Background & Methodology


Since the escalation of hostilities on February 24th 2022, more than 10 million refugees have reportedly fled Ukraine, with 732,939 refugees arriving in the Republic of Moldova and 100,494 remaining in the country as of December 27th (UNHCR). To respond to their needs, the Moldovan authorities have established a total of 133 Refugee Accommodation Centres (RACs) across the country, of which 67 remained active at the end of 2022.

To understand the needs of these Centres, REACH, in partnership with the National Agency for Social Assistance (ANAS) and with the support of UNHCR and ACTED, began conducting key informant interviews (KIIs) with purposefully selected RAC focal points who reported on the situation in the Centres. The first round of data collection took place on March 14th 2022 and monitoring will continue in 2023.

For the last round of the year, which took place on December 27th 2022, interviews were conducted with representatives from 65 Centres. Additionally, this factsheet provides an overview of findings from March 14th to December 27th 2022.

Findings should be considered indicative.


Locations of RACs opened in 2022

Reported RAC capacity











Total people and children hosted in RACs and occupancy rate






Most frequent places of origin of people arriving at the RACs as reported by KIs




Most frequent destinations of people leaving the RACs as reported by KIs
