2. Rationale

2.1. Rationale

As of March 2020, areas of Idleb governorate and northern Aleppo remain the last opposition-held territories in northwest Syria (NWS). An escalation in both aerial and ground conflict that commenced in December 2019 led to large numbers of displaced persons seeking refuge in an increasingly diminishing area. The number of newly displaced persons in this area due to this recent escalation in violence is estimated to be at 960,000 by OCHA.³ The sheer number of IDP arrivals and unpredictability of displacement trends has led to complex humanitarian challenges in communities witnessing high numbers of IDP arrivals, and is contributing to an increased deterioration of an already dire humanitarian situation. With the announcement of a ceasefire on 5 March 2020, there has been a general cessation in aerial conflict and shelling. Despite this, the immense humanitarian needs in the area both persist and are in danger of being further exacerbated by future violence.

Since the beginning of March 2020, the global pandemic of COVID-19 has led to increased concerns in relation to humanitarian situation in NWS. Humanitarian actors face challenges scaling up existing capacity to deal with a potential outbreak of COVID-19 in the area, and also face possible future logistical challenges on ensuring the continued supply of humanitarian assistance. Additionally, humanitarian actors are looking to quickly roll out education and awareness support in NWS to ensure best practices are applied to help mitigate any future outbreak of COVID-19.

The relative stabilization of the situation in NWS following the March 2020 cease fire calls for re-assessment of the needs of conflict-affected communities NWS and the ways these have been transformed by the effects of the escalation of the conflict in the area that began in December 2019. This assessment aims to inform humanitarian actors of the priority needs and humanitarian conditions of both IDPs and the resident population, in an area that has recently been severely impacted by conflict and subsequent displacement. This RNA will also aim to provide essential information on the level of awareness about the risks associated with COVID-19 among the population in Idleb and northern Aleppo, and also on the preventive and response capacities in these areas.

3. Methodology

3.1 Methodology overview

A key informant (KI) methodology will be employed for this RNA. Data collection will take place between 26 and 29 March in 26 sub-districts in northern Idleb and western Aleppo governorates. The Idleb governorate, as the governorate which has witnessed most of the conflict and displacement since December 2019 will be assessed as a whole on this basis. Communities in Aleppo governorate were selected to include those that have received the largest number of IDPs since December 2019. In total, 463 communities should be assessed based on these criteria. To ensure that all communities can be covered within the period designated for data collection, and in response to access restrictions as well as social-distancing recommendations related to COVID-19 pandemic on limiting the movement of aid workers, all KI interviews will be conducted remotely. Data will be collected at the community/site level, with enumerators filling out one questionnaire per community/site and interviewing at least 1 KI per community. KIs will be selected based on their knowledge of IDP and resident populations in the community and will respond to the sections of the questionnaire that best fit their sector-specific expertise. Collected primary data will then be further triangulated through available secondary data sources.

3.2 Population of interest

The two main populations of interest for this assessment are internally displaced person (IDP) and resident host populations in assessed communities in northern Idleb and western Aleppo governorates.

IDPs are defined as individuals or groups of people who have been forced to leave their communities of origin, in particular as a result of or in order to avoid the effects of armed conflict, situations of generalized violence, violations of human rights, or natural or man-made disasters, and who have not crossed an international border.⁴

Host community residents are defined as individuals or groups of people who currently reside in their communities of origin, or communities of permanent residence prior to the Syrian conflict. This includes populations that were never displaced as well as previously displaced populations that have returned to their communities of origin.

3.3 Secondary data review

Available secondary data sources will be used to triangulate primary data collection and will include data collected through the Humanitarian Situation Overview in Syria (HSOS) in 26 sub-districts in northern Idleb and western Aleppo governorates, population and displacement numbers assessed on an ongoing basis as part of the CCCM Cluster's continuous monitoring of the situation, as well as other available data from REACH, UN agencies, and other humanitarian bodies, and media and open source reports.

