
Ma'rib City District, Ma'rib Governorate

The Yemen Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) Cluster launched the WASH Needs Tracking System (WANTS) with the support of REACH to provide high quality WASH data and inform more effective WASH programming and planning. The WANTS comprises a set of harmonized monitoring tools which, through partner data collection, provide updated information and analysis on WASH access and needs throughout Yemen.

The common key informant (KI) interview tool is a community-level WANTS tool used in common priority districts. The findings below are based on twelve (n=12) common key informant (KI) interviews conducted across 7 communities in Ma'rib City district, Ma'rib governorate. The type of assessed localities were urban and peri-urban areas. KIs are reporting WASH needs of their own communities. Data was collected by Sana'a Coalition for Relief and Development (SCRD) in October 2022. These findings should be interpreted as indicative of the WASH needs in Ma'rib

Water

Water is too expensive

7/12 KIs reported that people in their community mainly relied on an improved water source4 for drinking water in the 30 days prior to data collection.

7/12 KIs reported issues related to taste, appearance or smell of water in the 30 days prior to data collection.

Proportion of KIs reporting water access problems in the 30 days prior to data collection:5

water is too expensive	0/12
Storage containers are too expensive	4/12
Insufficient number of water points/ waiting time at water points	4/12
Waterpoints are too far	3/12
Some groups (children, women, elderly, ethnic minorities, IDPs, etc.) do not have access to the water points	2/12
People don't like the taste/quality of the water	1/12

6/12 KIs reported that no one in their community treated their drinking water in the 30 days prior to data collection, whereas 5/12 KIs reported few, and one KI reported not knowing if people treated drinking water.



11/12 KIs reported that few people in the community had enough soap in the 30 days prior to data collection, while one KI reported not knowing if poeple in community had enough soap.



Sanitation

5/12 KIs reported that few people in their communities had access to a functional latrine in the 30 days prior to data collection, whereas 2/12 KIs reported half the poeple, 2/12 KIs reported most poeple, 1/12 KIs reported no one, 1/12 KIs reported everyone, and 1/12 KIs reported not knowing if people in the community had access to a functional latrine.

Main sanitation facility type used by people in the community in the 30 days prior to data collection, as reported by KIs:

Flush or pour/flush toilet	8/12	
Pit latrine with a slab and platform	3/12	
Pit VIP toilet ⁶	1/12	

10/12 KIs reported that specific groups had issues accessing sanitation in the 30 days prior to data collection.⁷

1) All demographic information is based on UNOCHA 2022 Yemen Population projections. 2) Cholera severity scores based on Suspected Cholera Incidence Rate per 10,000 people. Reported by WHO for 2021 Humanitarian Needs Overview. Cholera Severity score is on a scale of 1 to 5 with 5 being the most severe. 3) Combined GAM prevalence, % children 6-59 months with MUAC 125mm or less and/or WFH Z-score -2 or less. Based on <u>Yemen Nutrition Cluster Achievements Analysis 2020-2022</u>, 4) Improved drinking water source is <u>defined by the WHO</u> as a source that, by nature of its construction, adequately protects the water from outside contamination, in particular from faecal matter. 5) KIs could select more than one answer. 6) Pit VIP toilet is a ventilated improved pit latrine, latrine that has a pipe that allows for ventilation to reduce odour and flies.7) KIs could select from the following specific groups: Women/girls, Men/boys, People with disabilities, Older persons, Marginalized people (minorities), and IDPs
