## 2. Rationale

### 2.1. Rationale

The conflict in north and central Iraq, from late 2013 to 2017, resulted in large-scale displacement of populations inside and outside the country. Since the Government of Iraq (GoI) declared victory over the Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant (ISIL) in 2017, displaced Iraqis have returned to their homes. However, as of September 2021, 1,189, 581 IDPs continue to be displaced in Iraq<sup>8</sup>. According to a recent survey published in September 2021 by the International Organization for Migration's (IOM) Displacement Tracking Matrix (DTM), 103,005 individuals from 17,416 households are still displaced in 415 informal sites all across the country.<sup>9</sup> The highest number of informal sites are located in Sumail District, in Dohuk Governorate, with 128 informal sites, followed by 33 informal sites in Al-Mosul district, in Ninewa governorate.

Whilst the humanitarian situation in Iraq has been improving over the past few years as the country transitions into a stabilization context<sup>10</sup>, there are still barriers to end protracted displacement for IDPs, including for those living in informal sites. With the Iraq National Plan's aim to relocate IDPs back to their Areas of Origin (AoO)<sup>11</sup>, a number of issues are preventing relocation in the country such as the lack of livelihoods, security and HLP documentation. At the same time, a range of basic needs are being unmet, as the 2021 Multi-Cluster Needs Assessment results show<sup>12</sup>. In this nationwide survey, IDPs that were assessed in informal sites reported that their top unmet needs were mainly in shelter/housing, food, livelihoods and healthcare.

In addition, REACH, in coordination with the CCCM Cluster, has conducted regular rounds of Informal Site Profiling and Intentions of IDPs since 2016. These assessments have been conducted in order to support strategic and evidence-based programming and inform inter-cluster coordination covering shelter, WASH, health, food security, livelihoods, education, and safety and security, in order to identify priority needs. Furthermore, as durable solutions become an increasing priority in the country, the assessment will seek to highlight IDP intentions to facilitate this priority.

## 3. Methodology

## 3.1. Methodology overview

Informal sites are, by definition, not recognized or regularly supported by the government. However, they are subject to CCCM monitoring, referral, and advocacy. The CCCM cluster in Iraq defines it at as follows<sup>13</sup>:

- "Site where more than 5 displaced households have settled collectively<sup>14</sup>
- Sites not built to accommodate people, but serving that purpose, set up on state-owned or private land/buildings<sup>15</sup>
- IDP families are living in the site as a group, possibly with shared leadership
- Shelter is sub-standard (critical shelter) e.g. tents, improvised shelters, unfinished buildings, or buildings not meant for living in e.g. schools, mosques
- Facilities in the site are likely sub-standard. Families share basic public/communal services and facilities, e.g. WASH facilities.
- Government authorities have not assumed responsibility for management and administration
- Services and assistance are delivered collectively, and even if available are not provided regularly
- Land use is conflicting, or not in line with, the land use for the location as defined by approved urban master plans and/or detailed plans, if any
- Degraded urban environment"

Informal sites will be identified using the informal sites Masterlist disseminated by IOM-DTM and the CCCM cluster in September 2021<sup>16</sup>. The criteria for site identification and prioritisation will be sites which include populations of 30 or more families. However, this methodology will not apply to the following six sub-districts; Markaz Sumail, Fayde, Markaz Mosul, Markaz Zakho, Ba'adre, and Markaz Shirqat sub-districts. In these sub-districts, all informal sites identified in the Masterlist will be included in the sampling, without taking into account the number of families residing in these sites. This choice is based on a request from operational partners, highlighting that a significant number of informal sites would be taken out of the sampling frame for these sub-districts if the threshold of 30 families was applied in these areas. Results would therefore be more difficult to operationalize. In order to work towards a better operationalisation of the data being collected, the two different selection criteria were retained, depending on the geographical area. Primary data collection will consist of family surveys; however, due to access and security issues, as well as

potential movement restrictions related to COVID-19 containment measures, data collection will be conducted remotely via phone<sup>17</sup> or face-to-face, depending on the situation in the location at the time of data collection.

