2. Rationale

2.1. Rationale

Since March 2011, protracted conflict in Syria has caused an estimated 5.5 million Syrians to flee abroad and a further 6.1 million people to be internally displaced inside the country. As of August 2017, the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) reported that almost a third of the pre-war Syrian population were internally displaced persons (IDPs) – representing nearly half of the estimated 13.1 million in need of humanitarian assistance across the country.¹⁵ While some refugees and IDPs have returned to their pre-conflict communities of origin, the volatile and everchanging security context means that populations frequently return to precarious conditions, with large information gaps persisting around both new displacements and IDP conditions, as well as the movements and conditions of Spontaneous Return (SR) populations.

In north-west Syria – a region with one of the country's highest overall population densities and host to one its largest IDP populations¹⁶ – these information gaps are particularly acute. Due to the ongoing and evolving conflict and resulting volatile security situation, there remain persistent gaps in the capacity of the humanitarian community to maintain a complete picture of IDP and SR populations' locations, movements and needs. The constant displacement of families and fluidity of IDP movements – combined with restricted humanitarian access impeding systematic data collection efforts – has meant that acquiring timely and accurate data on the numbers and locations of IDPs and SRs has been a significant challenge across north-west Syria, limiting the effectiveness of humanitarian assistance planning and implementation.

In order to address these gaps, from early 2015, the Camp Coordination and Camp Management (CCCM) Cluster has sought to collect and provide regular updates on internal displacements across northern Syria through an ad hoc IDP tracking mechanism, based on voluntary contributions from cluster members. In 2016, a permanent data collection structure was then established in the form of the IDP Situation Monitoring Initiative (ISMI), a partnership initiative of REACH and CCCM that aims to provide the CCCM Cluster, operational partners and the wider humanitarian community with methodologically sound, regular and timely information on internal displacement and SR figures and trends across north-west Syria. Since its baseline in October/November 2016, ISMI has collected consistent and methodologically sound data on population displacements on a weekly, bi-weekly and monthly, as well as ad hoc, basis through an extensive enumerator and key informant (KI) network across the CCCM Cluster cross-border areas of interventions. This network and coverage area as of 31 October 2018 stand at 69 enumerators and team leaders and more than 1,050 communities, camps and sites across 50 sub-districts of Aleppo, Hama and Idleb governorates.

Building on these foundations, and following a comprehensive review of the initial ISMI research cycle, the 'ISMI 2.0' system was launched in September 2017. In addition to introducing regular monitoring of spontaneous returns, this system has sought to provide a more robust methodological foundation to IDP and SR tracking, through improvements to indicators, best practices in data collection, and harmonisation into a uniform approach of the ISMI and CCCM Cluster member systems. This harmonised data collection system consists of a single methodological framework and minimum standards for data quality, including minimum number of sources of verification and comparability of indicators for data triangulation. This system has continued to evolve and adapt since its inception to strengthen the quality, transparency,

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relevance and timeliness of its data and information products in order to address ever-present and newly emerging information gaps around population and displacement monitoring and to enhance the evidence base informing humanitarian responses to IDP and SR populations in north-west Syria.

3. Methodology

3.1. Methodology overview

The ISMI programme consists of five regular assessment types. First, through bi-weekly/monthly data collection cycles.¹⁷ REACH enumerators aim to provide a regular and comprehensive overview of all displacement-related movements that occurred to and from accessible communities, camps and sites in the ISMI coverage area over a fixed coverage period. Secondly, through ad hoc data collection cycles, the ISMI system aims to address the most pressing information needs of the CCCM cluster and its operational partners for timely and frequent updates on IDP arrivals and SRs to accessible locations within the coverage area. This ad hoc monitoring system is comprised of three further sub-components, namely: continuous 'flexible' ad hoc data collection cycles conducted by REACH enumerators, CCCM member agency assessments submitted directly to the ISMI system, and rapidly deployed ad hoc data collection cycles conducted by REACH enumerators. Thirdly, through Early Warning Early Response (EWER) data collection cycles. REACH enumerators aim to proactively and systematically screen all accessible communities within the coverage area and assess whether any movements have occurred to or from these locations, and/or whether any movements are anticipated by KIs before the end of the forthcoming bi-weekly or monthly coverage period. These serve to inform coverage of upcoming biweekly/monthly assessments and immediate flexible ad hoc assessments, and provide a means for regular review of REACH's ISMI coverage. Fourthly, through quarterly population assessments, REACH enumerators provide regular updates on total IDP and resident/pre-conflict populations present in all accessible communities, camps and sites within the ISMI coverage area on fixed coverage dates, in addition to key demographic indicators. Finally, through thematic assessments, the ISMI system seeks to explore and provide in-depth analysis of relevant displacement-related issues, themes and information gaps, based either on existing data collected through other ISMI data collection cycles and secondary data sources, or through standalone data collection exercises conducted by REACH enumerators.

