## 2. Rationale

### 2.1. Rationale

With the conflict in Syria in its ninth year, the situation in the north-western part of the country remains extremely unstable. As the last opposition-controlled territory in the country, northwest Syria has witnessed extremely high numbers of IDP arrivals, particularly in the last year, leading to increased pressure on resources and services. Since late April 2019, an escalation of shelling and bombardments in southern Idlib and northern Hama governorates has forced hundreds of thousands of civilians to flee to more stable areas in the north of Idlib and west of Aleppo, seeking refuge in areas already hosting a significant number of Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs). In September 2019 alone, Idlib saw 58,607 displaced individuals, with 57,824 of them coming from other more conflict-affected areas within the governorate, while Aleppo

governorate recorded 43,086 displaced individuals, mainly from Idleb (76%) or other areas of Aleppo (22%)<sup>2</sup>. These continuous arrivals of highly vulnerable populations increase the pressure on already overcrowded camps and overburdened infrastructures and services. With the winter season approaching and temperatures dropping, recently displaced households are particularly at risk and in need of urgent humanitarian assistance.<sup>3</sup> However, major information gaps remain regarding priority needs for these populations in an area where the ability to provide assistance remains contingent on partners' level of access, which is highly sensitive to recent rapid changes in context.

While the CCCM cluster provides a monthly-updated list of registered camps and sites in northwest Syria including population numbers, more extensive information on the needs and priority is limited, particularly at the household level. In addition, there is a considerable lack of information surrounding IDPs who reside in unregistered sites and receive less formalised humanitarian support. The Multi-sectoral Needs Assessment (MSNA) household level survey conducted in August 2019 in coordination with clusters to inform the 2020 Humanitarian Needs Overview (HNO) provided a snapshot of multi-sectoral humanitarian needs across the whole of Syria, but the methodology did not allow for representation or disaggregation at the camps and sites level. Based on these limitations identified in coordination with OCHA, clusters, and partners on the ground, REACH will conduct an assessment to fill this information gap and provide information on the needs and humanitarian situation for people living in camps and sites in northwest Syria. This assessment aims to inform the overall humanitarian response in camps and sites for IDPs in the assessed area by providing humanitarian actors with multi-sectoral information on demographics, access to services, needs and priorities for the assessed population.

### 3. Methodology

#### 2.1. Methodology overview

The present assessment has been developed as a quantitative survey that will aim to provide a snapshot of the humanitarian situation in camps and sites in assessed areas at the household level. Data for this assessment will be collected in collaboration with the Humanitarian Needs Assessment Programme (HNAP). While REACH is responsible for research design, data processing, analysis, output production, and dissemination, HNAP will lead on collecting data. Data collection is planned to start on the 28 January and continue for two to three weeks. This assessment will assess both registered and unregistered sites in Northwest Syria.

##### **Registered Sites:**

According to the November CCCM IDP Sites Integrated Monitoring Matrix (ISIMM) list, Dana sub-district has both the highest number of sites and highest number of IDPs residing in sites, with 385 sites out of the total 578, and 93,621 IDP families out of the total 158,634. Geographic groups of camps and sites within Dana sub-district have been divided by CCCM into 14 different "clusters". To facilitate data collection, when sampling, these 14 different "clusters" have been aggregated into six target areas by REACH. Of the other 21 IDP hosting sub-districts, no other sub-district hosts such a notably high number of IDPs. This high concentration of IDPs within a single sub-district has been taken into account in designing the methodology. REACH will create a sample frame by triangulating the November ISIMM list published by CCCM with the January CCCM-HNAP IDP population snapshot. This triangulated dataset will include all registered camps and sites in Northwest Syria.

##### **Unregistered Sites:**

Unregistered sites in Northwest Syria host a large number of IDPs. Due to the dynamic nature of displacement and site formation, there are considerable information gaps around both the location and demographics of unregistered sites in the region. To inform its sample, REACH will triangulate a list of sites receiving humanitarian

assistance in November from the WASH cluster, with an undisclosed November REACH-CCCM list of camps and sites.

