2. Rationale

2.1. Rationale

Since the start of the conflict within Syria in 2011, large-scale displacement has occurred in North-West Syria, and the region has provided temporary shelter to IDPs from across the whole country as the conflict has continued. The result of this ongoing displacement has been the formation of a series of large IDP camp and sites clusters in the governorates of Aleppo and Idleb with CCCM figures from October 2019 estimating 426 camps and sites in this region.

The recent escalation of conflict in North-West Syria between the Government of Syria forces and armed opposition groups has led to an increase of civilian population movements away from conflict areas. Currently, newly arrived IDPs to camps and sites are particularly vulnerable due the onset of winter, in addition to their recent displacement. There is currently little information on which camps and sites are receiving newly arrived IDPs and their priority needs, specifically in sites not registered with CCCM and cluster members.

3. Methodology

2.1. Methodology overview

Primary data collection will be conducted by REACH enumerators, visiting sites and remotely contacting Key Informants (KIs) in hard-to-reach locations. Data will be collected using structured closed-question KI interviews requesting information at the camp/site level.

For data collection, one community KI who is knowledgeable about surrounding camps and sites will provide information to enumerators regarding numbers of camps, newly arrived IDPs, their intentions and priority needs. In some communities

more than one KI may be contacted by enumerators due to either the size of the community or the knowledge of the first KI interviewed.

2.2. Population of interest

The population of interest is newly arrived IDPs, that have been displaced within the last week, in locations where multiple displaced households congregate (i.e. camps and other sites) in determined sub-districts in northern Idleb (Armanaz, Salqin, Harim, Kafr Takharim, Maaret Tamsrin, Qourqeena, Dana) and western Aleppo (Atareb).

2.3. Primary Data Collection

Data collection will occur over three days. Data will be collected by REACH enumerators who will remotely contact KIs or meet with them face-to-face. Data collection will begin on the 25 December and run over three days. Enumerators will collect data from camps and sites within the specified sub-districts as outlined above.

A threshold has been set within the Kobo tool so that only camps and sites will be assessed to which five or more IDP households have arrived in the past week. Key informants will be asked to provide information on the number of IDP individual arrivals, the intentions of IDPs and the priority needs of newly arrived IDPs.

2.5. Data Processing & Analysis

Data cleaning will take place on a daily basis and will include follow-up to address errors and outliers. Data cleaning logs and the raw data will be kept. A data deletion report will be maintained to track any information excluded from the raw data following data cleaning. The collected data will be analysed using Excel to answer the research questions. Analysis will consist of comparing basic descriptive statistics such as the relative frequency of answers given and the means of numeric variables across sub-district and types of sites.

This analysis will be presented in a dataset as well as a factsheet that may also contain geographic representations of the data made using ArcPro. Lastly, the collected data will be anonymized to create a dataset that can be easily used by other partners.
