2. Rationale

2.1. Rationale

An estimated 6.1 million Syrians are internally displaced⁷ as of November 2019. Of this population, a large proportion live in IDP sites such as formal camps, collective centres, and informal tented settlements. In northeast Syria, there are at least 260 informal sites and settlements with a combined population of 66,500 households. Displacement in northern Syria continues, and the increase in military activity starting on 9 October 2019 has led to as many as 220,000 people being displaced.⁸

In northeast Syria, REACH has published one previous round of light profiles on informal tented sites and collective centres.⁹ These information products are widely used and shared by the humanitarian sector. The most recent round of site and settlement profiles took place in December 2018. As it has been one year since informal sites and settlements were last profiled, and as this period has seen significant population movement in northeast Syria, there is a need for up-to-date information on the needs in these sites and settlements. REACH profiles larger refugee and IDP camps in northeast Syria and camps and sites in northwest Syria through separate research cycles.

3. Methodology

2.1. Methodology overview

Site and settlement profiling will consist of key informant (KI) interviews with community members with knowledge of the settlements and remote mapping from satellite imagery. A minimum of two KIs will be sought for each of the 278 informal sites and settlements verified by the Northeast Syria Sites and Settlements Working Group in areas where REACH has permission to collect data. KIs will be asked to provide information on indicators which they have expertise in. KIs will be asked to identify the topics they are able to answer questions on; if they do not have the expertise to answer all topics, additional KIs will be sought by seeking new contacts through engagement with the existing KI network in the area.

The data provided by KIs is used in two ways. First, it is cleaned, and summary statistics are presented in a four tabs HTML link, according to governorate. Secondly, a severity score is calculated in order to indicate sites with the highest severity of needs. The methodology used to calculate this severity score is presented in Annex 1.

2.2. Population of interest

The population of interest is displaced people (including both IDPs and refugees) in locations where multiple displaced households congregate outside of formal or informal camps (i.e. where no camp administration is present) in accessible areas of northeast Syria. Accessibility is determined by whether REACH is able to conduct the tasks necessary for the methodologies outlined below, and may be limited by factors such as permissions

from relevant actors in the area, security considerations, and time constraints. The unit of measurement will be sites/settlements.

2.3. Secondary data review

Secondary data to be used will include:

- Sphere¹⁰ and Syria-specific standards (set by sectors) for aid provision, to determine whether the reported humanitarian response is sufficient.
- Feedback and guidance notes from sectors/clusters, to make indicators and questionnaires as operationally relevant as possible.
- Reports on informal sites and settlements, to triangulate and/or confirm figures given by camp administration and camp management officials.¹¹
- Lists of informal sites and settlements, to plan data collection and decide on coverage.¹²

2.4. Primary Data Collection

- REACH enumerators will conduct interviews with key informants who possess knowledge of the sites/settlements. These interviews will be conducted either in the field or remotely via telephone, depending on the accessibility and security of the road. The primary objective of these interviews is to gather comprehensive information on various aspects, including the population size, available services, distributions, and the needs of the population. The collected data will provide valuable insights for further analysis and assessment.

KIs will be sought who work in positions where they have knowledge in one or more of the topics covered by the assessment. These could include: Resident of settlement, Community leader, Religious leader, settlement management(ngo), settlement administration (local authority) , Member of the local council (Komens), INGO worker, Local-NGO worker, Local authority worker, Teacher.

- Data collection for the first assessment in the cycle will take place between 18-29 February 2020.
- A minimum of two KIs will be sought for each site or settlement. Where these KIs do not have enough information to answer particular questions, additional KIs may be sought until all indicators have been covered. Data will be coded directly using a Kobo tool which has been developed with the input of partners and cluster working groups.
- In the case that remote data collection through REACH enumerators is not possible areas with no access will be excluded from the assessment.
- Site/settlement layout will be mapped remotely by REACH GIS staff based on satellite imagery obtained through UNOSAT and cross-referenced with KI data.

2.5. Data Processing & Analysis

Collected data will be checked daily for internal inconsistencies/logical consistency, data entry errors, unclear text entries, and suspicious enumerator response patterns, implausible responses. Data that has been flagged will be shared with the field team, who will confirm or rectify information based on follow up with Key Informants or enumerator recollections and notes. Detailed cleaning logs will be kept with information on the original information, changes made, and the reasons why data was changed. If information is determined to be inconsistent but it is not possible to determine what the correct entry should be, data points may be deleted altogether.

Data will be analysed and reported at the site level, to detail the situation within each assessed site or settlement and to measure it against humanitarian standards. Each site will be profiled separately but profiles will be published in a single, multi-page output. Visualisations will be used to illustrate findings for key indicators. Profiles will be based on KI data from camp management and camp administration officials.

KI data will be aggregated for sites where more than one KI was interviewed. Where KIs have provided conflicting categorical answers, additional KIs will be sought to clarify. The answer given by the majority of KIs will be reported, or where no majority is possible the information will be recorded to be 'not available'. Alternatively, if the answers are not mutually exclusive, all provided data will be reported. If KIs give differing numerical answers, the mean will be recorded. If the answers provided diverge to the extent that the mean is unreasonably far from either number, additional KI information will be sought. If this is not possible or does not resolve the issue, the answer will be recorded as 'not available'.

