### Background

Since the start of the Syrian civil war in 2011, widespread conflict across northeast Syria (NES) has resulted in significant displacement of civilians. Economic conditions have deteriorated across the entire country, and the prices of basic goods have increased. This is partly due to the instability and decline of the Syrian Pound (SYP) against the US Dollar (USD), as well as the escalation of conflict in northwest Syria in early 2020.<sup>1</sup> The international community anticipates further economic deterioration as a result of the ongoing Ukraine crisis. The significant reduction of the level of the Euphrates river causes severe impact on water and electricity access, livelihoods and food security in northeast Syria.<sup>2</sup> The drought, combined with continued conflict in the areas around Ras Al Ein, as well as the ongoing pandemic has caused further displacement in this part of Syria.<sup>3</sup> This assessment therefore provides data of basic needs across different sectors of Internal Displaced Persons (IDPs) living in informal sites and settlements across northeast Syria.

### Methodology

REACH's informal settlement profiling in NES consists of key informant (KI) interviews with community members who have knowledge of the settlements. A minimum of two KIs were sought for each of the sites, focusing on each KI's sector-specific knowledge. All selected informal settlements and collective centres were verified by the NES Sites and Settlements Working Group (SSWG).<sup>4</sup> For an updated list of active sites, see the SSWG sites list.<sup>5</sup> Data collection took place between 21 and 27 February 2022. In total, 97 settlements were assessed in Ar-Raqqa governorate. The assessment was carried out at settlement level. Due to the KI methodology used, findings are not statistically representative and should therefore only be considered indicative of the situation in assessed settlements. The presented percentages, based on KI estimates, refer to the assessed settlements in which KIs reported a given characteristic, behaviour or issue, unless otherwise specified. Answers separated by semicolon (;) indicate that KIs of the same site provided different answers. Corresponding assessments were carried out in the other three NES governorates in February 2022. 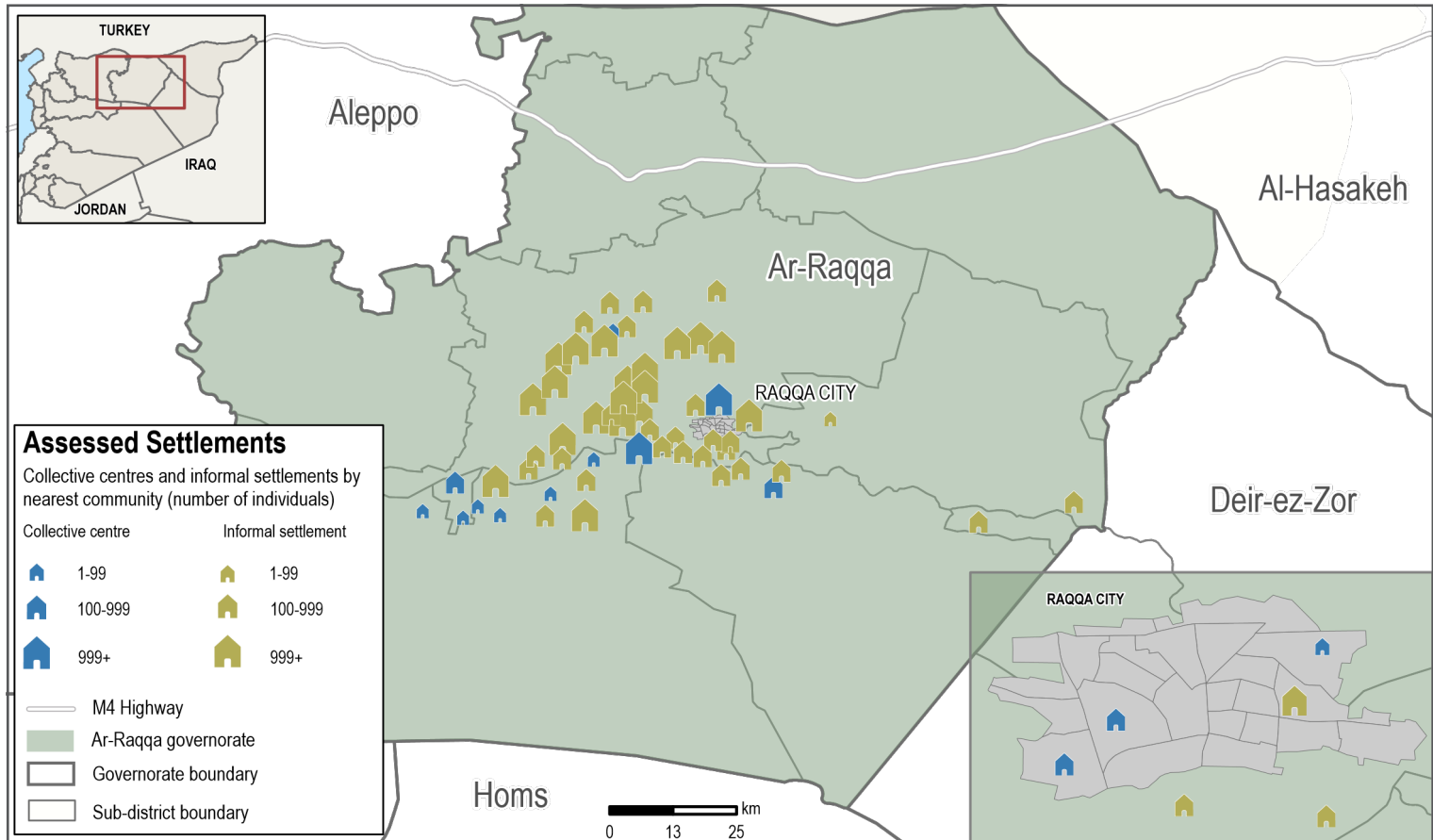

