

BOR PoC Snapshot

Bor South County, Jonglei State, South Sudan

July 2015

Summary

The Bor protection of civilian (PoC) site was established in December 2013 following outbreaks of violence which forced people into the UNMISS base for refuge. The PoC was relocated to the new Bor PoC Site in September 2014.

Demographic data was provided by IOM (as of 13/07/2015), spatial data and shelter data was provided by REACH (as of 23/01/2015) and all other data was provided by camp management (as of 29/06/2015).

Key Developments

Bor PoC has experienced a small but steady decrease in population over the recent months. Despite this general decrease, occasional new arrivals have also been noted, most of these are joining relatives or friends already living in the PoC.

Camp Management has been working on reinforcing leadership structures within the site with particular focus on efforts to formalise terms of reference for camp committees, creating referral pathways, allowing all partners in the PoC to make efficient and confidential referrals for GBV and general protection concerns as well as for and accountability mechanisms such as a Community Feedback Mechanism desk, staffed by ACTED, where PoC residents can provide feedback on services provided or lodge complaints. This allows for transparency on services and an improved accountability from service providers towards the community. Measures to prepare for and mitigate the effects of the upcoming rainy season are also ongoing, with longstanding gaps in flood preparation measures, such preparation remains a priority. Other needs reported by camp management include the provision of professional psychosocial support for the community, still in shock after the events of April 2014, and primary education