Geographic data will be used to create overview maps for the sites/settlements, which will be integrated into the factsheets. It will be checked for accuracy and aligned with satellite imagery in GIS software. Data will be aggregated for select indicators across the assessed sites to give an overview of the general situation.

Annex 1 – Severity Score

In the interest of facilitating prioritisation of informal sites for humanitarian intervention, it was previously determined that the Light Profiling data should be combined into a severity score. This severity score will be displayed in a dashboard at the site level, indicating the most vulnerable locations. In this case, “severity” is defined as, “access to goods and services which are critical to human life.” What is meant specifically is that indicators are included that have implications for the physical health of residents in the sites, such as access to sufficient and safe water, while many of those that are important but do not affect human survival, such as education, are excluded. This is a very strict definition, which was necessary in order to reduce the scope of the score while being able to highlight locations with the worst living conditions.

The severity score was developed in multiple stages. First, other relevant indices and minimum standards were consulted. This includes the Multi-dimensional Poverty Index,¹³ REACH’s Integrated Needs Tracking in South Sudan,¹⁴ the IOM IDP Sites Multi-Sectoral Needs & Vulnerability Survey,¹⁵ and the Sphere Standards.¹⁶ Based on the indicators in these, as well as our chosen definition of severity and the indices available in the Light Profiling, a preliminary set of indicators was selected. These indicators were then discussed with working group coordinators or IMOs from WASH, health, FSL, SNFI, and protection. In this way, the indicator list was updated and severity scores were assigned to each indicator and choice. Additionally, in conversation with the SSWG coordinator, weights for the sectors were assigned. After a first dummy calculation of the scores, it was determined that the livelihoods score needed to be adjusted – the score for borrowing money was reduced from 0.5 to 0.3 as this strategy is used in virtually all sites, and such the score was not capturing differences between sites.

The indicators, scores, and weights are presented on the following page. Scores are assigned to choices, such that there are many individual scores per indicator. The score then given to the indicator is usually determined by the “worst”, i.e. the most severe, choice selected by KIs. For instance, for Health2, if the KIs indicated that households could not afford health services (score 0.75) and that health facilities are overcrowded (score 0.25), then the score for Health2 is 0.75. The only exception to this rule is Health1, where the reverse is true – if the location has a pharmacy (score 0.75) and a public hospital (score 0), then the score for Health1 is 0. Furthermore, for the indicator Food1 captures the coping strategies used to mitigate a lack of food and the estimated percentage of households that use this coping strategy. These two indicators are combined by multiplying the severity of the coping strategy with its prevalence. For instance, borrowing money to buy food receives a score of 0.30. If the KI estimated that 26-50% of households were borrowing money, then the score of 0.30 is multiplied by the prevalence of 0.38 for an overall score of 0.13.

Note that due to the scoring system, indicators do not capture if there are multiple severe problems present in a location. For instance, if there is a lack of transportation to health facilities and a lack of ambulance services, this is likely worse than if ambulance services were functioning. However, the score remains the same whether or not ambulances are functioning. The reason for this is due to the KI methodology. KIs are most likely to note the most severe problems, but will not necessarily report every problem. Some KIs will likely list a greater

number of problems than others, depending on their engagement in the interview, time constraints, knowledge of the sector, and other factors. As such, it is assumed that information on the most severe problems will be more accurate and comparable across sites than a complete list of issues.

Sector scores, and the total severity score, are calculated as weighted averages. Note that the FSL sector was split into a food and a livelihoods score, and the WASH sector was split into water on one side, and sanitation and hygiene on the other. This was done as these sectors are relatively diverse, and the aim was to make the individual scores more homogenous. In doing so, it also became possible to assign higher weights for food and water, with the logic that these are the most foundational human needs that most directly impact human life.

The severity score will initially be a pilot, to be reviewed by humanitarian response partners working in informal sites. The purpose of this review is to ensure that the scores reflect the situation on the ground. If any issues arise, there will be two approaches. The first is to ensure that the selection of indicators, choices, and scores capture the key problems noted by response partners. The second is to ensure that the KI information accurately reflects the observations of response partners on the ground.

Although measures have been taken to ensure the severity score accurately captures the severity needs in informal sites, the score has several limitations. The first is that the KI methodology only provides indicative information, and that the quality of this information differs by sector. The FSL coordinator particularly noted this, with key concerns that KI information food-related household behaviours will be very inaccurate. It was suggested to incorporate a “credibility weight”, which would weight indicators on public behaviours, such as begging or accepting socially degrading jobs, more highly, while reducing the weight for private behaviours, such as reducing meal sizes or skipping meals. However, in the absence of reliable information on the accuracy of KI responses, this risks introducing new biases, which is why this approach was not taken.

Additionally, while a clear process was set out for the indicator selection and scoring, it is ultimately both subjective and constrained by the availability of data. Risks include that key issues may be omitted, that the scoring of sectors may not be comparable, and that the final score is too broad to inform on actual needs. To mitigate this, the score will be open to feedback by humanitarian partners on the ground. Within the dashboard, the sector scores as well as the indicators within the sectors will be visible, enabling users to better understand why specific sites score better or worse.
