Summary

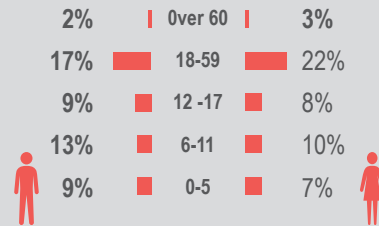