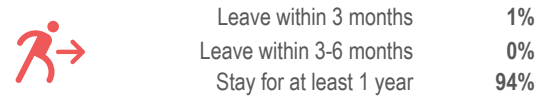

The main pull factors reported for people to arrive to this settlement were **family ties** or a **relationship to the host community** and **shelter access**.

Movement intentions by percentage of households across assessed settlements:



KIs reported that the main factors influencing the intention to leave were **reduced access to income and employment opportunities** (11% of assessed settlements) and **reduced access to humanitarian assistance** (7%).

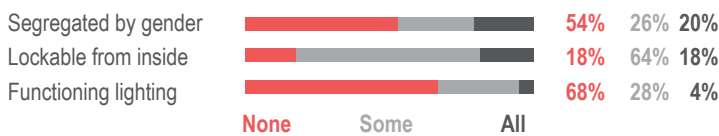
## WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE (WASH)

**Latrines** Available latrines, by % of settlements:<sup>7,8</sup>



In **3%** of assessed settlements, KIs reported that **no latrines** were available in the settlement. Top three latrine alternatives were open defecation outside the site (56%) or within the site (5%) and digging private pits (18%).

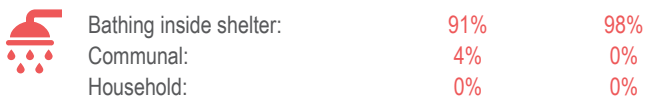
**Communal latrine characteristics, by % of assessed settlements:<sup>9</sup>**



The main issues reported with latrines were **insufficiently available latrines**, reported by KIs in **80%** of assessed settlements, and a **lack of lights**, reported in **70%** of settlements.<sup>7</sup>

### Showers

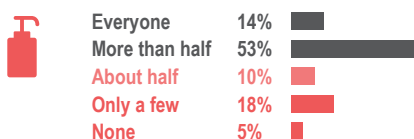
**Bathing facilities:<sup>7,8</sup>** Available: Mostly used:



In **50%** the assessed settlements with communal showers, KIs reported that some or all showers were **gender-segregated**, in **75%** KIs reported that some or all showers had **locks** and in **75%** KIs reported some or all showers had **lighting**.<sup>9</sup>