Primary data collection is carried out through three different methods, namely: (1) face-to-face key informant (KI) interviews conducted by REACH enumerators in directly accessible locations, (2) remote KI interviews conducted by REACH in directly inaccessible locations, and (3) direct assessments and/or KI interviews conducted face-to-face or remotely by CCCM member agencies, data from which is submitted via CCCM member agency ISMI KoBo and Enketo tools. Data for all assessments is collected at the community level or 'lower' (i.e. OCHA Syrian p-code administrative level 4, neighbourhood, camp or site).

3.2. Population of interest

The three main populations of interest for the ISMI research cycle are:18

- Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs), defined as: 'individuals or groups of people who have been forced to leave their homes or places of habitual residence, in particular as a result of or in order to avoid the effects of armed conflict, situations of generalised violence, violations of human rights, or natural or man-made disasters, and who have not crossed an international border' (UNHCR);
- Resident/pre-conflict populations, defined as: individuals or groups of people who currently reside in their communities of origin, or communities of permanent residence prior to the Syrian conflict. This includes populations that were never displaced as well as previously displaced populations that have returned to their communities of origin;

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Spontaneous Returns (SRs), defined as: Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) or refugees who return to their community of origin that they left due to conflict, but not necessarily to their places of habitual residence (their former homes), and who do not necessarily enjoy the full spectrum of rights afforded to them prior to their displacement.

The four main movement categories of interest for the ISMI research cycle are:

- **IDP arrivals**, defined as: IDPs who arrived to and stayed for at least 24 consecutive hours in an assessed location at any point during the reporting period. This includes IDPs who arrived and subsequently departed during the reporting period (i.e. transited through, having stayed for at least 24 consecutive hours).
- **IDP departures**, defined as: IDPs who were in an assessed location and subsequently departed and spent at least 24 consecutive hours in a different location at any point during the reporting period. These are persons who were previously displaced to the assessed location, and who are now departing (as opposed to residents in the assessed location who are being displaced from their communities of origin). This includes IDPs who departed and subsequently returned during the reporting period.
- **Resident/pre-conflict population departures**, defined as: resident/pre-conflict populations who were in an assessed location (their community of origin) and displaced to a different location for at least 24 consecutive hours at any point during the reporting period. This includes residents who were displaced and subsequently returned during the reporting period.
- **Spontaneous returns (SRs)**, defined as: former IDPs and/or refugees who returned to and stayed for at least 24 consecutive hours in an assessed location (their community of origin) at any point during the reporting period, with the intention of staying for a prolonged period of time. This includes SRs who returned and subsequently departed during the reporting period.

As of 31 October 2018, ISMI coverage stands at **approximately 1,050 (opposition-held) communities, camps and sites across 50 sub-districts of Aleppo, Hama and Idleb governorates** in north-west Syria. In line with frequently changing conflict lines and areas of influence in the region, REACH conducts regular reviews of its enumerator network coverage, collaborating with the CCCM Cluster and communicating any proposed expansion or loss of coverage with both CCCM and UNHCR.

3.3. Secondary data review

Primary data collected by REACH enumerators is triangulated with historical ISMI data and comparable primary data from CCCM member agencies, for ad hoc, bi-weekly/monthly and quarterly population assessments. In addition, available secondary data sources are used to triangulate primary data. These include: data collected through REACH Humanitarian Situation Overview in Syria (HSOS) assessments; data collected through REACH rapid needs assessments across north-west Syria; available satellite imagery attained through IMPACT requests to UNOSAT; the CCCM Cluster IDP Sites Integrated Monitoring Matrix (ISIMM); population and displacement data provided by CCCM member agencies directly to the CCCM cluster; population and displacement numbers from the OCHA-led Syria Population Task force and IDP Task Force; INSO Syria incident lists; Syrian pre-conflict census data; as well as available data from other humanitarian bodies, media and open source reports.