Data cleaning will be conducted on a daily basis during data collection and data that is deemed inconsistent will be highlighted and shared with the filed team for clarification. Once data collection is completed and data cleaning finalized, data will be displayed from family level to site level and then presented in governorate profiles.

#### Family interviews

REACH will use the GPS coordinates indicated in the Masterlist, to then serve as a starting point to choose randomly the families to survey in the sites, to orientate the field team to reach the target number of surveys per sub-district. Data collection for this round of the Informal Sites Profiling and Intentions assessment is scheduled to being on 05 December 2021 and data collection will last until 16 January 2022. A cluster sampling approach (90% level of confidence and a 10% margin of error) will be employed at sub-district level so the total number of surveys targeted for this round of Informal Sites Profiling and Intentions is 2,364 family surveys to gather sub-district level representation. The minimum cluster size is 30 for all strata except Ba'adre, Markaz Al-Shirqat, and Markaz Zakho where the minimum cluster size is 5, as the number of populations per site in these three sub-districts is very low. The Primary Sampling Units (PSUs) are informal sites and the Secondary Sampling Units (SSUs) are families. In the sampling, design effect was taken into account (Intraclass correlation coefficient (ICC) is .06).

#### Key informant interviews

Two types of respondents were identified; key informants and families. Key informants will be surveyed for general information on the site, and one key informant will be surveyed per site. Families will be asked the second set of questions, which informs a preidentified set of indicators (see Data Analysis Plan below). Both types of answers will be gathered for the analysis, however the information coming from key informants will be interpreted as indicative.

#### 3.2. Population of interest

#### Family interviews

The population of interest includes IDPs residing in selected informal sites<sup>18</sup> in accessible locations in Iraq. Accessibility is determined by presence of relevant actors in the area, security considerations, and movement restrictions. The families will be assessed at site level and findings will be aggregated to site, sub-district and governorate level.

#### Key informant interviews

Key informants include, but are not limited to, mukhtars, tribal leaders, site representatives, or any other respondents that are deemed by the field team to have a sufficient knowledge of the overall site.

#### 3.3. Secondary data review

This assessment will make use of data from IOM-DTM and CCCM cluster Masterlist on informal sites<sup>19</sup> to provide locations, site profiles, and site population sizes. Geo-spatial data, such as UNOSAT satellite imagery will be used to plot informal site locations during data collection and may be used to visualize data collection coverage in the outputs.

Secondary data sources to be reviewed include:

- REACH and CCCM's Intentions Survey reports, tools, and datasets, conducted on out-of-camp IDP population;
- REACH and CCCM's Camp Profiling Survey factsheets, tools, and datasets;
- REACH and CCCM's last Informal Sites Profiling assessment report, tools, and datasets;
- CCCM's RASP and Rapid RASP tools and datasets; and

- Other relevant assessments or reports in any sector informing the informal sites that are assessed, or any relevant topics to triangulate the findings of the survey.

#### 3.4. Primary Data Collection

REACH, in coordination with the CCCM Cluster, will conduct an assessment of informal sites, selected according to agreed parameters and located using IOM-DTM's dataset. Data collection is conducted by REACH enumerators, under the supervision of REACH Field Coordinators and Assessment Officer. Data tracking sheets will be created to enable feedback on data cleaning between the Field Coordinator and enumerators, each day, as well as tracking sheets to determine progress of data collection in each location, data submitted each evening, and follow-up sent and received between the Assessment Officer and field teams. In addition, debriefs with the assessment and field teams will occur once a week to discuss and integrate feedback.

REACH has prepared three scenarios based on different operational contexts, determined by movement restrictions and safety concerns. In-person data collection, either conducted by REACH or its partner organisations, will be implemented as often as the context allows, following assessments on the situation. Partner organisations are responsible for undertaking their own evaluation to assess the feasibility of in-person data collection<sup>20</sup>. Whenever in-person data collection cannot be conducted, either by REACH or its partners, enumerators will carry on phone-based interviews.

