

Rapid Response Mechanism: Central African Republic

2016* and 2017 (June 2017) Factsheet

* This factsheet covers the period from January to June 2017 and compares it with the period from January to June 2016.



The Rapid Response Mechanism (RRM) is designed to monitor humanitarian action, conduct multisector assessments, emergency NFI distributions and WASH interventions when there is no capacity on site. Currently, RRM is made possible through the generous support of the CERF, Denmark, Ireland, Canada, European Commission's Humanitarian Aid and Civil Protection Department (ECHO), Global Thematic, OFDA, Japan, CHF and SIDA. 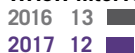

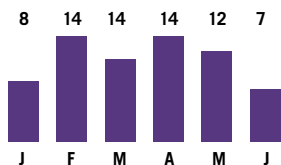

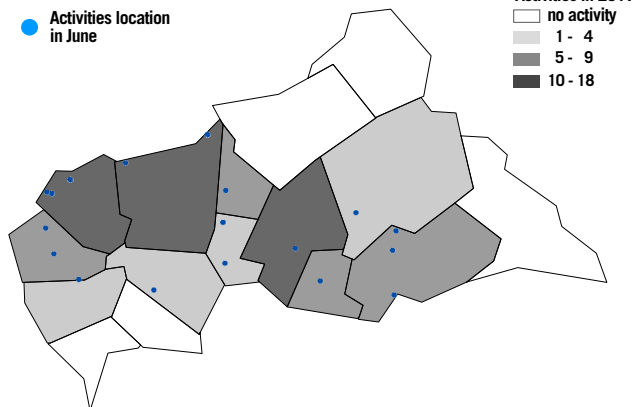

(MEX, MSA, NFI distributions and WASH interventions)

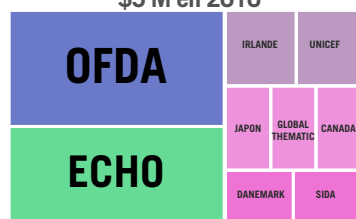


Fundings

To meet the immediate needs of families within 15 days of violence and/or displacement, the RRM is seeking \$1 million to support 180,000 children and families, by:

- Providing emergency shelter to families who have had their homes destroyed
- Installing safe water points and latrines in displacement sites
- Distributing essential items like soap, jerry cans, sleeping mats, buckets and blankets

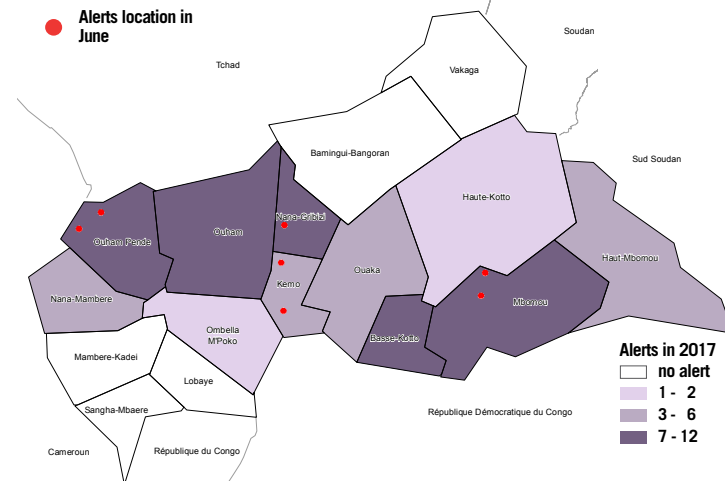