3.4. Primary data collection

Primary data collection conducted by REACH enumerators employs a KI methodology, with key informant interviews (KIIs) conducted at the community level or 'lower'.¹⁹ KIIs are conducted **face-to-face** in the majority of communities, camps and sites with REACH enumerators travelling to directly accessible locations. In some areas where face-to-face data collection is not possible due to the security situation or other constraints, **remote KI contact** is made, with REACH enumerators conducting KIIs via secure telephone/WhatsApp/messaging or other services. Locations in which it is not permitted by local authorities or deemed unsafe to carry out either face-to-face or remote data collection by the respective

security managers of REACH and ACTED will be deemed either permanently or temporarily out-of-coverage, with CCCM and UNHCR being notified of any changes.

For REACH enumerators, data is collected through interviews with KIs living or working in the sub-districts where communities, camps and sites are assessed. In certain circumstances, interviews are also conducted with KIs who formerly lived or worked in assessed areas and who maintain strong networks in those locations. For CCCM member agencies providing data directly to the ISMI system, data is collected through KIIs, as well as through interviews with their own staff following assessments made by agencies. Potential KIs are identified using the existing networks of REACH and CCCM member agencies, as well as through a snowball approach to reach a larger number of KIs in order to better triangulate information, reduce KI fatigue and allow for broader coverage. Required KI profiles depend on the question/information to be gathered and KIs are purposively selected. Where multiple KIs are available, priority is given to the age of 18 and consent to being regularly contacted and interviewed. Where possible, REACH enumerators and CCCM member agencies aim to ensure a balance of female as well as male KIs. KI types for all ISMI assessments may include: members of local relief committees, local charities, civil society groups or NGOs, CCCM member staff, community leaders of IDP and resident/pre-conflict populations, teachers, documentation office/registration focal points or local council members.^{20 21}

Based on structured questionnaires, REACH enumerators and CCCM member agencies ask KIs/CCCM member staff a limited number of questions on the following indicators. KoBo tools and paper forms are designed at the country level by REACH assessment and project officers, reviewed by the IMPACT Research Design Unit in Geneva and CCCM Cluster staff in Turkey, and piloted at the field level before implementation. Primary data collected through all assessment cycles is triangulated through available secondary data sources:

1) Bi-weekly/monthly data collection cycles:

- Data is collected via KIIs conducted by REACH enumerators in all accessible communities, camps and sites in the coverage area that are believed to have witnessed movements over the fixed bi-weekly or monthly coverage period, as indicated by EWER community screening, ad hoc submissions for the same coverage period and secondary data sources.^{22 23}
- Data is collected on: total number of IDPs that arrived to assessed locations during the coverage period, last places of departure, presence of vulnerable groups, priority needs, shelter and tenancy settings, as well as push and pull factors for movement; total number of IDPs that departed from assessed locations during the coverage period, as well as intended destinations and push and pull factors for movement; total number of SRs to assessed locations during the coverage period, as well as last places of departure, numbers returning to former homes, presence of vulnerable groups, priority needs, and shelter and tenancy settings; total number of IDPs in assessed locations as of the final day of the coverage period.²⁴
- Submissions are uploaded to the KoBo server and data checking and follow up with enumerators is conducted after the end of data collection cycles.

2) Ad hoc data collection cycles:

- Continuous 'flexible' ad hoc data collection cycles Data is collected via KIIs conducted by REACH enumerators in all accessible locations in the coverage area that have witnessed IDP arrivals and/or SRs of more than 10 households across an adjustable coverage period.²⁵ ²⁶ ²⁷ Enumerators are required to continuously screen and monitor the situations in their sub-districts (through news monitoring, remotely contacting networks, and alerts received directly from KIs), and report on large IDP arrivals and SRs to locations the moment they are aware of them.
- Data is collected on: total number of IDPs that arrived to assessed locations during the coverage period, last
 places of departure, presence of vulnerable groups, priority needs, and shelter and tenancy settings; total
 number of SRs to assessed locations during the coverage period, as well as last places of departure; total
 number of IDPs in assessed locations as of the final day of the coverage period; and total number of residents
 in assessed locations as of the final day of the coverage period. Submissions are uploaded to the KoBo server
 and data checking and follow up with enumerators is conducted on a rolling basis.
- CCCM member agency assessments Data is collected via KIIs and direct assessments conducted on a voluntary basis by CCCM member agencies trained on ISMI tools and methodology. Data is collected in accessible locations on a modular basis²⁸ and across an adjustable coverage period on any of the following indicators: total number of IDPs that arrived to assessed locations during the coverage period, last places of departure, presence of vulnerable groups, priority needs, and shelter and tenancy settings; total number of IDPs that departed from assessed locations during the coverage period, as well as intended destinations; total number of residents that departed from assessed locations during the coverage period, as well as intended destinations; total number of SRs to assessed locations during the coverage period, last places of departure, presence of vulnerable groups, priority needs, and shelter and tenancy settings; and total number of IDPs in assessed locations as of the final day of the coverage period. Submissions are uploaded to the KoBo server and data checking and follow up is conducted on a rolling basis.
- Rapidly-deployed ad hoc data collection cycles Data is collected via KIIs conducted by REACH enumerators in accessible locations in the coverage area that witness movements as part of displacement waves and movements not captured by the other two ad hoc components.²⁹ These assessments are activated on an irregular basis, assess various indicators that seek to address the overall ISMI research objectives, and build upon a library of available KoBo tools and paper forms developed by REACH.³⁰ Submissions are uploaded to the KoBo server and data checking and follow up with enumerators is conducted on a rolling basis.

3) Early Warning Early Response (EWER) data collection cycles:

 Data is collected via KIIs conducted by REACH enumerators in all accessible communities, camps and sites in the coverage area on a bi-weekly/monthly basis (aligned with the forthcoming bi-weekly or monthly cycle). Enumerators are required to proactively and systematically screen all communities, camps and sites within the coverage area and assess whether any movements occurred to or from assessed locations, and/or whether any movements are anticipated before the end of the current month. This in in order to inform coverage of biweekly/monthly assessments and immediate flexible ad hoc assessments, as well as to provide a means for regular review of REACH's overall coverage.³¹

²⁶ Where coverage periods refer to the day or days during which the specific group of IDPs/SRs that is being reported arrived to the assessed location. - Data is collected on: whether IDP arrivals, IDP departures, resident departures, and/or SRs occurred to or from assessed locations within the coverage period; whether IDP arrivals, IDP departures, resident departures, and/or SRs are anticipated to or from assessed locations before the end of the upcoming bi-weekly/monthly coverage period; and if so, whether any of these were movements of greater than 10 households.
- Submissions are uploaded to the KoBo server and data checking and follow up with enumerators is conducted both during and after the end of the data collection cycle. Primary data is cross-checked with ad hoc submissions for comparable coverage periods and secondary data sources to provide a coverage list informing bi-weekly/monthly assessments.

4) Quarterly population data collection cycles:

- Data is collected via KIIs conducted by REACH enumerators in all accessible communities, camps and sites³² in the coverage area on an intermittent basis. Coverage dates are aligned with CCCM and humanitarian partner coverage dates for Whole of Syria (WoS) population assessments.
- Data is collected on: total number of IDPs in assessed locations as of the fixed coverage date, IDP populations' gender and age, as well as presence of vulnerable groups among IDP populations; and total number of residents in assessed locations as of the fixed coverage date, resident populations' gender and age, as well as presence of vulnerable groups among resident populations.
- Submissions are uploaded to the KoBo server and data checking and follow up with enumerators is conducted both during and after the end of the data collection cycle.

5) **Thematic assessments**:

- The methodology, thematic and geographic focus of different thematic assessments is determined in coordination with the CCCM Cluster based on findings from other ISMI data collection cycles, secondary sources, identified and evolving needs of the CCCM cluster and its partners and key information gaps in regard to population displacements and SRs in north-west Syria.
- Data collection for thematic assessments is typically conducted via KIIs conducted by REACH enumerators, although may also be based on or make use of existing data collected through other ISMI data collection cycles and/or secondary data sources.
- Data is collected on various displacement-related indicators aiming to address the overall ISMI research objectives.

