2. Rationale

2.1. Rationale

An estimated 6.1 million Syrians are internally displaced⁷ as of November 2019. Of this population, a large proportion live in IDP sites such as formal camps, collective centres, and informal tented settlements. In northeast Syria, there are 11 formal and large informal camps for IDPs and refugees with a combined population of 27,000 households. Displacement in northern Syria continues, and the increase in military activity starting on 9 October 2019 has led to as many as 220,000 additional people being displaced.⁸

In northeast Syria, REACH has published six rounds of profiles and detailed maps (full profiling using household surveys, key informant interviews and infrastructure mapping) on the formal and large informal camps in the region, as well as four rounds of light profiles on informal tented settlements and collective centres. These information products are widely used and shared by the humanitarian sector. The most recent round of data collection took place between 22 September and 3 October 2019, immediately before the increase in military operations. As a result of these operations, two of the surveyed camps were closed and their inhabitants transferred to other camps in NES; two further camps which were in the process of being decommissioned have been reactivate; and at least one new camp has been opened. Therefore there is an urgent need for up-to-date information on the services and needs in camps since October 2019. Separate research cycles will look at camps in northwest Syria and informal sites and settlements in northeast Syria.

3. Methodology

2.1. Methodology overview

The camp profiling will consist of key informant (KI) interviews with camp administration officials and a mapping of infrastructure in the target locations. The research cycle covers 11 formal and informal camps in northeast Syria. However, the first assessment of the research cycle will target the three camps which are the highest priority for updated information: Areesheh, Abu Khashab and Washokani. While household surveys have been used in previous camp assessments, resources and access in northeast Syria do not currently allow for data to be collected at household level. Should circumstances change, household-level assessments could be reintroduced as part of the research cycle methodology.

2.2. Population of interest

The population of interest is displaced people (including both IDPs and refugees) in locations where multiple displaced households congregate (i.e. camps and other sites) in accessible areas of northeast Syria. Accessibility is determined by whether REACH or partner enumerators are able to conduct the tasks necessary for the methodologies outlined below, and may be limited by factors such as permissions from relevant actors in the area, security considerations, and time constraints. The unit of measurement will be camps/sites.

2.3. Secondary data review

Secondary data to be used will include:

- Satellite imagery procured via partners, to be used in camp maps and, if relevant, to check provision of services against Sphere and Syria-specific standards.
- Sphere and Syria-specific standards (set by sectors) for aid provision, to determine whether the reported humanitarian response is sufficient.
- Feedback and guidance notes from sectors/clusters, to make indicators and questionnaires as operationally relevant as possible.
- Reports on camp population sizes, to triangulate and/or confirm figures given by camp administration and camp management officials.
- Lists of informal camps and sites, to plan data collection and decide on coverage.

2.4. Primary Data Collection

- REACH enumerators will carry out in-person interviews with the NGOs or local authorities charged with managing
 registration and overseeing services in the camp, in order to get additional information on the number of individuals
 in the camp, as well as available services, distributions, needs of the population, and more.
- Data collection for the first assessment in the cycle will take place between 26 January and 6 February 2020.
- A minimum of two KIs will be sought for each camp (e.g. one from camp management and one from camp administration). Where these KIs do not have enough information to answer particular questions, additional KIs from implementation partners may be sought until all indicators have been covered. Data will be coded directly using a Kobo tool which has been developed with the input of partners and cluster working groups.
- In the case that access is not available, other options will be explored, including using partners to collect data and remote data collection, depending on the circumstances.

- Mapping of camp/site layout and infrastructure, to create detailed maps for use in operations and planning. Mapping
 will cover all key infrastructure, including but not limited to latrines, showers, schools, healthcare facilities, safe
 spaces, sports fields, and NGO/UN offices.
- Mapping will be carried out by enumerators on site by entering GPS points of key infrastructure on the Kobo tool.
 Surveys will be based on a grid map of the camp, to ensure all areas are covered. On-site mapping will be supplemented with satellite imagery obtained through UNOSAT.

2.5. Data Processing & Analysis

Collected data will be checked daily for internal inconsistencies, data entry errors, and unclear text entries. Data that has been flagged will be shared with the field team, who will confirm or rectify information based on follow up with KIs or enumerator recollections and notes. Detailed cleaning logs will be kept with information on the original information, changes made, and the reasons why data was changed. If information is determined to be inconsistent but it is not possible to determine what the correct entry should be, data points may be deleted altogether.

Data will be analysed and reported at the site level, to detail the situation within each assessed camp and/or site and to measure it against humanitarian standards. Visualisations will be used to illustrate findings for key indicators. Profiles will be based on KI data from camp management and camp administration officials.

KI data will be aggregated for camps where more than one KI was interviewed. Where KIs have provided conflicting categorical answers, the answer given by the majority of KIs will be reported or the information will be recorded to be 'not available'. Alternatively, if the answers are not mutually exclusive, all provided data will be reported. If KIs give differing numerical answers, the mean will be recorded. If the answers provided diverge to the extent that the mean is unreasonably far from either number, the answer will be recorded as 'not available'.

Geographic data will be used to create overview maps for the factsheets and combined with satellite imagery to create large stand-alone camp infrastructure maps. It will be checked for accuracy and cleaned to remove data collection errors and align data with satellite imagery in GIS software. Geographic data may also be used to compare the services available on the ground to Sphere standards or standards specific to the Syria response. Finally, data will be aggregated for select indicators across the assessed camps, to give an overview of the general situation.
