## 2. Rationale

#### 2.1. Rationale

An estimated 6.2 million Syrians are internally displaced <sup>11</sup> as of January 2019. Of this population, a large proportion live in IDP sites such as formal camps, collective centres, and informal tented settlements. In northeast Syria, there are 12 formal and large informal camps for IDPs and refugees with a combined population of 27,000 households. In northwest Syria, the CCCM cluster maintains a list of over 22 planned IDP camps, and approximately 300 more informal tented settlements and transit sites. Additionally, displaced persons live in other informal sites, including collective centres and informal tented settlements, as well as in host communities. Displacement in northern Syria continues. Between 4 December 2018 and 11 March 2019, 56,017 individuals arrived in Al Hol camp, Al-Hasakeh governorate, alone.

In northeast Syria, REACH has published four rounds of profiles and infrastructure maps (full profiling) on the formal and large informal camps in the region, as well as four rounds of light profiles on informal tented settlements and collective centres<sup>12</sup>. These information products are widely used and shared by the humanitarian sector. For instance, recent outputs have been used to inform food assistance planning in the camps. Thus, the continued provision of detailed information on the situation and humanitarian needs in camps and sites in northeast Syria would be of benefit to the coordination of the humanitarian response.

In northwest Syria, the CCCM cluster provides information on the locations and population numbers of camps and sites. However, gaps exist, specifically in certain geographic areas (such as northern Aleppo governorate) and with regards to information on humanitarian needs and services. REACH has previously conducted one round of light profiling through Key Informant interviews in select sites <sup>13</sup> to address the latter gap. However, further information needs remain.

# 3. Methodology

# 3.1 Methodology overview

There are two research methodologies to be applied to IDP and refugee camps and sites in northern Syria. Both methodologies involve multi-sector assessments of the humanitarian situation, needs, and services in camps and sites. However, different approaches to collecting this data will be applied based on the type of site and context. In large formal or established informal camps or sites where REACH or partner enumerators have good access to conduct household interviews and do infrastructure mapping, the <u>full profiling methodology</u> will be applied. Full profiling includes interviews with a representative sample of households, Key Informant interviews with camp administration officials, and infrastructure mapping. Where such access is not available, where sites have relatively few residents, or where there is a dynamic situation with urgent information needs, the <u>light profiling</u> methodology may be applied. Light profiling consists of Key Informant interviews with representatives of the site population, local authorities, and/or other individuals with in-depth knowledge of the situation in each site.

Although methodologies and outputs differ, core indicators across the tools will be aligned. Core indicators will include:

## 3.2 Population of interest

The population of interest is displaced people (including both IDPs and refugees) in locations where multiple displaced households congregate (i.e. camps and other sites) in accessible areas of northern Syria. Accessibility is determined by whether REACH or partner enumerators are able to conduct the tasks necessary for the methodologies outlined below, and may be limited by factors such as permissions from relevant actors in the area, security considerations, and time constraints.

# 3.3 Secondary data review

Secondary data to be used will include:

- Satellite imagery procured via partners, to be used in camp maps and, if relevant, to check provision of services against Sphere and Syria-specific standards.
- Sphere and Syria-specific standards (set by sectors) for aid provision, to determine whether the reported humanitarian response is sufficient.
- Feedback and guidance notes from sectors/clusters, to make indicators and questionnaires as operationally relevant as possible.
- Reports on camp population sizes, to triangulate and/or confirm figures given by camp administration and camp management officials.
- Lists of informal camps and sites, to plan data collection and decide on coverage.

# 3.4 Primary Data Collection

#### Full camp profiling:

- Household interviews with randomly sampled households, to get comprehensive and statistically significant
  information on the conditions for households in camps and large informal settlements in northern Syria.
  Households will be randomly selected to a target confidence level of 95% and a 10% margin of error (as well as a
  10% buffer to account for non-response), using point-based sampling techniques in GIS software. In the absence
  of population density data, all locations in inhabited sections have an equal chance of being selected.
- Interviews with the NGOs or local authorities charged with managing registration and overseeing services in the camp, in order to get additional information on the number of individuals in the camp, as well as available services, distributions, needs of the population, and more.
- Mapping of camp/site layout and infrastructure, to create detailed maps for use in operations and planning.
   Mapping will cover all key infrastructure, including but not limited to latrines, showers, schools, healthcare facilities, safe spaces, sports fields, and NGO/UN offices.