For bi-weekly/monthly, ad hoc, quarterly population and thematic assessments, REACH enumerators interview a minimum of 2 different KIs (and, ideally, 2 different KI types) per assessed location, with KIs purposively selected based on their knowledge of IDP and resident populations in those locations. A minimum of 2 KIs is a requirement for all data sets that are shared with the CCCM cluster and its partners and that are used for ISMI information products, as this allows for data to be triangulated and for data errors, both intended and unintended, to be identified during data cleaning. In addition, for bi-weekly/monthly, ad hoc and quarterly population assessments, a 3rd KII is required where:

- The assessed location has a total population (IDP + resident/pre-conflict) of more than 5,000 households
- The assessed location has experienced total movements (IDP arrivals + IDP departures + resident/pre-conflict population departures + SRs) of more than 500 households during the reporting period
- Enumerators deem that discrepancies in information provided by KI 1 and KI 2 are too large

month and/or whether any movements are expected to happen before the end of the month. While regular ISMI data collection requires that a minimum of 2 KIs are interviewed in every assessed location, interviewing 1 KI per location for the EWER system is sufficient. KIs are not asked to provide exact numbers but to inform enumerators of movement (or the absence thereof). However, KIs are asked whether movements included (or might include, if anticipated) 10 households or more. If KIs report any type of movement or expect any movement, then the concerned community should be assessed in the monthly cycle that begins immediately after the EWER collection period has ended. Depending on whether the past movement includes 10 or more households (of IDP arrivals or SRs), a flexible ad hoc assessment of that specific location is also conducted. This primary data is combined with secondary sources, including from existing alert systems such as INSO, to ensure the effective monitoring and coverage of communities, camps and sites with movements, and to predict as far as possible major movements in future.

³² Quarterly population assessments are not made directly for camps and sites listed by the CCCM Cluster ISIMM. IDP population data reported by REACH enumerators for unrecognised camps and sites is triangulated with ISIMM data with comparable coverage dates in order to avoid duplication of efforts and double-counting.

• Enumerators deem that either or both of the original 2 KIs are unreliable or unsuitable.³³

For **EWER** assessments, **REACH** enumerators interview 1 KI per assessed location. This lower KI threshold is accepted as EWER assessments are intended to be very short, rapid assessments, which seek to provide only an indication of where movements have happened and/or are expected to happen, rather than actual population and movement estimates.

For ad hoc assessments conducted by CCCM member agencies, agencies may provide information from just 1 source or 1 KI per assessed location, although they are encouraged to contribute submissions based on 2 or more sources or KIIs.³⁴ As the inclusion of 2 sources/KIIs is non-mandatory for CCCM member agency submissions to ISMI, in instances where members are unable to submit data from more than 1 source/KII, REACH seeks to conduct a 'flexible' ad hoc assessment in the assessed location via its own enumerator network, using CCCM member agency submissions as a source of triangulation.

Following bi-weekly/monthly data collection cycles, **routine field debriefs** take place between REACH project staff and team leaders overseeing each area. These provide a regular feedback channel for all assessments, including challenges faced at the field level, including with enumerator and KI understanding and ability to answer questions, community access constraints, changes in KIs, security, travel, internet and issues with permissions. Based on these debriefs and regular interaction with the CCCM Cluster and its partners, **reviews of all assessment types are conducted, with steps taken to improve methodologies, tools, processes and information products at regular intervals to better meet the programme's research objectives.** REACH enumerators receive **quarterly refresher trainings** and **pilot changes to indicators and questionnaires**, providing feedback before any updates are finalised. The REACH assessment team is continuously available to support REACH data collection teams and CCCM member agencies proactively and in response to specific requests throughout all data collection cycles.

3.5. Data processing & analysis

Interviews for all assessments are conducted using paper forms, which are then entered digitally using the KoBo Collect App on smartphones or Enketo web platform and subsequently uploaded to the UNHCR KoBo server. The assessment team downloads³⁵ and checks submissions to ensure the required number of forms have been submitted for each location, before **checking for any internal inconsistencies, outliers, data entry errors, or discrepancies between multiple submissions** for the same assessed location. Automated checks are used where possible to ensure consistency and timely data processing. Any issues are followed up with enumerators and, where possible, KIs. Corrections based on responses from enumerators are cleaned by REACH assessment officers, with follow-up and cleaning logs maintained in password-protected files alongside all raw data and cleaning sheets.³⁶ Once all steps have been followed in the data cleaning, checking and data set creation processes, with no follow-up remaining, the REACH assessment and project teams check through cleaning sheets and final data sets for any inconsistencies.