The main issues reported with showers were that **no showers were available**, reported by KIs in **53%** of assessed settlements, and in particular **no private showers**, reported in **43%** of settlements.<sup>7</sup>

**Reported proportion of residents with access to soap within the assessed settlements:**

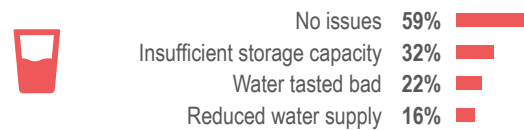


The main issues reported with soap was that **soap was too expensive**, reported by KIs in **92%** of assessed settlements, and that **some groups didn't have access to the market**, reported in **7%** of settlements.<sup>7</sup>

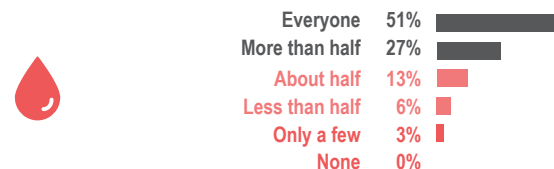
### Water

**Public taps/standpipes** and **tanker trucks** were the primary water sources in the assessed settlements at the time of data collection.

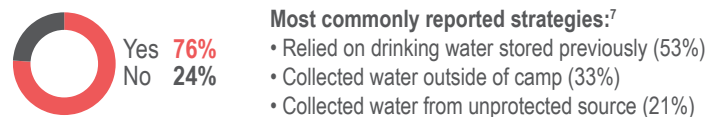
**Drinking water issues, by % of assessed settlements:<sup>7</sup>**

In **63%** of assessed settlements, KIs reported that at least one resident in the settlement suffered from **diarrhoea** in the two weeks prior to data collection.

### Waste disposal

**Primary waste disposal system:** Burning garbage (71% of assessed settlements) and disposing at another location (39%).<sup>7</sup>

**Primary waste disposal issue:** Complete lack of garbage removal (48% of assessed settlements).

## HEALTH



In **79%** of assessed settlements, KIs reported that residents in their settlement could access at least one health facility. In **16%** of the remaining settlements, residents had access to a pharmacy/dispensary.

In **97%** of settlements, KIs reported health issues among residents. The most commonly reported issues were **chronic diseases** (89%), **pregnancy-related complications** (59%), and **cough and cold fever** (54%).<sup>97,9</sup>

The most common place for women in the settlement to **give birth** was reportedly in a **health facility** (**97%** of settlements). In **61%** of settlements, KIs reported maternal health services as a priority health need.

The most commonly reported medicine needs were **treatments for hypertension/heart disease, antibiotics and diabetes medicines**.

In **14%** of settlements, all residents had access to soap and in **1%** of settlements all residents had **access to a hand-washing facility** according to KIs. The main issues reported with handwashing facilities were that **there were no handwashing facilities** and that **soap was too expensive**.<sup>7</sup>

## SHELTER AND NON-FOOD ITEMS (NFIs)

### Shelter adequacy

KIs estimated that a **lack of lighting** (**81%** of assessed settlements), **lack of heating** (**75%**) and **lack of insulation from cold** (**66%**) were the main shelter adequacy issues in their settlement.<sup>7</sup>

### Electricity

**Batteries** were reported among the primary electricity sources in **72%** of settlements, and **solar panels** in **38%** of settlements.<sup>7</sup> KIs reported that residents in the settlement had an average of **6** hours of electricity access per day.

In **20%** of settlements, KIs reported that **aid distributions** had taken place in their settlement in the month prior to data collection, with **26%** of assessed settlements having received NFI items.

The main topics residents needed information about, according to KIs, were **job opportunities** (99%), **accessing assistance** (82%) and **the access to health facilities** (30%).<sup>7</sup>

## FOOD SECURITY

**Food distributions** took place in **0%** of the assessed settlements and **water distributions** in **42%** of assessed settlements in the 30 days prior to data collection.