## Light IDP/refugee site profiling:

• Key Informant (KI) interviews with individuals who have sector-specific knowledge of the needs and services in informal tented settlements, collective centres, and difficult-to-access formal sites in northern Syria, with the aim of providing humanitarians with data on the locations and numbers of IDPs and refugees, as well as basic information on their needs. Preferably, multiple KIs will be interviewed in every site selected for light profiling, each with expertise in one of the sectors covered in the light profiling tool. If separate KIs with sector-specific knowledge are not available, an interview with a single KI who has knowledge across sectors will suffice.

For both methodologies, data will be collected by REACH or partner enumerators, trained by REACH staff. While the household interviews and mapping exercise require direct data collection on the ground, the KI and camp management interviews may occur remotely via phone calls or text messages.

Full camp profiling will occur once every four months in camps that are sufficiently accessible to REACH and/or partner enumerators, and only in northeast Syria at first. Light profiling will occur when a need for updated information has been identified by REACH or other humanitarian organisations. For full camp profiling in northeast Syria, the aim will be to cover all accessible formal camps and large informal sites in Al-Hasakeh, Ar-Raqqa, Deir-ez-Zor, and eastern Aleppo governorates consistently across rounds wherever possible, while coverage for light profiling will be determined by need and based on partner input due to the large number of smaller informal tented settlements and collective centres that exist.

## 3.5 Data Processing & Analysis

Collected data will be checked daily for internal inconsistencies, data entry errors, and unclear text entries. Data that has been flagged will be shared with the field team, who will confirm or rectify information based on follow up with Key Informants or enumerator recollections and notes. Detailed cleaning logs will be kept with information on the original information, changes made, and the reasons why data was changed. If information is determined to be inconsistent but it is not possible to determine what the correct entry should be, data points may be deleted altogether.

#### Full camp profiling:

Data will be analysed and reported at the site level, to detail the situation within each assessed camp and/or site and to measure it against humanitarian standards. Visualisations will be used to illustrate findings for key indicators. Profiles will primarily be based on data from household interviews, which will be supplemented by KI data from camp management and camp administration officials.

KI data will be aggregated for camps where more than one KI was interviewed. Where KIs have provided conflicting categorical answers, the answer given by the majority of KIs will be reported or the information will be recorded to be 'not available'. Alternatively, if the answers are not mutually exclusive, all provided data will be reported. If KIs give differing numerical answers, the mean will be recorded. If the answers provided diverge to the extent that the mean is unreasonably far from either number, the answer will be recorded as 'not available.

Geographic data will be used to create overview maps for the factsheets and combined with satellite imagery to create large stand-alone camp infrastructure maps. It will be checked for accuracy and cleaned to remove data collection errors and align data with satellite imagery in GIS software. Geographic data may also be used to compare the services available on the ground to Sphere standards or standards specific to the Syria response. Finally, data will be aggregated for select indicators across the assessed camps, to give an overview of the general situation.

#### Light camp profiling:

Data will be analysed and reported at the site level, to detail the situation within each assessed camp and/or site. This will involve data aggregation for sites where more than one KI was interviewed.

Where KIs have provided conflicting categorical answers, the answer given by the majority of KIs will be reported or the information will be recorded to be 'not available'. Alternatively, if the answers are not mutually exclusive, all provided data

will be reported. If KIs give differing numerical answers, the mean will be recorded. If the answers provided diverge to the extent that the mean is unreasonably far from either number, the answer will be recorded as 'not available.

Visualisations will be used to illustrate findings for key indicators. Maps will be included to give an overview of the locations of the assessed sites. Data will also be aggregated for select indicators across the assessed camps and sites, to give an overview of the general situation in those locations.