For assessments conducted by REACH enumerators and CCCM member agencies that involve multiple KIs, **continuous variables such as total population and total movement estimates** (i.e. total IDP population as of end date of the coverge period, total IDP arrivals during the coverage period, etc.) **are triangulated according to Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs)**, with discrepancies followed up on with respective enumerators.³⁷ All raw total population estimates are checked with confirmed historical population data as well as secondary data sources, with discrepancies being similarly followed up on. In cases of non-consensus between REACH and member sources, or where responses provided by enumerators after follow-up are deemed insufficient, data for the respective indicators is omitted and entered as 'No data'.

³⁴ A 'source' refers to either a physical or digital record or list in which information on populations and movements may be stored (e.g. local registration list, aid distribution list), whereas a 'KI' refers to an individual who is interviewed based on their expert knowledge of a particular situation, context or population. A KI may have access to and base their information on multiple sources.

³⁵ Regularity of downloads and data cleaning depends on the assessment type. ³⁶ The REACH assessment team follows Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) compiled for the cleaning, checking and creation of data sets for regular ISMI assessments.

³⁷ Disaggregation of movements by last place of departure/intended destinations, as well as categorical and ordinal variables such as priority needs, proportion of IDPs by shelter type, etc. are only asked to the KI that is deemed to be more knowledgeable of the respective population group.

Following this, the REACH Assessment Manager and IMPACT Data Unit in Geneva internally reviews data sets before these are shared with the CCCM Cluster Coordinator via email and comparable data is added to the consolidated ISMI data set (hosted on Box.com).

For the majority of ISMI assessments, **KIs are asked to report on population and movement figures at a household level**. For only two indicators (total IDP populations and total resident/pre-conflict populations) KIs are regularly asked to report household as well as individual estimates, if available. This is based on the understanding that **KIs are more frequently able to provide accurate household rather than individual figures** in a context of high population mobility. Collecting household figures is a frequently employed data collection technique in this sort of research, with interviewers often reporting that while KIs only provide ballpoint individual estimates, they are able to provide household figures with more clarity. During data processing, movement indicators for which only household figures are reported are compared against household and individual figures reported for consistency, with outliers being followed up on. Triangulated household figures for all indicators, unless otherwise stated, are then multiplied by an average household size found at baseline (5.7), which is reviewed at regular intervals.³⁸

Once a data set is finalised, it is analysed according to analysis plans developed for respective outputs (bi-weekly factsheets, bi-weekly standalone maps, monthly factsheets, monthly standalone maps, ad hoc factsheets, quarterly trends analyses, thematic reports, and the interactive dashboard).

Data is aggregated to obtain findings at various levels, most commonly, at the sub-district, governorate and regional³⁹ level.

- Continuous variables (e.g. #, %): aggregate and average across entries
- Categorical variables (select multiple, select one): most commonly reported reported responses on a sub-district, governorate and regional level
- Open-ended questions: free text, qualitative narrative (most commonly for thematic assessments).



ANNEX 2: DEFINITIONS⁴⁸

Data Units:

- Household: a group of persons who share the same living accommodation, and who pool some or all of their resources and who consume certain types of goods and services collectively, mainly housing and food.
- Individual: a single human being as distinct from a group.

Population Categories:

- Internally displaced persons (IDPs): Individuals or groups of people who have been forced to leave their homes or places of habitual residence, in particular as a result of or in order to avoid the effects of armed conflict, situations of generalised violence, violations of human rights, or natural or man-made disasters, and who have not crossed an international border.
- > The <u>cause</u> of movement is important:
 - Only people who have been forced to leave their communities of origin because of conflict should be assessed as IDPs.
 - People who are outside of their community of origin but not displaced should not be assessed as IDPs.
 For example, people who are in other towns to visit friends/relatives for leisure, or to access markets should not be assessed as IDPs.
- > The location of displacement is important:
 - Only people who have left their homes and left their communities of origin should be assessed as IDPs.
 - People who have left their homes, but stayed in their community of origin should be assessed as resident/pre-conflict population members, and not IDPs.
- > The timeframe of displacement is important:
 - Only people who have spent at least 24 consecutive hours displaced outside of their community of origin should be assessed as IDPs.
 - People who are displaced outside their community of origin, for instance, only over the course of a day, but then return back to their homes in the evening (or within 24 hours) should not be assessed as IDPs.
- Resident/pre-conflict population: Individuals or groups of people who currently reside in their communities of origin or communities of permanent residence prior to the Syrian conflict. This includes populations that were never displaced, as well as previously displaced populations that have returned to their communities.
- > The origin of households is important:
 - A person's community of origin is defined as: the community a person is originally from, or in which they had their pre-conflict (i.e. prior to the outbreak of the Syrian conflict) place of habitual residence.
 - Residents who were never displaced, as well as previously displaced residents that have returned to their communities, who are currently living in their community of origin should be assessed as residents. This includes people who are residents of a community but who are not currently living in their pre-conflict homes.
 - People who have married into resident/pre-conflict households, and have 'permanently resettled' to a new community, and are now registered as residents by local authorities, should also be assessed as residents.
 - Children of residents who have been born since the conflict began should also be assessed as residents, as long as they currently live with their parents and are residing in their community of origin.

