To improve access of humanitarian actors to regular, comprehensive and methodologically sound updates on IDP and Spontaneous Return populations in accessible opposition-held areas of north-east Syria. 2. To address specific information gaps in population, displacement and spontaneous returns monitoring in the region, namely: IDP, resident/pre-conflict⁴ and SR population estimates at the community, neighbourhood and site-level;⁵ demographic profiles and presence of vulnerable groups among IDP and SR populations; IDP and SR populations' priority needs; IDP and SR populations' shelter and tenancy settings; new displacements and spontaneous return movements; and populations' movement intentions and reasons for movement. 3. To address pressing information gaps in displacement monitoring during large displacement/return waves, through activation of rapid, ad hoc movement assessments. 4. To identify and meet the evolving information needs of humanitarian actors responding to IDP and SR populations in north-east Syria, through regular interaction and engagement with the NES Forum and its partners as well as through detailed assessments focusing on relevant specific geographic areas and displacement themes identified.

2. Rationale

2.1. Rationale

Since March 2011, protracted conflict in Syria has caused an estimated 5.5 million Syrians to flee abroad and a further 6.1 million people to be internally displaced inside the country.¹⁴ As of August 2017, the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) reported that almost a third of the pre-war Syrian population were internally displaced persons (IDPs).¹⁵ **Few regions have experienced destruction and displacement on the scale of urban centres of north-east Syria** – including large parts of Ar-Raqqa and Deir-ez-Zor governorates, in addition to eastern Aleppo, and western and southern Al-Hasakeh governorates. Populations in these areas have been acutely impacted by conflict, with mass displacements taking place and continuing since various actors initiated large-scale military campaigns in late 2016 to expel the group known as the Islamic State of Iraq and Syria (ISIS) from the region.

Despite many refugees and IDPs reportedly returning to their pre-conflict communities of origin across parts of north-east Syria, **the volatile and ever-changing security context means that civilian populations are continuously and repeatedly displaced, and that returning populations frequently go back to precarious conditions.** Such high population instability, combined with restricted humanitarian access impeding systematic data collection efforts, means that **acquiring timely and accurate data on the numbers and locations of IDPs and SRs has been a significant challenge across the region, limiting the effectiveness of humanitarian assistance planning and implementation.**

In order to address these information gaps, **REACH will conduct a series of regular population assessments, focused on establishing and updating a comprehensive data set of IDP and SR populations and their locations, conditions and priority needs.** In addition, a permanent data collection network will be established under this research cycle, with **enumerators trained and equipped to rapidly activate ‘ad hoc’ assessments to address urgent information gaps on new displacements and SRs during heightened displacement and return contexts.** These will be complemented by in-depth thematic assessments, focused on specific geographic areas and displacement themes. This three-pillared system will build on the foundations of other REACH assessments and previous REACH experience in displacement monitoring, namely: REACH north-east Syria Area Based Assessments, REACH Camps & Sites Assessments, REACH Rapid Needs Assessments, and the REACH/CCCM IDP Situation Monitoring Initiative (ISMI) in north-west Syria.¹⁶ Together, these assessments will aim **to address key information gaps around population, displacement and returns monitoring, and to enhance the evidence base informing humanitarian responses to IDP and SR populations in north-east Syria.**

3. Methodology

2.1. Methodology overview

The research consists of three regular research cycles:

- First, through its **baseline and quarterly population assessments**, REACH aims to establish and provide regular and comprehensive updates on total IDP, resident/pre-conflict and SR populations present in accessible communities, neighbourhoods and sites within the target coverage area,¹⁷ for fixed coverage dates. In addition, these exercises seek to assess: key demographic indicators of IDPs and SRs as well as the displacement profiles of these respective population groups; information on IDP and SR populations' priority needs; shelter settings; and new displacement and return movements that have taken place over the coverage period.
- Secondly, through **ad hoc data collection cycles**, REACH aims to meet pressing information needs of humanitarian partners for timely and frequent updates on IDP arrivals, IDP departures, and/or SRs to and from accessible locations within a more narrow geographic area¹⁸ that is experiencing large population movements. These assessments will be triggered in response to large displacement and return waves, identified through regular news and context monitoring, active screening conducted by enumerators, and alerts/requests received from Key Informants (KIs) and operational partners.
- Thirdly, through **thematic assessments**, REACH aims to explore and provide in-depth analysis of relevant displacement- and return-related issues, themes and information gaps, based either on existing data collected through other data collection cycles and secondary data sources, or through independent data collection exercises.

