

### Background & Methodology

As of 27 April, more than 5.4 million refugees have reportedly fled Ukraine, with 441,437 refugees arriving in the Republic of Moldova, around 100,000 of whom have remained in the country (UNHCR). To respond to their needs, the Moldovan authorities have established 92 Refugee Accommodation Centres (RACs) across the country. As of 27 April, centres have the capacity to host a total of 7,508 refugees, and are currently hosting 4,384 refugees.

To understand the needs of these centres, the National Agency for Social Assistance (ANAS), with the support of UNHCR, ACTED, and REACH, conducted key informant interviews (KIIs) with purposefully selected RAC focal points who reported on the situation in the centres. Data collection took place on 27 April through phone interviews. This factsheet presents the main requests from **91 assessed RACs**. Findings should be considered indicative.






#### % of assessed RACs with the following vulnerable groups currently present



#### % of RACs by hosting capacity (out of 92 RACs)




#### People hosted in RACs since receiving approval to open

## Most Requested Items from RACs

Below is an overview of items most frequently requested by RACs during structured phone interviews with KIs. It should be noted that in view of the high rotation of refugees going in and out of RACs, the requested items are based on ongoing requirements for normal RAC functioning. **These requests do not necessarily mean RACs do not currently have the requested items. Rather, these requests may be based on forward looking considerations about maintaining steady supplies. Hot meals have been distributed by the government, UN agencies, NGOs and local organisations, and no major shortages of essential food items have been reported.**