#### 3.4.1 Identifying Sites

Based on IOM-DTM and CCCM cluster informal sites Masterlist, with the criteria of the number of families applied, 185 sites will be visited, with 2364 families surveyed in total. However, the final number of assessed sites will depend on any new sites identified during the assessment, and the accessibility of sites for REACH data collection teams. The final list of sites will be disaggregated by governorate and sub-district. Initially sites will be assessed in 9 governorates and 39 sub-districts. See Annex 1 for a full list of sub-districts.

### 3.4.2 Informal Sites Profiling and Intentions Data Collection

The REACH field team will follow the random GPS points generated by the GIS officer, to guide them in conducting the face-toface data collection. International or national organisations that agree to provide support for this round of data collection will also provide REACH with a list of key informants to be contacted, in case a) the enumerators would not find an informal site in the area where the GPS coordinates lead them, b) in case the enumerators have to switch to remote data collection. If the site does not meet the criteria for the assessment, i.e. the site is empty, it does not meet the correct definition of an informal site, or there are no critical shelters within the site, the enumerator will record the reasons the site does not meet the assessment criteria and then not conduct the interview.

In order to assist in data collection, Field Coordinators and enumerators will be trained on the Informal Sites Profiling and Intentions questionnaire, focusing on the updates to the tool and the change in methodology.

#### 3.4.3 Data collection scenarios

The design and implementation of data collection activities will be contingent on the operational context in Iraq, which includes, but is not limited to, the evolution of the COVID-19 pandemic and access situation in the country. In particular, considerations around movement restrictions and barriers in conducting face-to-face interviews are factors in the decision about which sampling and data collection methodology will be employed in each district.

Based upon the latest assessments of the COVID-19 spread and access restrictions in Iraq, it is unlikely that face-to-face data collection will be able to take place in all sub-districts. Despite the recognised severity of COVID-19 in Iraq it is possible that for certain districts, safety concerns to enumerators and respondents will be marginal and that physical access to those districts will be possible.

In this situation, a mixed methodology form of data collection is envisioned with data for certain districts being collected through face-to-face interviews and data for other districts being collected through remote phone-based interviews, as seen in Table 2. Scenario 2. Due to the rapidly changing context, as well as the unpredictable nature of the COVID-19 crisis in Iraq, data collection plans will have to contain a certain degree of flexibility and adaptability.

#### 3.4.4 Face-to-Face Sampling

#### Family interviews

A cluster sampling approach (90% level of confidence and a 10% margin of error) will be employed at sub-district level so the total number of surveys targeted for this round of Informal Sites Profiling and Intentions is 2,364 family surveys to gather sub-district level representation. If possible, the head of the families will be interviewed, if not possible any adult (18 years old or above) can represent the head of the family. Results will be aggregated and displayed at governorate level.

#### Key informant interviews:

One key informant will be interviewed per site, with a total of 185 key informants being interviewed at country level.

The GIS team will randomly generate location geopoints in the area surrounding the informal site GPS coordinates, in order to determine which point of the site that enumerators will conduct data collection from, both for family interviews and key informant interviews. Due to the varying nature of informal sites, the site size and locations may have changed from previous information so the generated geopoints will be used as a starting location for the enumerators, who will then travel to the nearest family should no family be found at the location geopoints.

### 3.4.5 Remote Sampling

For those districts where data collection through face-to-face interviews is inhibited by safety concerns and/or movement restrictions, enumerators, will conduct family-level surveys remotely using a non-probability purposive sampling approach to ensure that the data collected is indicative of the geographic location, by site. REACH aims to conduct the determined representative number (90% level of confidence and a 10% margin of error) of interviews at sub-district level, even when conducting remote data collection through a snowball sampling methodology, starting from the contact list initially gathered. Through snowball sampling, interviewees refer to other potential participants within the informal site, that can be contacted for the assessment. If possible, the head of the families will be interviewed, if not possible any adult (18 years old or above) can represent the head of the family.