Primary data collection is carried out through two different methods, namely: **(1) face-to-face key informant interviews (KIIs) conducted by REACH enumerators in directly accessible locations;** and **(2) remote KIIs conducted by REACH enumerators in directly inaccessible locations.**¹⁹ Data for all assessments is collected at the community level or 'lower' (i.e. OCHA Syrian p-code administrative level 4, neighbourhood administrative level 5, or site).²⁰

2.2. Population of interest

This research cycle is interested in three main population groups and three main movement categories among these groups. **Assessments will be made at the community, neighbourhood or site-level across approximately 16-22²¹ sub-districts of Al-Hasakeh, Aleppo, Ar-Raqqa and Deir-ez-Zor governorates in north-east Syria.** In line with the possibility of changing conflict lines and areas of influence in the region, REACH will conduct regular reviews of its enumerator network coverage, collaborating with humanitarian partners to identify target priority areas for assessments on an ongoing basis.

The three main populations of interest for this research cycle are:²²

- **Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs)**, defined as: 'individuals or groups of people who have been forced to leave their homes or places of habitual residence, in particular as a result of or in order to avoid the effects of armed

conflict, situations of generalised violence, violations of human rights, or natural or man-made disasters, and who have not crossed an international border' (UNHCR);

- **Resident/pre-conflict populations**, defined as: individuals or groups of people who currently reside in their communities of origin, or communities of permanent residence prior to the Syrian conflict. This includes populations that were never displaced as well as previously displaced populations that have returned to their communities of origin;
- **Spontaneous Returns (SRs)**, defined as: Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) or refugees who return to their community of origin that they left due to conflict but not necessarily to their places of habitual residence (their former homes); who intend to remain in the community for a prolonged period; and who do not necessarily enjoy the full spectrum of rights afforded to them prior to their displacement.

The four main movement categories of interest for this research cycle are:

- **IDP arrivals**, defined as: IDPs who arrived to and stayed for at least 24 consecutive hours in an assessed location at any point during the reporting period. This includes IDPs who arrived and subsequently departed during the reporting period (i.e. transited through, having stayed for at least 24 consecutive hours).
- **IDP departures**, defined as: IDPs who were in an assessed location and subsequently departed and spent at least 24 consecutive hours in a different location at any point during the reporting period. These are persons who were previously displaced to the assessed location, and who are now departing (as opposed to residents in the assessed location who are being displaced from their communities of origin). This includes IDPs who departed and subsequently returned during the reporting period.
- **Resident/pre-conflict population departures**, defined as: resident/pre-conflict populations who were in an assessed location (their community of origin) and displaced to a different location for at least 24 consecutive hours at any point during the reporting period. This includes residents who were displaced and subsequently returned during the reporting period.
- **Spontaneous returns (SRs)**, defined as: former IDPs and/or refugees who returned to and stayed for at least 24 consecutive hours in an assessed location (their community of origin) at any point during the reporting period, with the intention of staying for a prolonged period of time. This includes SRs who returned and subsequently departed during the reporting period.

2.3. Secondary data review

Primary data collected by REACH enumerators is triangulated with available secondary data sources, including historical and current data from other REACH assessments in north-east Syria, such as: the REACH Humanitarian Situation Overview in Syria (HSOS); REACH north-east Syria Area Based Assessments; and REACH Camps & Sites Assessments. Population and displacement figures are also cross-checked with comparable data from NES Forum member agency reports on displacements and spontaneous returns, WoS Population Task Force data sets, WoS IDP Task Force data sets, and Syrian pre-conflict censuses, in addition to available satellite imagery attained through IMPACT requests to UNOSAT. All of these sources, as well as REACH INSO Syria Incident Lists, media, open source reports and humanitarian reports from other UN agencies and humanitarian bodies are used to inform design and activation of rapid ad hoc and thematic assessments, as well as for triangulation of data collected under these assessments.