A stratified two-stage random sample methodology will be used to draw the sample, with the probability of a site being selected proportionate to its population relative to other sites in the cluster/sub-district. A 10% buffer will be added to the total sample for the cluster/sub-district in order to account for potential errors, such as missing forms. Sampling will include six aggregated “clusters” of registered sites in Dana sub-district, sub-districts hosting more than 10,000 IDPs in registered sites, and sub-districts hosting more than 4,500 IDPs in unregistered sites. This selection criteria has been informed through discussions around operational relevance and data collection constraints with both CCCM and HNAP. The findings will be representative at a 90% confidence level and a 10% margin of error, to the cluster level in Dana sub-district, and to the sub-district level in areas hosting less IDPs.

REACH will continuously monitor the security access constraints in the target locations and will re-draw the sample if locations turn out to be inaccessible.

## 2.2. Population of interest

The main population of interest for this assessment is IDPs living in camps and sites in assessed sub-districts of northwest Syria. IDPs are defined as *‘Individuals or groups of people who have been forced to leave their communities of origin, in particular as a result of or in order to avoid the effects of armed conflict, situations of generalised violence, violations of human rights, or natural or man-made disasters, and who have not crossed an international border.’*

The assessment will survey households, as per the level of main information gaps identified together with clusters and partners working in the ground for the considered area. The geographical focus has been established prioritizing areas with the highest number of IDPs in camps and sites, based on the fact that IDPs are more likely to face difficulties accessing humanitarian services and assistance, especially in recently established camps and informal sites that are more likely to be underserved by NGO partners. Accessibility constraints such as permissions from relevant actors in the area, security considerations, and time constraints will also be taken into account to determine the precise sample and the final coverage that might be adjusted, as explained further below.

## 2.3. Secondary data review

Available secondary data sources will be used to triangulate primary data collection and will include data collected through the Humanitarian Situation Overview in Syria (HSOS) in covered sub-districts in northern Idlib and western Aleppo governorates, REACH Northwest Syria Camps and Sites most recent sweeps, population and displacement numbers assessed on an ongoing basis as part of the CCCM Cluster’s continuous monitoring of the situation, as well as other available data from REACH, UN agencies, and other humanitarian bodies, and media and open source reports.

## 2.4. Primary Data Collection

### Data collection methods

Household-level data will be collected by HNAP. Data collection will start on 28 January, and will last two weeks. Data will be uploaded to HNAPs own server, and they will share this with REACH twice a week during the data collection process, to allow for the checking of data quality and enumerator follow-ups. Follow-up on submissions will be conducted as quickly as possible, to ensure the timely provision of feedback from field teams and allow for meaningful and quality corrections to the data.

Data will be collected directly through ODK software via mobile devices. REACH will design a Kobo questionnaire based on tools already developed and tested in previous assessments such as the REACH Camps and Sites assessments in Northeast Syria and the Syria Multi-Sectoral Needs Assessment (MSNA) 2019. These tools have also been reviewed in coordination with all relevant clusters, and inputs and remarks have been taken into account developing the present

questionnaire. REACH will provide induction and training to HNAP teams to ensure all field teams have a common understanding of the questions and indicators to be measured, and definitions are mainstreamed among all teams.

### **Sampling**

Data will be collected at the household level, representative with 90% confidence and a 10% margin of error at the “cluster” level in Dana sub-district – which hosts the vast majority of IDPs – and at the sub-district level for other sub-districts with fewer IDPs. A stratified two stage-random sample will be used to draw the sample for assessed areas. This will ensure that all camps and sites in the target cluster/sub-district have a probability of being selected that is proportionate to their population relative to other sites in the target cluster/sub-district. REACH will draw samples from different population data sources to create separate samples for registered and unregistered sites:

#### **Registered Sites:**

REACH will include all registered sites in Northwest Syria in its sample. This population data will be drawn from triangulating the January CCCM-HNAP population snapshot data with the November ISIMM list. The January CCCM-HNAP population snapshot data includes all registered camps and sites in Northwest Syria that have seen a change in population between 1 December 2019 and 15 January 2020. This data will be corroborated with the November ISIMM list that contains the population information of all registered sites in Northwest Syria as of the 30 November 2019. Due to data collection constraints, only sub-districts hosting more than 10,000 IDPs in registered camps and sites will be selected for data collection. As Dana sub-district hosts the most IDPs in registered camps and sites, the sample will be conducted at the “cluster” level. As of November, CCCM has divided Dana sub-districts into 14 “clusters”, based on population size and spatial proximity, REACH has aggregated these 14 “clusters” into six target areas from which six independent samples will be drawn.

#### **Unregistered Sites:**

REACH will only include unregistered camps and sites in Northwest Syria that have both received humanitarian support from the WASH cluster, and been identified by REACH in their ongoing camps and sites mapping assessments. These ongoing REACH mapping assessments ensure each identified unregistered site is prescribed a GPS coordinate and unique identifying code. Population and site information will be triangulated between the December REACH camps and sites mapping assessment, and information provided by the WASH cluster of unregistered sites receiving humanitarian assistance when creating the sample. The rationale behind corroborating population and site data with the WASH cluster, is to ensure that the proposed sites have previously granted permission to receiving humanitarian support. Only sub-districts hosting more than 4,500 IDPs will be selected for data collection.

For all target areas, a 10% buffer will be added to the total sample for the cluster/sub-district in order to account for potential errors, such as missing forms. HNAP field staff will review the January CCCM-HNAP IDP population snapshot and indicate if they know any sites that are not accessible before drawing the sample, which will subsequently be removed from the sampling frame. If during data collection it is discovered that there is no way for any partner to cover the site, the sample distribution for the cluster/sub-district will be adjusted. Any communities that are excluded due to a loss of coverage during data collection will be logged and reported as a limitation in the final dataset methodology tab.

For security reasons and due to limitations in terms of available information on camps and sites boundaries, it is in most cases not possible to share maps of targeted locations with enumerators to ensure a random selection of households. Instead, HNAP field coordinators will ensure enumerators are distributed throughout the camp/site before spinning a bottle to randomly determine the direction of which they should move towards before sampling the nearest household. Possible access limitations, unclear camp/site boundaries, and variable camp/site size will all be considered during selection. Sampling guidelines will be shared with enumerators and field coordinators in Arabic in order to ensure that households are selected randomly across the community.



Once enumerators arrive at a household, they will introduce themselves and the assessment to the first adult (18 or older) member of the household and ask for their approval to take part in this assessment. Enumerators will not interview any children below the age of 15. However, the enumerators will interview children between the ages of 15 and 17 in the unique case that the child is the head of household. Once approval to take part in this interview has been confirmed, enumerators will need to enter basic information about occupants (i.e. head of household, non-head of household speaking on behalf of head of household, non-head of household etc.) and their geographical location into the mobile Kobo form. The survey will then proceed, where based on a structured questionnaire, enumerators will ask household heads a limited number of questions about demographics, movement intentions, shelter and non-food items (NFIs), sanitation and hygiene (WASH), education, protection, health, food and livelihoods along with priority needs to gather information at the household level.

## 2.5. Data Processing & Analysis

Incoming data will be checked and cleaned using an automated cleaning sheet file, and follow-ups will be done with field teams where discrepancies or issues were discovered. Submitted raw data will be cleaned based on follow up responses and all changes to the data will be logged. Data will also be triangulated with available secondary data on assessed communities. This will allow data to be reliable and coherent and then to be compared before conducting the analysis.

Data from the assessment will be analysed and reported on at the cluster level for Dana sub-district and at the sub-district level for the others. The data will also be weighted and aggregated to higher geographic levels (Northern Aleppo and Idleb Governorate) in order to produce outputs that provides actors with an overview of the multi-sector needs of IDP households in camps and sites in the wider area.