3.4 Primary Data Collection

Primary data collection will be conducted in communities in northern Idleb and western Aleppo governorates, through a remote interview method (via phone) due to access restrictions and to ensure timeliness. Data will be collected though a KI methodology. REACH will utilize its wide KI network in north-west Syria to collect information as follows:

- Based on a structured questionnaire, enumerators will ask KIs a limited number of questions about shelter, food
 and markets, livelihoods, electricity and non-food items (NFIs), water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH), health,
 education and protection to gather information at the community level. Information will also be collected on
 population numbers and movement intentions, as well as availability of displacement-relevant items.
- Enumerators will submit one form per assessed community, interviewing different KIs for different sections of the form, based on KIs' knowledge about the community, camp or informal site in general and specific sectors in particular. Enumerators will try to contact at least two KIs per community and, if possible, more. In the rare case that enumerators are unable to interview multiple KIs, feedback from one KI will be accepted. If no KIs can be found, then the community will not be assessed. Enumerators will be organized geographically, with each enumerator given a list of unique communities to cover this will ensure there is no overlapping data collection and that no enumerators speak with the same key informant. The KIs will be selected independently by enumerators who possess intimate knowledge of the areas under their coverage and are thus able to identify suitable KIs directly from their existing list of contacts or, in accordance with purposive snowballing sampling methodology, indirectly by identifying suitable KIs through their existing network.
- KI types may include: civil society groups, local charities, local councils, local relief committees, NGOs, community leaders, documentation office registration focal points, camp managers, teachers, health staff or mukhtars (community leaders).
- Communities, camps and informal sites will be selected focusing primarily on whether they were affected by a large
 influx of IDPs since the 1st of December 2019 (at least 100 individuals). In addition, sub-districts are selected in
 such a way that the geographic area remains contiguous and consolidated.
- Up to 500 communities will be assessed (depending on enumerator capacity), covering 26 sub-districts in the region that received large numbers of IDPs uprooted by the latest conflict escalation in Aleppo and Idleb governorates.

3.5. Data Processing & Analysis

All submissions will be checked for internal inconsistencies and outliers, and submitted information will be cross-checked for with available secondary data on assessed communities. This includes cross checking with previous RNA and baseline assessments for the same geographic area to identify outliers. Follow up will be conducted with enumerators and KIs for all communities where discrepancies or issues were discovered. Submitted raw data will be cleaned based on follow up responses and all changes to the data will be logged. The cleaning process will be based on Minimum Standards Data Cleaning checklist. The cleaning process will be facilitated by using a macros-equipped excel sheet used to record errors, corrections and follow-up requests for the enumerators. Data cleaning will take place on rolling daily basis as data and feedback on follow-up requests from the data collection team come in.

Data from the RNA will be analyzed and aggregated at the regional (opposition-held northwest Syria), governorate, and sub-district levels. Analysis will be conducted through either SPSS or R analytical software, and all aggregated findings will be collated at the relevant cluster level and included in the final dataset to ensure information is easily interpreted. The analysis at the regional level will then inform reporting components, with additional GIS components reporting at both the community/site and sub-district level. Data will be collected over the phone in assessed communities through REACH enumerators from KIs living or working in the community and then aggregated to obtain findings at the assessed area level.

- Typical key informants for humanitarian assessments in Syria are representatives of affected population groups, local administrative councils, activist's groups, census offices, camp managers, documentation offices, local relief committees, local NGOs, INGOs, UN agencies, charities, the municipality, or other community leaders, representatives of the business community, traders, farmers. Others can be selected on the enumerator's judgement.
- Information can be cross-checked through direct observation of the situation, opinions from the general population, and so on
- Some questions include a confidence level, for the enumerator to rate how confident they are that the information is credible.

Safety

- At no time should names be recorded
- It is not recommended to collect and carry hard copies of responses if possible.
- Do not carry a list of key informants.
- Recording evidence that can confirm the credibility of information can be useful (for example taking photos of a damaged hospital, maps, stagnant water, empty markets), but enumerators will have to use their judgement as to whether this is safe.
- Do not prompt information about specific GBV and Child protection cases
- If a protection specific case (GBV or Child Protection) is disclosed, contact the protection focal point in your area and without disclosing identifiable information, ask for direction Guidelines
- Introduce yourself; be clear on the purpose of the assessment.
- Ensure they understand this is not a promise for services but will help us plan our response.