2.4. Primary Data Collection

Primary data collection conducted by REACH enumerators employs a KI methodology, with key informant interviews (KIIs) conducted at the community level or 'lower'.²³ **KIIs are conducted both face-to-face and remotely in Ar-Raqqa, Aleppo and western Al-Hasakeh governorates**, with REACH enumerators travelling to directly accessible communities,

neighbourhoods and sites. In Deir-ez-Zor governorate, southern Al-Hasakeh governorate, and other areas where face-to-face data collection is not possible due to the security situation or other constraints, remote KI contact is made, with REACH enumerators conducting KIIs via secure telephone/WhatsApp/messaging or other services.

Data is collected through interviews with KIs living or working in the sub-districts where communities, neighbourhoods and sites are assessed. In certain circumstances, interviews may also be conducted with KIs who formerly lived or worked in assessed areas and who maintain strong networks in those locations. Potential KIs are identified using the existing REACH networks, as well as through a snowball approach to reach a larger number of KIs in order to better triangulate information, reduce KI fatigue and allow for broader coverage. Required KI profiles depend on the question/information to be gathered and KIs are purposively selected. Where multiple KIs are available, priority is given to the quality of KIs (i.e. the relevance of their profile and reliability of the information they could provide). KIs have to be over the age of 18 and consent to being regularly contacted and interviewed. Where possible, enumerators aim to ensure a balance of female as well as male KIs. KI types for all assessments may include: members of local relief committees, local charities, civil society groups or NGOs, community leaders of IDP and resident/pre-conflict populations, teachers, documentation office/registration focal points or local council members.^{24 25}

Based on structured questionnaires, REACH enumerators ask KIs a limited number of questions on the indicators below. KoBo tools and paper forms are designed at the country level by REACH assessment and project officers, reviewed by the IMPACT Research Design Unit in Geneva, and piloted at the field level before implementation. Primary data collected through all assessment cycles is triangulated through available secondary data sources:

1) **Baseline and quarterly population assessments:**²⁶

- Data is collected via KIIs conducted by REACH enumerators in all accessible communities, neighbourhoods and sites in the coverage area on a quarterly basis. Coverage dates are aligned with OCHA, NES Forum and humanitarian partner coverage dates for Whole of Syria (WoS) population assessments.
- Data is collected on:
 - i. Total number of IDPs in assessed locations as of the fixed coverage date; IDP populations' demographic profiles (i.e. age and gender), presence of vulnerable groups, displacement profiles (i.e. frequency and duration of displacement; area of origin), proportion of IDPs by shelter type and priority needs;
 - ii. Total number of resident/pre-conflict population members in assessed locations as of the fixed coverage date; total number of SR populations²⁷ in assessed locations as of the fixed coverage date; total number of SRs living in former homes; SR populations' demographic profiles (i.e. age and gender), presence of vulnerable groups, displacement profiles (i.e. region, frequency and duration of displacement), proportion of SRs by shelter type and priority needs;
 - iii. Total number of IDPs that arrived to assessed locations during the fixed coverage period,²⁸ last places of departure; total number of IDPs that departed from assessed locations during the coverage period, as well as intended destinations for movement; total number of residents that departed from assessed locations during the coverage period, as well as intended destinations for

movement; total number of SRs to assessed locations during the coverage period, as well as last places of departure.

- Submissions are uploaded to the KoBo server and data checking and follow up with enumerators is conducted both during and after the end of data collection cycles.

