12
- No objects will be passed from participants to participant, and direct contact between individuals will be prohibited.
- FGD participants will be reminded of guidelines at the start of each discussion group.
- REACH field staff will wash their hands upon arriving at the call centre for the day, and will wipe down phones and surfaces at the end of each day.
- REACH enumerators and field officers will maintain a distance of at least 2 meters from each other throughout the
 duration of the day's data collection, with as many rooms utilized as is necessary for all staff to keep a safe distance.
- REACH staff will be reminded of protocols and procedures each day before beginning data collection.

Consent and Participant Protection

Informed consent will be received from all participant heads of household before REACH staff begin with the remote enumeration of the questionnaire. Enumerators will be given a script which includes:

- Who the enumerator is and who they work for
- Why the respondent has been contacted and what the selection process was
- What the purpose and scope of the assessment is and how the information will be used.
- Length of interview.
- Guarantee of anonymity.
- Guarantee of reversible consent.

2.5. Data Processing & Analysis

Quantitative Household Questionnaire

Survey forms will be submitted on a daily basis to IMPACT's Kobo server. Data checking will be completed daily by two individuals, the assessment officer and the data officer, who are tasked with reviewing data quality, using the IMPACT minimum quality guidelines. Errors or suspicious entries will be entered daily into a cleaning log, which will be shared across field teams for follow up with enumerators. As data collection is completed in each LGA, cleaning logs will be finalized and the dataset will be prepared for final cleaning. Quantitative data analysis will be conducted in Excel and R.

Focus Group Discussion

A detailed transcript of the discussion from the FGDs for each question will be translated into English including moderators and note takers memos and a summary of the conclusions drawn from the discussions will be collected in Microsoft Word format for analysis using a saturation grid in Microsoft Excel.
