





Moldova: Refugee Accommodation Centres (RACs) Monthly Needs Monitoring

Update as of 25.04.2023


Background & Methodology

- The national authorities established a total of 136 Refugee Accommodation Centres (RACs) across the country, of which 60 remained active by 25 April 2023.
- Key informant interviews were conducted with purposefully selected RAC focal points who reported on the situation in the Centres.
- This factsheet presents the results of the data collection rounds that took place on 10 and 25 April 2023 through phone interviews. The former round covered 54 out of 62 active Centres, and the latter - 57 out of 60 active Centres.

Round-specific findings

- On 27 March 2023, 65 RACs were active. Six Centres closed and one opened since
- The top three most requested categories of items include personal hygiene items (requested by 33% of Centres), cleaning products (28% of RACs), and food products (16%).
- The number of people moving into the Centres from the host community is still low, standing below 1%.

% of active RACs by hosting capacity






Locations of assessed RACs

Most requested items by RACs

Below is an overview of items most frequently requested by RACs during structured phone interviews with KIs. It should be noted that in view of the high rotation of refugees going in and out of RACs, the requested items are based on ongoing requirements for normal RAC functioning. These requests do not necessarily mean RACs do not currently have the requested items. Rather, these requests may be based on forward-looking considerations about maintaining steady supplies. Hot meals have been distributed by the government, UN agencies, NGOs and local organisations, and no major shortages of essential food items have been reported.


