Multi-Sectoral Needs Assessment (MSNA)

Families with children

September 2022 Moldova

CONTEXT

As of 15 September 2022, more than 7.2 million refugees have reportedly fled Ukraine, with 606,000 refugees arriving in the Republic of Moldova, around 90,000 of whom are currently reportedly in the country.

While 97% of refugees are residing in the host community, limited information is currently available to response actors regarding their demographic profile, household composition, humanitarian needs, movement intentions, or coping capacities.

REACH, in partnership with UNICEF, ECHO, UNHCR, and in cooperation with the Refugee Coordination Forum - the sectoral working groups and task-forces - conducted a Multi-Sector Needs Assessment (MSNA).

This factsheet complements the findings presented in the MSNA Key Findings factsheet and the MSNA Report and aims to provide a more indepth analysis of the socio-economic status of the families with children displaced as a result of the conflict in Ukraine and living in Moldova.

METHDOLOGY

Primary data collection took place between 16 May - 31 May 2022. This assessment was a family-level survey, and covered the entirety of Moldova, excluding Transnistrian region, in all raions where local authorities reported registered refugees.¹

In total, 664 face-to-face interviews were conducted, among two strata: refugees living in the Refugee Accomodation Centers (RACs) and refugees hosted in community. Indicators in this factsheet are based on a secondary data review of the MSNA Moldova dataset through a follow-up disaggregated between the families with children and families without children. As a result, reader should note that findings are indicative only.

Findings in this factsheet comprise only a limited number of indicators, as a large majority of indices could not be further disaggregated by families with children and families without children due to the low number of observations in the subset.