⁴⁸ Although the following definitions will never be perfectly followed by all KIs, REACH enumerators are trained to encourage KIs to count populations and report information in line with these definitions. Guidance notes are included in ISMI KoBo and paper forms, which explain key definitions. Enumerators are trained to use guidance notes in all interviews, to remind KIs of the exact meanings of the questions being asked.

- People who are displaced outside of their community of origin should not be assessed as residents, regardless of how long they have lived in their community of displacement. For example, IDPs who were displaced from their community of origin after the conflict began and have lived in a different community for many years should still be assessed as IDPs, not residents.
- Children of IDPs who were born in different communities to their parents' community of origin should be assessed as IDPs, not residents.
- Spontaneous Returns (SRs): Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) or refugees who return to their community of origin that they left due to conflict but not necessarily to their places of habitual residence (their former homes), and who do not necessarily enjoy the full spectrum of right afforded to them prior to their displacement.

Movement Categories:

- IDP arrivals: IDPs who arrived to and stayed for at least 24 consecutive hours in the assessed location at any point during the reporting period. This includes IDPs who arrived and subsequently departed during the reporting period (i.e. transited through, having stayed for at least 24 consecutive hours).
 - IDPs who transited through locations (having stayed for at least 24 consecutive hours), should be reported as both IDP arrivals and IDP departures.
- IDP departures: IDPs who were in the assessed location and subsequently departed and spent at least 24 consecutive hours in a different location at any point during the reporting period. These are persons who were previously displaced to the assessed location, and who are now departing (as opposed to residents in the assessed location who are being displaced from their communities of origin). This includes IDPs who departed and subsequently returned during the reporting period.
 - IDPs who depart (for at least 24 consecutive hours) and then return to an assessed location during the reporting period should be reported as both IDP departures and IDP arrivals.
- Resident/pre-conflict population departures: Resident/pre-conflict populations who were in the assessed location (their community of origin) and displaced to a different location for at least 24 consecutive hours at any point during the reporting period. This includes residents who were displaced and subsequently returned during the reporting period.
 - Residents who depart (for at least 24 consecutive hours) and then return during the reporting should be reported as both resident departures and spontaneous returns.
- Spontaneous returns (SRs) (flows): Former IDPs and/or refugees who returned to and stayed for at least 24 consecutive hours in the assessed location (their community of origin) at any point during the reporting period, with the intention of staying for a prolonged period of time. This includes SRs who returned and subsequently departed during the reporting period.
 - Residents who return (for at least 24 consecutive hours) and then depart during the reporting should be reported as both resident departures and spontaneous returns.
 - SRs only include residents returning to their community of origin. IDPs that 'return' to a community that is not their community of origin should be reported as IDP arrivals, not SRs.
- Intended destination: In the case of IDP and resident/pre-conflict departures, either the final destination that they are expected to go to, if known, or the next transit site in which they are expected to spend a prolonged period of time.
- Last place of departure: In the case of IDP arrivals and spontaneous returns, the most recent location that individuals spent at least 24 consecutive hours and then left from before arriving to the assessed location.

Community/area of origin: The location that a person is originally from, or in which they had their pre-conflict (i.e. prior to the outbreak of the Syrian conflict) place of habitual residence.

Site Categories:

- **Community**: A village, town, or city that is listed at the fourth administrative level on the UNOCHA p-code list and provided in the ISMI KoBo tool.
- **Neighbourhood**: A village, town, or city that is listed at the fifth administrative level on the UNOCHA p-code list and provided in the ISMI KoBo tool.
- Habitual residence: The dwelling in which someone resided prior to the outbreak of the Syrian conflict.