2) Rapid ad hoc movement assessments:

- Data is collected via KIs conducted by REACH enumerators in all accessible locations in a specific sub-section of the coverage area that have witnessed large displacement and/or spontaneous return movements over a fixed coverage period. Enumerators are required to continuously screen and monitor the situations in their sub-districts (through news monitoring, remotely contacting networks, and alerts received directly from KIs), and report on known targeted movements to and from locations the moment they are aware of them.
- Indicators will be adjusted according to the specific displacement context. Data may be collected on any of the following indicators:²⁹
 - i. Total number of IDPs that arrived to assessed locations during the coverage period, last places of departure, presence of vulnerable groups, priority needs, proportion of IDP arrivals by shelter and tenancy type;
 - ii. Total number of IDPs that departed from assessed locations during the coverage period, as well as intended destinations;
 - iii. Total number of residents that departed from assessed locations during the coverage period, as well as intended destinations;
 - iv. Total number of SRs to assessed locations during the coverage period, last places of departure, presence of vulnerable groups, priority needs, proportion of new SRs by shelter type;
 - v. Total number of IDPs in assessed locations as of the final day of the coverage period;
 - vi. Total number of resident/pre-conflict population members in assessed locations as of the final day of the coverage period.
- Submissions are uploaded to the KoBo server and data checking and follow up is conducted on a rolling basis.

3) Thematic assessments:

- The methodology, thematic and geographic focus of different thematic assessments is determined in coordination with humanitarian partners and is based on findings from other REACH data collection cycles, secondary sources, identified and evolving needs of the NES Forum and its partners and key information gaps in regard to population, displacement and spontaneous returns monitoring in north-east Syria.³⁰
- Data collection for thematic assessments is typically conducted via KIs conducted by REACH enumerators, although may also be based on or make use of existing data collected through other REACH research cycles and/or secondary data sources.
- Data is collected on various displacement- and return-related indicators, which aim to address the overall research objectives.

For **quarterly population and ad hoc assessments, REACH enumerators interview a minimum of 1, but preferably 2, different KIs (and, ideally, 2 different KI types) per assessed location**, with KIs purposively selected based on their knowledge of IDP, SR and resident populations in those locations^{31 32}. For all data sets that are shared with partners and that are used for information products, the use of multiple KIs allows for data to be triangulated and for data errors, both intended and unintended, to be identified during data cleaning. In addition, **for quarterly population assessments, a 3rd KI is required where:**

- The assessed location has a total population (IDP + resident/pre-conflict) of more than 15,000 households and 85,500 individuals;
- Enumerators deem that discrepancies in information provided by KI 1 and KI 2 are too large;
- Enumerators deem that either or both of the original 2 KIs are unreliable or unsuitable.

Following quarterly and ad hoc data collection cycles, **routine field debriefs** take place between REACH assessment and project staff and enumerator teams in each area. These provide a regular feedback channel for all assessments, including challenges faced at the field level, including with enumerator and KI understanding and ability to answer questions, community access constraints, changes in KIs, security, travel, internet and issues with permissions. Based on these debriefs and regular interaction with the NES Forum and other humanitarian partners, REACH conducts reviews of all assessment types, with steps taken to **improve methodologies, tools, processes and information products at regular intervals to better meet the programme's research objectives**. REACH enumerators receive **quarterly refresher trainings and pilot changes to indicators and questionnaires, providing feedback before any updates are finalised**. The REACH assessment team is continuously available to support REACH data collection teams proactively and in response to specific requests throughout all data collection cycles.

2.5. Data Processing & Analysis

Interviews for all assessments are conducted using paper forms, which are then entered digitally using the KoBo Collect App on smartphones or Enketo web platform and subsequently uploaded to the IMPACT KoBo server. The assessment team downloads³³ and checks submissions to ensure the required number of forms have been submitted for each location, before **checking for any internal inconsistencies, outliers, data entry errors, or discrepancies between multiple submissions** for the same assessed location. Automated checks are used where possible to ensure consistency and timely data processing. Any issues are followed up with enumerators and, where possible, KIs. Corrections based on responses from enumerators are cleaned by REACH assessment officers, with follow-up and cleaning logs maintained in password-protected files alongside all raw data and cleaning sheets.³⁴ Once all steps have been followed in the data cleaning, checking and data set creation processes, with no follow-up remaining, the REACH assessment and project teams check through cleaning sheets and final data sets for any inconsistencies.

