

MULTI-SECTOR NEEDS ASSESSMENT (MSNA)

UKRAINE BRIEF 2018

CONTEXT


Since 2016, REACH has been supporting the implementation of joint Multi-Sector Needs Assessments (MSNAs) in Ukraine in collaboration with the Humanitarian Country Team (HCT) and Inter-Cluster Coordination Group (ICCG). These MSNAs evaluate changes in specific sectoral humanitarian needs over time.

In 2018, data was collected through **2,565 household surveys** across Government Controlled Areas (GCA) selected to be statistically representative of households living in areas within 5km, between 5-20km and beyond 20km of the Line of Contact. The MSNA findings have a 95% confidence level and 5% margin of error.

WHAT IS A MSNA?

Multi-Sector Needs Assessments aim to fill information gaps in order to inform crisis-wide humanitarian planning. MSNAs provide comparable data across all relevant sectors, crisisaffected areas and population groups. Where possible and relevant, MSNA coverage includes both accessible and hardto-reach areas, displaced and non-displaced population groups, and any other relevant stratification. MSNAs are implemented in a joint, participative and inclusive manner. Furthermore, they are time-sensitive with data and findings released prior to HNOs and HRPs discussion to generate impact. In 2018, eight MSNAs were supported by REACH and carried out thanks notably to the funding support from the global ECHO Enhanced Response Capacity funding mechanism.


