General Objective	<p>To provide humanitarian actors with insights on the movement intentions of IDPs in camps, informal settlements, and collective centres in Northeast Syria (NES), with a particular focus on IDP returns, as understanding movement intentions should help facilitate humanitarian planning for the coming year.</p> <p>The focus will be on camps, informal settlements, and collective centres that (1) were established before the military escalations started on 27 November 2024; and (2) primarily host IDPs who came from areas that were, until recently, controlled by the Government of Syria.</p>

Provide humanitarian actors with information on the demographics, area of origin, and movement intentions (with a particular focus on IDP returns) of the IDPs at relevant sites or camps in NES. 2. Determine the potential future movements of IDPs, including push and pull factors and whether they intent to move within the next month or weeks. 	
Research Questions	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. What are the movement intentions of IDPs in Northwest Syria, including their plans to stay, relocate, or return to areas of origin, and what timelines are associated with these decisions? 2. What factors influence IDP movement decisions, including barriers to return, enabling conditions, access to services, security concerns, and living standards in both current locations and areas of origin? 3. What types of support, resources, and information do IDPs require to facilitate movement, return, or facilitate/advance local integration in their current locations? 	
Geographic Coverage	<p>In the first stage (January 2025), this assessment will focus on planned and informal camps in Northeast Syria, focusing on accessible camps that host IDPs originally from areas with no movement restrictions. Specifically, household-level data collection will take place in 6 planned and informal camps:¹ Abu Khashab, Areesha, Mahmoudli, Newroz, Tel Samen and Twahina.</p> <p>In the second stage, data collection will take place in informal settlements and collective centres in Northeast Syria. This second stage will also be conducted with a representative sample of households, stratified by site type within each district.</p>	

¹ Other camps have been excluded from the coverage due to their populations mostly coming from areas unaffected by the changes in frontlines (e.g., Washokani), and/or because movement is not an option for the camp residents (e.g., Al-Hol and Al-Roj), and/or because they are not currently accessible (e.g., Menbij Old/Menbij New).

2. Rationale

2.1. Rationale

Starting on 27 November 2024, military operations by Syrian opposition forces against Government of Syria forces led to major changes to areas of control in Syria. This was the first major change in areas of control since March 2020. On 8 December 2024, the Syrian opposition forces swept into Damascus, ending the 24-year rule of previous President Bashar al-Assad.

Given these changes, humanitarian actors (donors and implementing agencies) are seeking to understand ongoing and potential population movement, particularly in camps where IDPs are originally from areas that were, until recently, not reachable for them. Understanding IDPs' intentions and push- and pull factors could help humanitarian actors to facilitate dignified, safe, orderly returns and, ultimately, durable solutions.

3. Methodology

2.1. Methodology overview

Building on a first occurrence of this exercise in [December 2024](#), and due to the need to provide information rapidly despite capacity constraints, this assessment will occur in **two phases**.

Phase 1 (January 2025):

The first phase of this assessment will focus on accessible **planned and informal camps** in NES that are hosting IDPs who originate from areas where they can return with no or few movement restrictions. In this phase, in-person **household-level** data collection will take place in the following planned and informal camps. Households will be randomly selected using a spatial sampling methodology, stratified per camp, with a 95% confidence level and 10% margin of error based on population figures provided by camp management. A 10% buffer will be added for each strata, to mitigate any potential challenges in reaching the sample size.

Focusing first on these planned and informal camps will balance data collection and analysis capacity with the need to rapidly analyse and disseminate findings.

Phase 2 (February 2025):

In the second stage, data collection will take place in **accessible informal settlements and collective centres** in Northeast Syria. This assessment will also be conducted with a representative sample of households in sites listed in the SSWG master list. To facilitate analysis of the findings, the sample will be stratified by site type at district level, using a 95% confidence level and 10% margin of error, as well as a 10% buffer, as detailed below.

2.2. Population of interest

The population of interest is **internally displaced people in formal and informal camps, informal settlements, and collective centres in accessible areas of northeast Syria**. Accessibility is determined by whether REACH or partner enumerators can conduct the tasks necessary for the methodologies outlined below. Accessibility may be limited by factors such as permissions from relevant actors in the area, security considerations, and time constraints. The unit of measurement will be camps for the first phase, and district for the second phase.

2.3. Secondary data review

Secondary data to be used will include:

- Previous rapid assessments by REACH and other partners in NES following the recent military clashes that initially broke out in NWS.
- Previous and ongoing REACH assessments on living conditions in both camps and informal sites (Light and Full Profiling);
- Feedback and guidance notes from sectors/clusters, to make indicators and questionnaires as operationally relevant as possible.
- Displacement reports on informal sites and camps, produced by OCHA and REACH on the current displacement flows in Syria.
- Lists of sites and camps to plan data collection and decide on coverage.⁴

2.4. Primary Data Collection

As stated above, primary data collection will consist of in-person, household-level data collection in selected camps and informal sites in Northeast Syria, representative at a 95% confidence level and a 10% margin of error. For both phases of data collection, REACH will adopt a stratified sampling approach, with strata being camps for phase 1 and site type for each district for phase 2.

For the first phase, households will be selected within each camp using a spatial sampling methodology, in which random points will be selected within each site. For the second phase, due to the differences in sizes between the different sites, and the absence of clear boundaries, REACH enumerators will be asked to randomly select households within each site.

2.5. Data Processing & Analysis

During data collection, REACH will apply daily checks to ensure the consistency of data with the sampling plan. Collected data will also be checked for internal inconsistencies/logical consistency, data entry errors, unclear text entries, and suspicious enumerator response patterns and implausible responses. Data that has been flagged will be shared with the field team, who will confirm or rectify information based on enumerator recollections and notes. Detailed cleaning logs will be kept with information on the original information, changes made, and the reasons why data was changed. If information is determined to be inconsistent but it is not possible to determine what the correct entry should be, data points may be deleted altogether.

Data will be analysed and reported at different levels between the two phases.

- In phase 1, focusing on larger formal and informal camps, data will be aggregated at site level, and will be presented in a cleaned dataset, including analysis, as well as a factsheet
- Findings from phase 2 in informal sites will be aggregated both at district level and by site type, and will be presented in both a cleaned dataset with analysis and a dashboard, in which findings from a similar assessment in NWS will also be added.