Continuous variables such as total population and total movement estimates (i.e. total IDP population as of end date of the coverage period, total IDP arrivals during the coverage period, etc.) **are triangulated according to Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs)**, with discrepancies followed up on with respective enumerators.³⁵ All raw total population estimates are checked with historical population data as well as secondary data sources, with discrepancies being similarly followed up on. In cases of non-consensus between REACH and secondary data sources, or where responses provided by enumerators after follow-up are deemed insufficient, data for the respective indicators is omitted and entered as 'No data'. Following this, the REACH Assessment Manager and IMPACT Data Unit in Geneva internally reviews data sets before these are shared.

For the majority of assessments, **KIs are asked to report household estimates for population and movement figures**. For only three indicators (total IDP populations, total SR populations, and total resident/pre-conflict populations) KIs are regularly asked to report household as well as individual estimates, if available. This is based on the understanding that **KIs are more frequently able to provide accurate household rather than individual figures** in a context of high population mobility. Collecting household figures is a frequently employed data collection technique in this sort of research, with interviewers often reporting that while KIs only provide ballpoint individual estimates, they are able to provide household

figures with more clarity. During data processing, movement indicators for which only household figures are reported are compared against household and individual figures reported for consistency, with outliers being followed up on. Triangulated household figures for all indicators, unless otherwise stated, are then multiplied by an average household size found at baseline, which is reviewed at regular intervals.³⁶ KIs will be weighted (1 as low, 3 as high) based on their KI type. Initial KI weightings will be determined by the NES field team, who have knowledge of KI types and their reliability in regards to different population numbers. Data will be weighted in regards to KI answers for IDP, host community and spontaneous returnee stock population numbers.

Once a data set is finalised, it is analysed according to analysis plans developed for respective outputs (quarterly situation overviews, ad hoc factsheets, ad hoc standalone maps, and thematic reports). Data is aggregated to obtain findings at various levels, most commonly, at the sub-district, governorate and regional³⁷ level.

- Continuous variables (e.g. #, %): aggregate and average across entries
- Categorical variables (select multiple, select one): most commonly reported responses on a sub-district, governorate and regional level
- Open-ended questions: free text, qualitative narrative (most commonly for thematic assessments).

ANNEX 1: DEFINITIONS⁴³

Data Units:

- ❖ **Household:** a group of persons who share the same living accommodation, and who pool some or all of their resources and who consume certain types of goods and services collectively, mainly housing and food.
- ❖ **Individual:** a single human being as distinct from a group.

Population Categories:

- ❖ **Internally displaced persons (IDPs):** Individuals or groups of people who have been forced to leave their homes or places of habitual residence, in particular as a result of or in order to avoid the effects of armed conflict, situations of generalised violence, violations of human rights, or natural or man-made disasters, and who have not crossed an international border.
 - The cause of movement is important:
 - Only people who have been forced to leave their communities of origin because of conflict should be assessed as IDPs.
 - People who are outside of their community of origin but not displaced should not be assessed as IDPs. For example, people who are in other towns to visit friends/relatives for leisure, or to access markets should not be assessed as IDPs.
 - The location of displacement is important:
 - Only people who have left their homes and left their communities of origin should be assessed as IDPs.
 - People who have left their homes, but stayed in their community of origin should be assessed as resident/pre-conflict population members, and not IDPs.
 - The timeframe of displacement is important:
 - Only people who have spent at least 24 consecutive hours displaced outside of their community of origin should be assessed as IDPs.
 - People who are displaced outside their community of origin, for instance, only over the course of a day, but then return back to their homes in the evening (or within 24 hours) should not be assessed as IDPs.
- ❖ **Resident/pre-conflict population:** Individuals or groups of people who currently reside in their communities of origin or communities of permanent residence prior to the Syrian conflict. This includes populations that were never displaced, as well as previously displaced populations that have returned to their communities.
 - The origin of households is important:
 - A person's community of origin is defined as: the community a person is originally from, or in which they had their pre-conflict (i.e. prior to the outbreak of the Syrian conflict) place of habitual residence.
 - Residents who were never displaced, as well as previously displaced residents that have returned to their communities, who are currently living in their community of origin should be assessed as residents. This includes people who are residents of a community but who are not currently living in their pre-conflict homes.
 - People who have married into resident/pre-conflict households, and have 'permanently resettled' to a new community, and are now registered as residents by local authorities, should also be assessed as residents.
 - Children of residents who have been born since the conflict began should also be assessed as residents, as long as they currently live with their parents and are residing in their community of origin.
 - People who are displaced outside of their community of origin should not be assessed as residents, regardless of how long they have lived in their community of displacement. For example, IDPs who were displaced from their community of origin after the conflict began and have lived in a different community for many years should still be assessed as IDPs, not residents.
 - Children of IDPs who were born in different communities to their parents' community of origin should be assessed as IDPs, not residents.
- ❖ **Spontaneous Returns (SRs):** Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) or refugees who return to their community of origin that they left due to conflict but not necessarily to their places of habitual residence (their former homes); who intend to

