2. Rationale

2.1. Rationale

An estimated 6.1 million Syrians are internally displaced⁷ as of November 2019. Of this population, a large proportion live in IDP sites such as formal camps, collective centres, and informal tented settlements. In northeast Syria, there are at least 260 informal sites and settlements with a combined population of 66,500 households. Displacement in northern Syria continues, and the increase in military activity starting on 9 October 2019 has led to as many as 220,000 people being displaced.⁸

In northeast Syria, REACH has published one previous round of light profiles on informal tented sites and collective centres. These information products are widely used and shared by the humanitarian sector. The most recent round of site and settlement profiles took place in December 2018. As it has been one year since informal sites and settlements were last profiled, and as this period has seen significant population movement in northeast Syria, there is a need for upto-date information on the needs in these sites and settlements. REACH profiles larger refugee and IDP camps in northeast Syria and camps and sites in northwest Syria through separate research cycles.

3. Methodology

2.1. Methodology overview

Site and settlement profiling will consist of key informant (KI) interviews with community members with knowledge of the settlements and remote mapping from satellite imagery. A minimum of two KIs will be sought for each of the 278 informal sites and settlements verified by the Northeast Syria Sites and Settlements Working Group in areas where REACH has permission to collect data. KIs will be asked to provide information on indicators which they have expertise in. KIs will be asked to identify the topics they are able to answer questions on; if they do not have the expertise to answer all topics, additional KIs will be sought by seeking new contacts through engagement with the existing KI network in the area.

2.2. Population of interest

The population of interest is displaced people (including both IDPs and refugees) in locations where multiple displaced households congregate outside of formal or informal camps (i.e. where no camp administration is present) in accessible areas of northeast Syria. Accessibility is determined by whether REACH or partner enumerators are able to conduct the tasks necessary for the methodologies outlined below, and may be limited by factors such as permissions from relevant actors in the area, security considerations, and time constraints. The unit of measurement will be sites/settlements.

2.3. Secondary data review

Secondary data to be used will include:

- Satellite imagery procured via partners, to be used in overview maps on factsheets.
- Sphere¹⁰ and Syria-specific standards (set by sectors) for aid provision, to determine whether the reported humanitarian response is sufficient.
- Feedback and guidance notes from sectors/clusters, to make indicators and questionnaires as operationally relevant as possible.
- Reports on informal sites and settlements, to triangulate and/or confirm figures given by camp administration and camp management officials.¹¹
- Lists of informal sites and settlements, to plan data collection and decide on coverage.

2.4. Primary Data Collection

- REACH enumerators will carry out remote telephone Interviews with the key informants with knowledge of the sites/settlements in order to get information on the number of individuals present, available services, distributions, needs of the population, and more.
- KIs will be sought who work in positions where they have knowledge in one or more of the topics covered by the
 assessment. These could include: local NGO workers, camp administration/camp management, teachers,
 community leaders, local council members or health workers.

- Data collection for the first assessment in the cycle will take place between 18-29 February 2020.
- A minimum of two KIs will be sought for each site or settlement. Where these KIs do not have enough information
 to answer particular questions, additional KIs may be sought until all indicators have been covered. Data will be
 coded directly using a Kobo tool which has been developed with the input of partners and cluster working groups.
- In the case that remote data collection through REACH enumerators is not possible, other options will be explored, including using partners to collect data. If alternative options for data collection are not possible, areas with no access will be excluded from the assessment.
- Site/settlement layout will be mapped remotely by REACH GIS staff based on satellite imagery obtained through UNOSAT and cross-referenced with KI data.

2.5. Data Processing & Analysis

Collected data will be checked daily for internal inconsistencies/logical consistency, data entry errors, unclear text entries, and suspicious enumerator response patterns, implausible responses. Data that has been flagged will be shared with the field team, who will confirm or rectify information based on follow up with Key Informants or enumerator recollections and

notes. Detailed cleaning logs will be kept with information on the original information, changes made, and the reasons why data was changed. If information is determined to be inconsistent but it is not possible to determine what the correct entry should be, data points may be deleted altogether.

Data will be analysed and reported at the site level, to detail the situation within each assessed site or settlement and to measure it against humanitarian standards. Each site will be profiled separately but profiles will be published in a single, multi-page output. Visualisations will be used to illustrate findings for key indicators. Profiles will be based on KI data from camp management and camp administration officials.

KI data will be aggregated for sites where more than one KI was interviewed. Where KIs have provided conflicting categorical answers, additional KIs will be sought to clarify. The answer given by the majority of KIs will be reported, or where no majority is possible the information will be recorded to be 'not available'. Alternatively, if the answers are not mutually exclusive, all provided data will be reported. If KIs give differing numerical answers, the mean will be recorded. If the answers provided diverge to the extent that the mean is unreasonably far from either number, additional KI information will be sought. If this is not possible or does not resolve the issue, the answer will be recorded as 'not available'.

Geographic data will be used to create overview maps for the sites/settlements, which will be integrated into the factsheets. It will be checked for accuracy and aligned with satellite imagery in GIS software. Data will be aggregated for select indicators across the assessed sites to give an overview of the general situation.