Shelter Categories:

- **Managed Camp:** A formal site for the shelter of IDPs, run by a CCCM cluster member, and recognised on the ISIMM list of camps and sites in north-west Syria.
- **Managed but Unrecognised Camp:** A formal site for the shelter of IDPs, which is not run by a CCCM cluster member, and as such not recognised on the ISIMM list of camps and sites in north-west Syria.
- Informal Settlement: Any collection of tents or other shelter types that IDPs have established themselves (including 5 or more IDP households), and which falls outside the ISIMM list of camps and sites in north-west Syria.
- **Collective Centre:** A pre-existing building or other structure used for the collective and communal settlement of displaced populations, e.g. mosques and schools.
- Solid/finished House: A functioning house that is not an apartment.
- Solid/finished Apartment: A functioning apartment that is not a house.
- **Unfinished/Damaged Building:** A building that is not fully functioning because it is not finished or due to damage.
- Individual Tent: An individual tent (not close to or surrounded by other tents) that IDPs have set up themselves.
- Open Area: Any area that has no human interference.

Tenancy Categories:

- **Ownership**: A shelter type that an IDP owns.
- Renting: A shelter type that an IDP needs to pay rent for in exchange for accommodation.
- Hosted Without Rent: A shelter type, dwelt in by a host, in which an IDP has permission to stay, without payment of rent.
- **Authorised Squatting**: A shelter type, often an empty building, in which an IDP has permission to stay without payment of rent.
- Unauthorised Squatting: A shelter type, often an empty building, in which an IDP stays without permission and without payment of rent.

ANNEX 3: CRITERIA FOR KI SELECTION

For bi-weekly/monthly, ad hoc, quarterly population and thematic assessments, REACH enumerators interview a minimum of 2 different KIs (and, ideally, 2 different KI types) per assessed location, with KIs purposively selected based on their knowledge of IDP and resident populations in those locations. A minimum of 2 KIs is a requirement for all data sets that are shared with the CCCM cluster and its partners and that are used to inform ISMI outputs, as this allows for data to be triangulated and for data errors, both intended and unintended, to be identified during data cleaning. In addition, for bi-weekly/monthly, ad hoc and quarterly population assessments, a 3rd KII is required where:

- The assessed location has a total population (IDP + resident/pre-conflict) of more than 5,000 households
- The assessed location has experienced total movements (IDP arrivals + IDP departures + resident/preconflict population departures + SRs) of more than 500 households during the reporting period
- Enumerators deem that discrepancies in information provided by KI 1 and KI 2 are too large
- Enumerators deem that either or both of the original 2 KIs are deemed unreliable or unsuitable.49

All KIs should:

- Be very knowledgeable about IDP and/or resident populations in their communities/camps/sites;
- Be able to provide accurate, up-to-date community-level information in the communities/camps/sites they
 represent;
- Currently live and/or work (or formerly did so, and maintain strong information networks) in the communities/camps/sites they represent;
- Be over the age of 18;
- Consent to regularly being contacted and interviewed for ISMI assessments.

In addition:

- Interviews should be conducted at the community level or 'lower' (e.g. neighbourhood, camp, informal settlement). In general, interviews should be conducted face-to-face with KIs in accessible areas. Where population movements are known to have occurred, but communities/sites are inaccessible, interviews should be conducted remotely, via whatsapp or another encrypted connection.
- Where possible, enumerators should try to ensure a balance of female as well as male KIs.
- Where it is possible to have a large number of KIs in a community, enumerators should try to alternate which KIs they interview for different assessments. This improves triangulation, and helps avoid KI fatigue.
- Priority is to be given to the quality of KIs, i.e. the relevance of their profile and reliability of the information they provide.
- For assessment types requiring more than 1 KII per assessed location, a maximum of 1 local council member or documentation office/registration focal point is allowed per location. This is due to the higher possibility for intentional bias associated with these KI types.
- In order to avoid intentional inflation of numbers, enumerators are trained to explain to all KIs that data collection exercises are NOT designed to facilitate aid in specific cases, and to not create expectations about humanitarian support resulting from ISMI assessments.

⁴⁹ REACH enumerators are asked to upload forms from all completed KIIs, including those they deem to be unreliable or unsuitable.