remain in the community for a prolonged period of time; and who do not necessarily enjoy the full spectrum of rights afforded to them prior to their displacement.

Movement Categories:

- ❖ **IDP arrivals:** IDPs who arrived to and stayed for at least 24 consecutive hours in the assessed location at any point during the reporting period. This includes IDPs who arrived and subsequently departed during the reporting period (i.e. transited through, having stayed for at least 24 consecutive hours).
 - IDPs who transited through locations (having stayed for at least 24 consecutive hours), should be reported as both IDP arrivals and IDP departures.
- ❖ **IDP departures:** IDPs who were in the assessed location and subsequently departed and spent at least 24 consecutive hours in a different location at any point during the reporting period. These are persons who were previously displaced to the assessed location, and who are now departing (as opposed to residents in the assessed location who are being displaced from their communities of origin). This includes IDPs who departed and subsequently returned during the reporting period.
 - IDPs who depart (for at least 24 consecutive hours) and then return to an assessed location during the reporting period should be reported as both IDP departures and IDP arrivals.
- ❖ **Resident/pre-conflict population departures:** Resident/pre-conflict populations who were in the assessed location (their community of origin) and displaced to a different location for at least 24 consecutive hours at any point during the reporting period. This includes residents who were displaced and subsequently returned during the reporting period.
 - Residents who depart (for at least 24 consecutive hours) and then return during the reporting period should be reported as both resident departures and spontaneous returns.
- ❖ **Spontaneous returns (SRs) (flows):** Former IDPs and/or refugees who returned to and stayed for at least 24 consecutive hours in the assessed location (their community of origin) at any point during the reporting period, with the intention of staying for a prolonged period of time. This includes SRs who returned and subsequently departed during the reporting period.
 - Residents who return (for at least 24 consecutive hours) and then depart during the reporting period should be reported as both resident departures and spontaneous returns.
 - SRs only include residents returning to their community of origin. IDPs that 'return' to a community that is not their community of origin should be reported as IDP arrivals, not SRs.
- ❖ **Intended destination:** In the case of IDP and resident/pre-conflict departures, either the final destination that they are expected to go to, if known, or the next transit site in which they are expected to spend a prolonged period of time.
- ❖ **Last place of departure:** In the case of IDP arrivals and spontaneous returns, the most recent location that individuals spent at least 24 consecutive hours and then left from before arriving to the assessed location.
- ❖ **Community/area of origin:** The location that a person is originally from, or in which they had their pre-conflict (i.e. prior to the outbreak of the Syrian conflict) place of habitual residence.

Site Categories:

- **Community:** A village, town or city that is listed at the fourth administrative level on the UNOCHA p-code list.
- **Neighbourhood:** A locality, village or hamlet that is listed at the fifth administrative level on the UNOCHA p-code list.⁴⁴
- **Habitual residence:** The dwelling in which someone resided prior to the outbreak of the Syrian conflict.

Shelter Categories:

- **Managed Camp:** A formal site for the shelter of IDPs, which is administered by a humanitarian agency or local authority recognised by the NES Forum.

