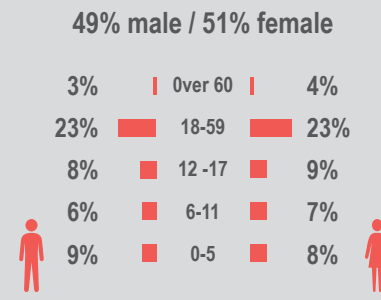
Summary

Households were randomly sampled to a 95% confidence and 10% margin of error, based on population figures provided by CCCM. In some cases, additional information from camp managers has been used to support findings. Round IV of data collection was in December 2015.

Location Map

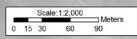


IDP Camp Map - Bajed Kandala