Data collection will be conducted remotely in REACH call centres established in REACH offices and enumerators will be provided with a mobile phone, with the Kobo software downloaded, to enter information into the relevant Kobo survey. The Field Officers will share participant contact information with enumerators each day to prevent enumerators calling the same participants. In order to ensure this information is kept track of enumerators will call the participant up to three times, then if there is no reply will request another number to call from the Field Officers and the phone number will be marked as "non- responsive".

### 3.5. Data Processing & Analysis

Enumerators will use Kobo Collect to collect the Informal Sites Profiling and Intentions surveys, and will upload them every evening to the designated REACH Kobo server. All data will be downloaded from the Kobo server and cleaned daily, with a data cleaning log that will be shared with the Field Coordinators, who will provide support with data cleaning by following-up on the identified issues with enumerators, on a daily basis. The Assessment Officer will be responsible for checking the data daily for internal inconsistencies, data entry errors, and unclear text entries.

Data that is deemed inconsistent will be highlighted and shared with the relevant Field Coordinator for clarification/rectification. Detailed cleaning logs will be kept with information on the original information, changes made, and the reasons why data was changed. If information is determined to be inconsistent but it is not possible to determine what the correct entry should be, followup data collection will be conducted, if deemed necessary. At the end of data collection there will be one cleaned and anonymized dataset produced which will be published online and be shared with relevant CCCM partners to inform CCCM's strategy.

Once data collection and cleaning has been completed, the Assessment Officer will conduct analysis, aggregating data to site level, then to sub-district, district, and governorate levels. In the case of numeric variables, this will be done through calculating averages and calculating the frequency of response options selected for categorical variable, weighted by population size. Analysis will be conducted using relevant software's such as Excel or SPSS. The dataset and analysis will be reviewed by REACH's technical Data Unit in Geneva. For more details on the data analysis process, see the Data Analysis Plan in Annex 3 and 4.

#### 3.5.1 The Red Flag Vulnerability Index

The Red Flag Vulnerability Index aims at identifying indicators to ensure vulnerability is being measured in the context of the assessment, with results being indicative at sub-district level. Vulnerability is the sum of three components: susceptibility to harm, coping capacities to reduce negative impacts, and adaptation capacities to reduce future vulnerability. The vulnerability index is comprised of 24 indicators which are categorised into the three vulnerability components: susceptibility, coping capacity, and adaptive capacity. To ensure each category is equally represented in the calculation each indicator has been weighted. The indicators were created in coordination with CCCM and relevant partners and clusters to ensure each sector has indicators included. To see the Red Flag Vulnerability Index indicators, weightings, and calculation please see Annex 2.

## ANNEX 2: RED FLAG VULNERABILITY INDEX

Vulnerability is the sum of three components: susceptibility to harm, coping capacities to reduce negative impacts, and adaptability for long-term societal change to reduce future vulnerability.

This vulnerability index has categorised 23 indicators from the Informal Sites Profiling and Intentions tool into these three vulnerability components. To ensure each category is equally represented in the calculation, a weight has been added to each indicator.

#### Calculation of the composite indicator

#### 2. Rationale of the Annex Addition

As Iraq continues to recover from the 2014 conflict, the Government of Iraq (GoI) has been increasingly focused on ending displacement of IDPs. As such, announcements of camp closures have taken place in recent years, supported by the recent endorsement of the National Plan to end displacement by GoI. On November 10, 2021, Amriyat Al Fallujah (AAF), one of two last remaining IDP camps in Federal Iraq, was closed and reclassified as an informal site. With the changing context, assessing the needs and challenges of IDPs in AAF has become priority for humanitarian partners as there is an assumption that access to basic goods and services may decrease.