KIs reported that **sugar** (**39% of assessed settlements**), **ghee or vegetable oil** (**31%**) and **bread** (**27%**) were the main food items needed by residents that were not sufficiently available through assistance or markets.<sup>9</sup>

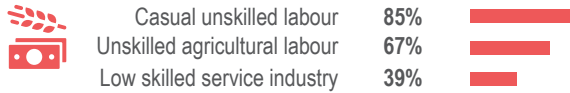

### Household income and expenses

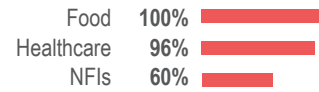
KIs estimated that all households in **77%** of settlements had access to income sources. However in **0%** of assessed settlements, KIs reported that most **households** in the settlement **had a stable income**.

**Top three reported primary income sources for households with income access in the 30 days prior to data collection, by % of assessed settlements:**<sup>7,9</sup>



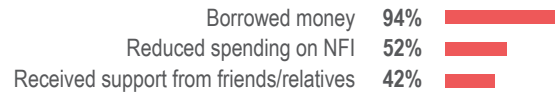

**Top three reported livelihoods-related coping strategies over the 30 days prior to data collection, by % of assessed settlements:**<sup>7</sup>

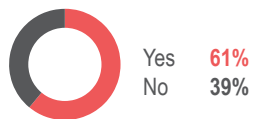


## PROTECTION

### Freedom of movement

In **100%** of assessed settlements, KIs reported that all residents were able to **leave the assessed settlement for a medical emergency without disclosing the medical reason** at the time of data collection. In **100%** of assessed settlements, KIs reported that **all** residents could leave for non-emergency reasons.

### Older persons and persons with disabilities

At the time of data collection, in **0%** of assessed settlements, KIs reported interventions addressing older persons' needs and in **0%** KIs reported interventions addressing needs of **persons with disabilities** in their settlements.

### Safety and security issues

In **32%** of assessed settlements, KIs reported safety and security issues in the settlement over the 30 days prior to data collection.

**Most commonly reported security issues in assessed settlements:**<sup>7</sup>

- Theft (25%)
- Disputes between residents (22%)

### Documentation

In **5%** of assessed settlements, KIs reported that **no one in their settlement has=d** their national identification, passport, family booklet and/or individual/family civil record.

In **80%** of assessed settlements, KIs reported that **births were not registered** in their settlement.

KIs reported that boys (in **64%** of assessed settlements) and girls (**61%**) faced particular challenges in accessing documentation.<sup>7</sup>

## EDUCATION

### Education Facilities

In **91%** of assessed settlements, KIs reported that children in their settlement had access to education. In **91%** of settlements **primary schools** and in **9%** **secondary schools** were reportedly available.

In these settlements, education was available for the following age groups:<sup>7,9</sup>

3-5 year olds in	6%	of these settlements.
6-11 year olds in	100%	of these settlements.
12-14 year olds in	25%	of these settlements.
15-17 year olds in	6%	of these settlements.

### Child protection

In **83%** of assessed settlements, KIs reported that they were aware of **child labour** occurring among **children under the age of 11**, most commonly reporting domestic labour (72% of these assessed settlements) and collecting trash to sell (22%).<sup>9,11</sup>

In **100%** of settlements where child labor was reported, KIs reported it for boys. The most common child labour types included **agriculture** (67%), **selling goods** (49%), and **livestock rearing** (47%).<sup>7,9</sup>

In **100%** of settlements where child labor was reported, KIs reported it for girls. The most common child labor types included **domestic labour** (78%), **agriculture** (65%) and **collecting trash to sell** (15%).<sup>7,9</sup>

In **3%** of assessed settlements, KIs reported that their settlement had an accessible **child-friendly space**.

### Gender-based violence

In **2%** of assessed settlements, KIs reported that their settlement had an accessible designated space for women and girls.

In **85%** of assessed settlements, KIs reported that the social relationship between different community groups in their area was neutral, in 15% of cases it was positive.

### Access and barriers to education

In **39%** of the settlements children were reportedly **attending school at least 3 days a week**.

In **97%** of settlements, KIs reported barriers to education.

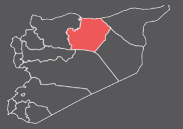