- **Managed but Unrecognised Camp:** A formal site for the shelter of IDPs, which is not administered by a humanitarian agency or local authority recognised by the NES Forum.
- **Informal Tented Settlement:** Any collection of tents or other mobile shelter types that IDPs have established themselves (including 5 or more IDP households).
- **Formal Collective Centre:** A pre-existing building or other structure that was originally meant for a use other than housing (e.g. mosque, school, factory), but which is currently being used for the settlement of IDPs and has been modified for that purpose, and is administered by a humanitarian agency or local authority recognised by the NES Forum.
- **Non-residential/public building:** A pre-existing building or other structure that was originally meant for a use other than housing (e.g. mosque, school, factory), but which is currently being used for the settlement of IDPs but has *not* been modified for that purpose, and is not administered by a humanitarian agency or local authority recognised by the NES Forum (often self-settled).
- **Transit/reception Centre:** A formal site for the short-term, temporary accommodation of IDPs, which is administered by a humanitarian agency or local authority recognised by the NES Forum.
- **Solid/finished House:** An independent fixed dwelling, which is set on its own property, and which is functioning⁴⁵ and undamaged.
- **Solid/finished Apartment:** A fixed dwelling unit inside a larger building, which contains other similar units, and which is functioning and undamaged.
- **Unfinished/Damaged House:** A house that is not fully functioning because it is not finished or due to damage.
- **Unfinished/Damaged Apartment:** An apartment that is not fully functioning because it is not finished or due to damage.
- **Individual Tent:** An individual tent (not close to or surrounded by other tents) that IDPs have set up themselves.
- **Open Area:** Any area that has no human interference and in which IDPs live exposed to natural conditions (e.g. living in caves, under trees, open fields, etc.)

⁴⁵ 'Functioning' refers to a shelter type that has all walls, roofs, ceilings, windows and doors intact.

ANNEX 2: CRITERIA FOR KI SELECTION

For **quarterly population and ad hoc assessments**, REACH enumerators interview a minimum of 2 different KIs (and, ideally, 2 different KI types) per assessed location, with KIs purposively selected based on their knowledge of IDP, SR and resident populations in those locations. A minimum of 2 KIs is a requirement for all data sets that are shared with partners and that are used for information products, as this allows for data to be triangulated and for data errors, both intended and unintended, to be identified during data cleaning. In addition, **for quarterly population assessments, a 3rd KI is required where:**

- The assessed location has a **total population (IDP + resident/pre-conflict) of more than 15,000 households and 85,500 individuals;**
- Enumerators deem that **discrepancies in information provided by KI 1 and KI 2 are too large;**
- Enumerators deem that **either or both of the original 2 KIs are unreliable or unsuitable.**⁴⁶

All KIs should:

- Be very knowledgeable about IDP, SR and/or resident populations in their communities/neighbourhoods/sites;
- Be able to provide accurate, up-to-date community-level information in the communities/neighbourhoods/sites they represent;
- Currently live and/or work (or formerly did so, and maintain strong information networks) in the communities/neighbourhoods/sites they represent;
- Be over the age of 18;
- Consent to regularly being contacted and interviewed for assessments.

In addition:

- Interviews should be **conducted at the community level or 'lower'** (e.g. neighbourhood, camp, informal settlement or other site level). In general, interviews should be conducted face-to-face with KIs in accessible areas. Where communities/sites are inaccessible, interviews should be conducted remotely, via whatsapp or another encrypted connection.
- Where possible, enumerators should try to ensure a balance of female as well as male KIs.
- Where it is possible to have a large number of KIs in a location, enumerators should try to alternate which KIs they interview for different assessments. This improves triangulation, and helps avoid KI fatigue.
- Priority is to be given to the quality of KIs, i.e. the relevance of their profile and reliability of the information they provide.
- For assessment types requiring multiple KIIs per assessed location, a maximum of 1 local council member or documentation office/registration focal point is allowed per location. This is due to the higher possibility for intentional bias associated with these KI types.
- In order to avoid intentional inflation of numbers, enumerators are trained to explain to all KIs that **data collection exercises are NOT designed to facilitate aid in specific cases**, and to not create expectations about humanitarian support resulting from REACH assessments.