The need to collect qualitative data initially stemmed from requests made by humanitarian organisations and coordination bodies, including the CCCM Cluster, who have highlighted the need to better understand the challenges faced by IDP families in AAF. In doing so, the qualitative data is intended to complement the quantitative findings on the site in order to provide more insight into some of the issues identified. More specifically, provide contextual understanding to changes in needs, if any, since AAF camp status has been reclassified. That said, the qualitative assessment focuses on the perceived needs and challenges of IDPs if they leave AAF, either due to eviction or voluntary departure.

To conclude, with the additional information that will be collected through the qualitative assessment on AAF, the CCCM informal sites assessment is seeking to contribute more strongly to advocacy and programmatic discussions taking place between operational partners. Thus, the assessment is intended to support decision making of humanitarian actors to better facilitate the needs of IDPs in AAF.

### 3. Objectives of the AAF Informal Sites Qualitative Assessment

General Objective	The general objective of this assessment is to provide information on the needs and challenges of AAF IDP families since the reclassification of the camp into an informal site.

### 4. Methodology of the AAF Informal Sites Qualitative Assessment

The qualitative assessment will conduct 15-17 Informant Interviews (IIs) with male and female head of households. At least five IIs will be conducted with female headed households and ten to twelve with male headed households.

Snowball sampling methods will be employed to identify participants for IIs. For the identification of IIs, REACH will initially ask households that are being surveyed in the quantitative assessment portion<sup>23</sup>, if they can identify male and female head of households in AAF. After the first set of IIs are organised, participants will be asked if they can identify additional head of households to interview. This will continue until the number of IIs targeted for the assessment has been reached.

The profile of participants for IIs are:

- Residents of AAF •
- Male and female participants who are head of households<sup>24</sup> •

The contact information of IIs identified will be shared directly with the involved enumerators, so that they can conduct the interviews. For this assessment, three to four enumerators will be contracted to collect data. During each II, REACH enumerators will record answers on the questionnaire sheets that have been prepared by the SAO which will then be translated and transcribed onto a Word document to be shared.

Prior to data collection, all enumerators will have received a comprehensive training covering the purpose of the assessment, the tool, and the key information to be captured. The training will be conducted online or in person, facilitated by the REACH SAO, in coordination with the Field Officer. If, however, enumerators are not able to interview in person, then remote data collection will take place. In this case, the enumerators will conduct telephone surveys with participants with the contact information provided.

Data collection will be conducted by REACH enumerators who will follow restrictions imposed by local authorities and guided by IMPACT Standards of Operations for Data Collection. As the semi-structured, gualitative data is collected, on a daily basis, the REACH SAO will proceed with the data cleaning. This process will take place following a data cleaning plan which is designed to monitor the assessment data for uniqueness of information collected. The plan includes identifying incorrect or contradictory information, monitoring of enumerators, following up on incomplete and/or short responses, and following up on responses to sensitive questions. To track any changes in the data, the SAO will use IMPACT data cleaning logbook in excel. After IIs are completed, there will be a debrief with the enumerator team to address any issues identified.

As qualitative data is being collected information will be synthesized and organized using the Data Saturation and Analysis Grid in line with IMPACT Minimum Standards Checklist for Semi-Structured (Qualitative) Data Processing and Analysis.

#### 5. Output Using AAF Informal Sites Qualitative Assessment

The qualitative assessment findings, together with the quantitative data collected on the informal site, will contribute to an AAF informal site profiling and intentions factsheet. The factsheet, which will be around six to eight pages long, is intended to provide an overview of following issues:

- Movement intentions for IDP families in AAF and their reported obstacles to return: •
- Concerns and coping strategies of IDPs since AAF became an informal site; •
- Changes to daily life since AAF has been reclassified as an informal site; •
- Priority needs of IDP families inside the informal site, and needs outside AAF if they leave; and, •
- Assistance provided in the informal site as well as perceived assistance needed if families leave AAF. •
